Jesus Teaches About Good Fruit

Luke 6:43-45

Some people seem to think their faith is just "fire insurance." They don't seem concerned about acting on their beliefs. It's important to help your class members see that, while having their belief system in order is a good thing, acting on their beliefs is the way they point others to God. However, this lesson may awaken some people's insecurities about their salvation. It will be important to assure adults that the point of this lesson isn't that our works lead us to salvation, but that God wants us to live fruit-bearing lives that show evidence of our gratitude and faith.



Jesus Teaches About Good Fruit

Luke 6:43-45



Jesus Compares Trees to Authentic Faith

In his references to good and bad trees in this passage, Jesus is obviously drawing an analogy to the fruit that people bear. Notice that the distinction is not between healthy apple trees and diseased apple trees. It is between fruit trees and thorns or briers; it is the kind of tree that makes the difference. Many kinds of trees look good but don't produce fruit. So it is with people. Jesus seems to be saying that a person who is not really a servant of God, no matter how good he or she seems to be, cannot possibly produce fruit for him. Conversely, someone who really is God's servant will automatically produce fruit.

The Heart Is Known Through Actions

•••••

Then in Luke 6:45, Jesus expounds on the principle he introduced in the tree metaphor. What comes out of us through our speech and behavior flows from what is within. If what is inside us is good and God-honoring, our lives will honor God. If what is inside us is evil, our lives will not honor God. No matter how hard we try to make good impressions, no one will be fooled for long if our hearts are deceitful.

The Jesus Connection


As we make our relationship with Jesus a priority, we'll find our actions will bear fruit that will please him.

Read aloud Luke 6:43-45. What can you do to store good things in your heart? In what circumstances can you bring good things out of the good you've stored in your heart? If you passionately follow God, the good you've stored will flow out to a needy world. Ask God to show you someone in your church who has a need. And then do the good thing and help that person.

Fresh Fruit Easy Prep

Use a variety of fresh fruit. Choose familiar fruit (oranges and apples) as well as more unusual fruit (star fruit, pomegranates, papayas).

What You'll Do

Greet people warmly as they gather. Open this lesson by playing a game of Name That Fruit Tree. Ask volunteers to come to the front of the room and attempt to name the tree that the fruit is from. Have participants reach blindly into a bag and attempt to determine the type of fruit from touch only. Repeat the activity until each person has had a chance to play or all items have been correctly identified. If some fruit continues to baffle class members, take it out of the bag and have it identified. If you've chosen some unique fruit items, you may need to tell class members what they are.

Set the fruit aside for the Weaving Faith Into Life activity.

Talk With Adults

Lead everyone in this discussion. Participants can find these questions in their Adult Handbooks.

Ask:

- How easy or difficult was it to determine the type of fruit in the bag?
- How did identifying the fruit tell you what kind of tree the fruit came from?

Read aloud Luke 6:43-45.

Ask:

- How does the truth in this passage connect with our opening game?
- How do we show we're Christians?

What You'll Do ■■■■■

Form groups of no more than four. Have them reread Luke 6:43-45.

Say: Though our lesson today focuses on just a few verses, these are powerful words from Jesus. Tell your group members your initial reaction to this passage, and then discuss the following questions.

Allow a moment or two for group members to share their initial thoughts, and then ask the following questions. Participants can find these questions in their Adult Handbooks.

Ask:

- If we claim to be Christians, what fruit should we be producing?
- Name examples of people who are "good trees bearing good fruit." Who are these people in our own community?
- Can you know if a tree is good or bad before you see the fruit it produces? Why or why not?
- How are Christians generally viewed in your circles of influence?
- Imagine you're a non-Christian looking at our church. How would you characterize the fruit produced by people in our church, and how does that fruit benefit those outside the church as well as those within?

Have small groups share with the class some of the questions and answers they uncovered in their discussion times. Have people reflect silently on the following question.

Ask:

Now imagine you're a non-Christian looking at you. How would you characterize the fruit you produce?

