


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

God Tests Abraham

Genesis 22:1-18

E verything worthwhile comes with a price. For example, everyone in your group who's married has traded a measure of freedom for a new depth of love and commitment. Everyone who has purchased a home has given up instant mobility for the sake of long-term investment. Everyone who has a child has given up sleep and independence for warm smiles and sincere hugs. When talking about obedience to God in this lesson, help people consider the sacrifices they've made that are worth the cost. Obedience to God is always worth the cost that it sometimes requires.

God Tests Abraham

Genesis 22:1-18

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

A Preface for Today's Material

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This account may seem horrifying if one doesn't study it carefully. It's hard to understand how our good God could command a parent to sacrifice a child. But if we examine the text, we can take comfort in knowing that God never intended for Abraham to sacrifice Isaac. The whole event was designed to test Abraham; it was a chance for him to grow his faith and learn about God's faithfulness.

Abraham Obeys God's Command to Sacrifice His Son

Isaac was the embodiment of all of God's promises to Abraham. However, no matter how surprised or saddened Abraham must have been, Abraham obeyed. The Bible says he set out the very next day. When Abraham knew what God wanted him to do, he set out to do it.

Abraham's faith in God and his willingness to obey are truly amazing. Not only was he willing to sacrifice his son, but he maintained faith in God's promise about Isaac. He said to his servants, "We will come back to you" (Genesis 22:5). Somehow Abraham was confident that in spite of this recent command, God would preserve Isaac, through whom God had promised to make Abraham's descendants as numerous as the stars in the heavens!

Abraham and Isaac Journey to the Place of Sacrifice

It took Abraham and Isaac three days to travel about 50 miles over rough, mountainous terrain. During the trip, Abraham had time to think. Certainly questions flooded his mind: "What if God really does let Isaac die? What will I tell Sarah? Might this God I'm serving abandon me now after all these promises?" Abraham could easily have justified disobedience in this caseafter all, this was the child God had promised to him and Sarah; maybe the voice he had heard wasn't God's after all. But whatever thoughts went through his mind, Abraham never swerved from his steadfast obedience.

Isaac Also Obeyed God

The Bible tells us nothing of Isaac's thoughts or feelings during this trip. He must have noticed that his father was behaving strangely. But Isaac showed faith, too. He submitted to being placed on the altar in obedience to God's command.

The Jesus Connection

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God loves us and he loved Abraham. God's test helped Abraham realize his own commitment to God, and the tests in our lives can help strengthen and deepen our faith, too.

How can you trust God in the middle of trials and difficulty? Invite God into your decisions and challenges and trust him to lead you no matter what the road ahead looks like. You can write your prayer below.

Nostalgic Obedience

What You'll Do

Greet people warmly as they gather. Have adults form pairs. In each pair, ask people to take turns telling stories from their childhood or youth. They'll each tell one story about a time they obeyed though they were tempted not to. Then they'll each tell one story about a time they disobeyed and suffered the consequences. Give two-minute warnings when partners should switch stories. After eight minutes, get everyone's attention.

Say: Now think of one story where you obeyed and one where you disobeyed in your adult life, and what the consequences were for each event. You'll each have two minutes per story. Allow time. Again, give two-minute warnings to switch, and gather everyone's attention after eight minutes.

Talk With Adults

Lead everyone in this discussion. Participants can find these questions in their Adult Handbooks.

Ask:

- What did you notice about the difference between the consequences of obedience and disobedience in your childhood versus your adult life?
- How does obedience look different now than it did when you were younger?
- What did your experiences teach you about obedience?

Say: Obedience isn't always easy. When you were a child, you probably didn't obey your parents *every* time they asked you to do something. As an adult, there aren't as many people you need to answer to and obey, but God still seeks our obedience. The Bible is full of commands—and a lot of them aren't too easy to do! But we need to ▶ OBEY GOD no matter what the cost. Let's look at a time in the Bible when obedience came with tremendously high stakes.

today focuses on a time God gave Abraham a really hard—and confusing instruction. Find a couple of other people to read through this passage with. As you read, look for verbs that have Abraham as the subject—basically, actions he took. Record your observations to make a to-do list for Abraham. For example, your list might begin with these tasks: reply to God, get up, load donkey.

Allow about eight minutes for groups to read and make their lists.

Talk With Adults

Lead everyone in this discussion. Participants can find these questions in their Adult Handbooks.

Ask:

- What's significant about God asking Abraham to sacrifice his son, and not something else?
- What did you notice about all the actions Abraham had to take in order to obey God?
- How many steps do you have on your list before Abraham actually picked up the knife to sacrifice his son? What can you learn from the fact that in all those steps, he never questioned God?
- What action steps do you need to take to obey God?
- Which verse do you think is the most pivotal in this passage? Why?

Say: It's amazing that the Bible doesn't record Abraham questioning God. Abraham simply obeyed God without wondering or questioning God's request. Throughout all the tasks he did to prepare to sacrifice his son, he obeyed God, moving one step closer to God's command. It's a great example of what our attitude can be when we ▶ OBEY GOD. Let's take a look at what obedience really looks like in our lives.



WEAVING FAITH INTO LIFE

Real-Life Obedience

What You'll Do

Distribute paper, and make sure everyone still has a pen. Have groups read the Key Verse, Deuteronomy 5:32-33: "So be careful to do what the Lord your God has commanded you; do not turn aside to the right or to the left. Walk in all the way that the Lord your God has commanded you, so that you may live and prosper and prolong your days in the land that you will possess."

