Prophets Foretell Jesus' Coming

Jeremiah 33:14-16



Prophets Foretell Jesus' Coming

Jeremiah 33:14-16



Jeremiah Preaches Hope in Times of Trouble

This passage was written nearly 600 years before Jesus was born. The northern kingdom of Israel had fallen to the Assyrians, who had in turn fallen to the Babylonians. Jeremiah also saw the fall of the southern kingdom of Judah to the Babylonians, concluding with the destruction of Jerusalem in 587 B.C.

Despite all that was going on around him, Jeremiah's message in this passage is one of hope. Repeating nearly word for word the message he had given in Jeremiah 23:5-6, Jeremiah utters here his most important message about the coming Messiah. This King would be a descendant of David but would rule with more wisdom, justice, and righteousness than any other king had ever done. This coming Messiah would not only rescue his people from their oppressors but also reunite the kingdoms of Israel and Judah, which had been divided since the death of Solomon more than 300 years earlier.

Jesus Fulfills Prophecy, but Not as Expected

After reading this passage, it's easy to understand why people of Jesus' day expected a Messiah who would lead them in throwing off Roman rule and restoring the unified kingdom of Israel. From our standpoint in history, we know that Jesus came first as the suffering servant (see Isaiah 53), drawing people to himself through his perfect life and his message of repentance. One day, however, Jesus will return to complete his fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies and rule as king over all heaven and earth.

As we look forward to our celebration of Jesus' birth, we can also look forward to the day Jesus will return to take those who believe in him to live with him in heaven. That's God's message of hope for Christians in today's broken world!

The Jesus Connection

Your relationship with Jesus is an amazing gift. And God planned long ago to give you that gift. Thank him for this life-giving blessing!

Long ago, God chose to prepare the hearts of his people with the news that a Savior would come. As you prepare for Christmas, take some time to allow God's message of hope and salvation to sink in for you. Choose to believe God's promises—and allow the wonder of Jesus' incarnation to overwhelm you. Pray about your heart's desire to live this Christmas season immersed in the meaning of God's promises. Disaster Dramas

What You'll Do

Greet people warmly as they gather. Begin by quickly brainstorming the names of a few well-known disaster movies of the past decades. Point out that these films—about plane crashes, volcanoes, earthquakes, or meteors, for example—usually emphasize the terrible things that can happen either in nature or because of human error.

Have adults form groups of no more than four. Distribute paper and pens. Ask each group to create a plot for a new kind of disaster film in which dependable laws of nature suddenly go haywire. For example, a group might base its plot on the sun not coming up or the seasons not changing or water not keeping things afloat. Have groups each choose a failed law of nature as the basis for their movie plot. Have them jot down their basic plot points, including the rescue or resolution to the disaster.

Allow about seven minutes for each team to form a movie plot. Then have teams report.

Talk With Adults

Lead everyone in this discussion. Participants can find these questions in their Adult Handbooks.

Ask:

- Have you ever experienced a "disaster" when something you depended on broke down or went wrong? How did you respond?
- In what ways is this similar to experiencing a broken promise?
- What kinds of promises do you depend on in your daily life?

Say: Today we'll be discussing the prophetic promises of Jesus' entry into human history. We'll be exploring the ways that ▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE, and how he was the rescuer and resolution to the disaster we found ourselves in.





Promises? What Promises?

What You'll Do

Point out that the Old Testament contains more than 300 Messianic references that were fulfilled by Jesus. Explain that adults will have the opportunity to check out some of these promises.

Distribute Bibles. Ask three willing adults to each read one of the following passages aloud as others follow along in their own Bibles: today's Scripture, Jeremiah 33:14-16; Isaiah 7:14; the Key Verse, Matthew 1:22-23.

Ask:

■ In what ways does our Key Verse, Matthew 1:22-23, demonstrate a fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecies we looked at?

Randomly distribute the slips you cut out from the "Promises, Promises" handout; make sure that you distribute both the promise slips and the corresponding fulfillment references. Give each adult one slip, and exclude extra slips along with their matches. If you have an uneven number of adults, you can participate so that everyone can be part of a pair. Tell adults to look up the passages and then walk around the room looking for the person whose slip matches up with theirs, a prophecy with a fulfillment.

Once the pairs have found one another, have them talk for a moment about how their prophecies were fulfilled. Then have them find another pair and share with each other about their promise and its fulfillment. Allow time for each pair to share with at least four other pairs.

Talk With Adults

Lead everyone in this discussion. Participants can find these questions in their Adult Handbooks.

Ask:

- How important are biblical prophecies of the Messiah?
- What advice would you give a new Christian about understanding such prophecies?
- What would you say to a critic of Christianity who makes a statement similar to this: "It was easy for Jesus to fulfill prophecies; all he had to do was read the Old Testament and then do what the prophets said the Messiah would do"?
- In your opinion, which promise is the most amazing of God's fulfilled promises? Why?
- In a general, overall sense, how did Jesus fulfill God's promise?

Say: JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE in Jeremiah to send a Savior. He became God with us. And as we've just discovered, Jesus fulfilled so many of God's promises about the Messiah. We can be confident in who Jesus is because of the prophecies he fulfilled. And we can be confident that he is God with us.

God With Me—Really?

What You'll Do

Say: Our Key Verse, Matthew 1:22-23, tells us that Jesus was called Immanuel, which means "God with us." What an amazing promise! Jesus is God with us, even today. Let's take a few minutes to brainstorm some areas of our lives where we really need to know God is with us.

Have adults call out ideas, and write each one on a different piece of paper. When you have five or six signs, hang each one on the wall, making sure to spread them apart.

Say: Pick one area where you most need to feel God's presence, and go to that sign now. Allow time. Make sure there are at least two people at each sign. Have groups at each sign discuss ways they've seen God in that area already and how they'd like to continue to see God with them. Also have them discuss the difference God's presence makes in that place. After a few minutes of discussion, have groups pray together to experience God's presence in that area.

Then have adults choose a new sign to go to and repeat the discussion and prayer. Repeat until you have about five minutes left for this activity, and then proceed to the discussion questions below.

Talk With Adults

Lead everyone in this discussion. Participants can find these questions in their Adult Handbooks.

Ask:

- What are some ways we can live differently knowing that Jesus is the fulfillment of the promise of God's presence?
- If you truly seek to live in the promise of God's presence with you through Jesus, how will your life this week look different from last week?

Say: Jeremiah prophesied that God would send a Savior. And God didn't send just any Savior to keep that promise—he sent his own Son to be God with us.

Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

Say: In this session, we've seen how ▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. Let's think about how Jesus can help us experience God's presence this week.

Say: If you have kids in Sunday school, they should have a take-home paper from this week's lesson to show you. It has their Daily Challenges for this week and ideas for weaving faith at home as a family. Please help your kids follow through with their Daily Challenges. If you don't have kids in Sunday school, you can still use your own handbook or your Digging Deeper page to further reflect on God's promises this week.

Close with prayer. Pray: Jesus, thank you that you fulfilled God's promise to be our Savior, God with us. Help us see your presence this week. In your name, amen.

What does this promise mean to you right now? Why do you or don't you believe God is keeping it for you?


Talk Topics