After a minute for reflection, have volunteers share how they would complete the following sentence.

Say: The toughest thing about this passage is...



How to Be a Light

What You'll Do

Have class members return to their small groups. Give each group matches and a candle in a candleholder. Have a volunteer light the candle and set it in the middle of his or her group. Turn out as many lights as possible in the room so the candlelight is visible.

Using a flashlight (if you need it), read the following Scripture passage aloud from *The Message* (Matthew 5:14-16), and then have volunteers reread the same passage aloud from other Bible versions.

Say: "You're here to be light, bringing out the God-colors in the world. God is not a secret to be kept. We're going public with this, as public as a city on a hill. If I make you light-bearers, you don't think I'm going to hide you under a bucket, do you? I'm

putting you on a light stand—shine! Keep open house; be generous with your lives. By opening up to others, you'll prompt people to open up with God, this generous Father in heaven."

After having the passage read from at least two or three translations, discuss the following questions.

Ask:

- If your relationship with God is between God and you, why do you need to be a light to others?
- Is the point of my bearing good fruit—of being an obvious light—so that others will know I'm a Christian or so that they will see God? What is the difference?

Say: A good tree will bear good fruit because it's the natural thing to do. As Christians we should live out the beliefs we claim as truth because it's the natural thing to do. ▶ ACTING LIKE JESUS SHOWS WE'RE CHRISTIANS. Why is it important to bear good fruit—to be a light? Because the eternity of others is at stake!

Have groups brainstorm practical ways to "boost their wattage" as lights that lead to Christ. This could include everything from spending more time in prayer to ending an inappropriate or "bad fruit" pattern.

Have volunteers share their ideas with the group.

Talk With Adults

Lead everyone in this discussion. Participants can find these questions in their Adult Handbooks.

Ask:

- How can you be a light when you're feeling dark?
- How will people know we're Christians?
- What does it mean to live a fruitful life at work? at home? among Christian friends? among non-Christian friends?

Offer pieces of fruit to your class members so they can enjoy a taste of the good fruit that God has provided. Ask participants to silently reflect on ways they can bear good fruit in their everyday lives and be lights to those around them.





Daily Challenges

What You'll Do


Say: In this session, we've seen how ACTING LIKE JESUS SHOWS WE'RE CHRISTIANS. Let's think about how we can act more like Jesus this week.

Have participants turn to the Daily Challenges section of their Adult Handbooks, or distribute the "Digging Deeper" handouts. Have everyone read the Daily Challenges and choose at least one to do this week. Have participants each turn to a partner and say what challenge they'll do this coming week and share the specifics of how they plan to do it.

Weaving Faith at Home

Say: If you have kids in Sunday school, they should have a take-home paper from this week's lesson to show you. It has their Daily Challenges for this week and ideas for weaving faith at home as a family. Please help your kids follow through with their Daily Challenges. If you don't have kids in Sunday school, you can still use your own Digging Deeper page to further reflect on following Jesus this week.

Finally, close in prayer, asking God to help each of you follow through on your commitments and weave faith into your day-to-day life.

Talk Topics

- If you were accused of being a Christian, would there be enough evidence to convict you?
- When have you seen a Christian friend live out or go against his or her beliefs? What happened?
- How do you let your "light" shine? Do your neighbors know you're Christians?
- What ideas do you have for how to let your light shine more? What do you want to do, or not do, or do differently?

Daily Challenges

Choose one or more of these activities to do this week.

- Memorize this week's Key Verse, Matthew 5:16. Ask God to help you shine your light before others in a way that positively reflects your faith in Jesus Christ.
- Examine your current lifestyle. In what areas do you bring honor to Christ by your actions? In what areas do you fall short? Choose one behavior that you could improve upon, and resolve to do things differently for the next seven days, submitting that area of your life to God's care and direction.
- Read 1 John 2:9-11. Set aside one evening to keep all electrical lights off and to operate entirely by candlelight. How does the absence or presence of light, both physical and spiritual, make a difference in how you function?