Say: Our Key Verse describes a steadfast, focused approach to obedience—not turning to the right or left. It's the way Abraham approached obedience. But what kinds of things can cause us to turn to the right or left? Abraham's temptation would've been his love for his son—not a bad thing! But when our love for

something trumps our desire to obey God, it becomes a bad thing. So let's consider what can distract us from obedience. Draw a straight path on your paper. Pause. At one end of the path, write your name or draw a stick figure self-portrait. At the other end, write a way you want to obey God. Pause. Now draw four signposts on each side of your path—eight total. Make sure there's room to write on each sign. Pause.

Say: I'm going to read eight different topics of things that could cause you to turn to the right or left. Fill in your answer for each one on a signpost. Read the following list, pausing after each item for adults to consider their answers and write them on their signs.

- something you're proud of
- something you waited a long time for
- something you spend a lot of time doing
- something you get easily distracted by
- something you would never sell at a yard sale
- something you're passionate about
- something you'd cry if you lost
- something you've always dreamed of

After everyone has filled in all their signs, have adults return to their pairs from the first activity. Say: With your partner, talk about the destination of your path—the thing you wrote about how you want to obey God. Then consider how some of your signposts have caused you to get distracted or turn from God's commands. Allow time.

Talk With Adults

Have people get in groups of four and discuss the following questions. Participants can find these questions in their Adult Handbooks.

Ask:

- What did you discover about your own distractions from obedience?
- Are any of the things on your signs truly bad things? If not, is it really a problem that they've distracted you from your goal of obedience? Explain.
- How can we discern God's voice from others to know we're truly on the right path?

Say: Abraham obeyed God with total focus. We all live busy lives, and it can be hard to obey God. We set out on the right path, but we find ourselves turning to the right or left. The fact is, it's important to ► OBEY GOD. It might mean sacrifice—sacrifice of our own desires, our time, our money, or our popularity—but if Abraham was willing to sacrifice his son to obey God, we can make sacrifices, too.

Letters of Commitment

What You'll Do

Distribute paper, and instruct each person to reflect on today's lesson and discussion. Ask adults to write letters to God about obedience in their lives. They can write about areas where they need help with obedience and areas where they need forgiveness for a lack of obedience. Have them include several specific goals for how they want to obey

better. Ask each person to conclude the letter with a one-sentence commitment using the theme of the Key Verse. For example, someone might write, "I commit to obey God and walk in his ways regardless of how crazy it might look to others."

Talk With Adults

Lead everyone in this discussion. Participants can find these questions in their Adult Handbooks.

Ask:

- Talk about the goals you made in your letter. Why did you choose them?
- What do you think might be the challenges to following through on those goals? How can you overcome those challenges?
- What was your final commitment in your letter?

Say: Sometimes it's risky to ▶ OBEY GOD. For people who don't believe in God, simple obedience must seem strange. God wants us to obey him, not because God can get us to do crazy things, but because God knows what's best for us. Even in Abraham's case, God knew that Abraham needed to have his focus on what mattered most—God. He knew Abraham might be tempted to idolize his son, and that wouldn't be good for either of them. God knows that if we obey him, we'll be safe and in the center of his will.

LASTING IMPRESSIONS

Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

Say: In this session, we've seen what it really takes to \blacktriangleright OBEY GOD no matter what it costs. Let's think about how we can make sacrifices to obey God this week.

Have participants turn to the Daily Challenges section of their Adult Handbooks, or distribute the "Digging Deeper" handouts. Have everyone read the Daily Challenges and choose at least one to do this week. Have participants each turn to a partner and say what challenge they'll do this coming week and share the specifics of how they plan to do it.

Weaving Faith at Home

Say: If you have kids in Sunday school, they should have a take-home paper from this week's lesson to show you. It has their Daily Challenges for this week and ideas for weaving faith at home as a family. Please help your kids follow through with their Daily Challenges. If you don't have kids in Sunday school, you can still use your own Digging Deeper page to further reflect on obeying God this week.

Close with prayer. Have adults talk to God silently about what they wrote in their letters of commitment.



Talk Topics

- Why is our obedience important to God?
- Discuss a time you didn't obey God and how that impacted your relationship with God and others. Then talk about a time you obeyed God and the impact that had.
- Consider the acts of disobedience that most bother you—then take a hard look at yourself and talk about how you might disobey in those ways.

Daily Challenges

Choose one or more of these Daily Challenges to do this week.

Through journaling, reflect on a recent time of testing. Identify both the test and your response. Take an honest look at yourself, and ask if you responded with obedience. If not, consider why. What can you do to allow the testing to bring change in your life? Prayerfully write goals, and put them where you'll see them again in a month, or several months, so you can evaluate how you're doing.

DEEPER

- Each morning, read your letter of commitment, and choose one goal from your letter to focus on that day.
- Be especially mindful of God's commands throughout one full day. Ask yourself: How does God want me to drive, do my work, act toward my neighbor, handle my finances, and so forth? Say to yourself frequently, "I will choose to do what pleases God."

Through the Week

Use the following passages and questions to explore additional biblical insights about worship.

Monday–Exodus 23:22

When has obedience helped you feel more like God is on your side? What other benefits are there to obedience?

Tuesday—Deuteronomy 4:9-10

What do you need to do to be more careful not to forget God's commands? How can you help pass on a spirit of obedience to people you influence?

Wednesday-1 Samuel 12:24

What great things has God done for you? How does that motivate you to give back in obedience?

Thursday—Psalm 119:33-35

How well does this psalm match your own attitude about seeking and obeying God's commands? What would it take for you to delight in obedience?

Friday–James 1:22-25

How well are you living out what you read in the Bible? Why do we sometimes forget to obey what we read?

Saturday—Matthew 6:24


What other masters might be competing for obedience in your life? How has that caused you to disobey God?


