

Prophets Foretell Jesus' Coming

Jeremiah 33:14-16



Jeremiah Preaches Hope in Times of Trouble

This passage was written nearly 600 years before Jesus was born. The northern kingdom of Israel had fallen to the Assyrians, who had in turn fallen to the Babylonians. Jeremiah also saw the fall of the southern kingdom of Judah to the Babylonians, concluding with the destruction of Jerusalem in 587 B.C.

Despite all that was going on around him, Jeremiah's message in this passage is one of hope. Repeating nearly word for word the message he had given in Jeremiah 23:5-6, Jeremiah utters here his most important message about the coming Messiah. This King would be a descendant of David but would rule with more wisdom, justice, and righteousness than any other king had ever done. This coming Messiah would not only rescue his people from their oppressors but also reunite the kingdoms of Israel and Judah, which had been divided since the death of Solomon more than 300 years earlier.

Jesus Fulfills Prophecy, but Not as Expected

After reading this passage, it's easy to understand why people of Jesus' day expected a Messiah who would lead them in throwing off Roman rule and restoring the unified kingdom of Israel. From our standpoint in history, we know that Jesus came first as the suffering servant (see Isaiah 53), drawing people to himself through his perfect life and his message of repentance. One day, however, Jesus will return to complete his fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies and rule as king over all heaven and earth.

As we look forward to our celebration of Jesus' birth, we can also look forward to the day Jesus will return to take those who believe in him to live with him in heaven. That's God's message of hope for Christians in today's broken world!

Your relationship with Jesus is an amazing gift. And God planned long ago to give you that gift. Thank him for this life-giving blessing!

Long ago, God chose to prepare the hearts of his people with the news that a Savior would come. As you prepare for Christmas, take some time to allow God's message of hope and salvation to sink in for you. Choose to believe God's promises—and allow the wonder of Jesus' incarnation to overwhelm you. Pray about your heart's desire to live this Christmas season immersed in the meaning of God's promises. Coin-Toss Count

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Ask:

What is a prediction?

Say: When people make predictions, they think they know what's going to happen before it happens. For example, if I toss a coin in the air and say that I think the coin is going to land a certain way, I'm making a prediction. If I'm right and the coin lands that way, we could say my prediction came true.

Hold up a coin, and show kids both sides of the coin. Explain that one side of the coin is called "heads" and the other side is called "tails."

Say: I'm going to toss this coin in the air and let it drop to the floor. Raise your hand if you think the coin will land heads up. Let the children vote. Raise your hand if you think the coin will land tails up. Let the children vote again. Then toss the coin.

Say: If you thought the coin would turn up [heads or tails], you made a good guess. Your prediction came true.

Put kids in pairs, and give each pair a coin. Let kids take turns tossing the coins and predicting the outcomes.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did you decide what to predict for each coin toss?
- Explain how often you were correct and how often you were incorrect.
- Why is it difficult for people to predict right every time?

Say: When we make predictions, we don't really know if they'll come true or not.

Only God knows what will happen in the future. Today we'll learn that God always knows what's going to happen and always keeps his promises. And we'll hear how

JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. Let's hear more about that!

Jesus' Family Line

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Jeremiah 33:14-16, and show kids the passage. Say: In the Bible today, we'll learn how God made a promise to a man named Jeremiah, and that promise was for all God's people. Let's listen to what God said to Jeremiah.

Play "God Speaks to Jeremiah" (track 22 on the CD).

Say: Wow! God told Jeremiah some important things. Let's look back at what God said. Reread verse 14. God said he planned to fulfill his promise to his people. Invite children to discuss what it means to fulfill a promise.

Say: To fulfill a promise means to keep the promise. So God was saying that he'd keep a promise he made to his people. Tell someone near you about a promise someone made to you. Allow time, and then invite a few children to share their answers with your whole group.

Say: God always keeps his promises. In our Bible passage, God told Jeremiah not only that he was going to keep his promise but also how he would do that. Point out verse 15. God said, "In those days and at that time I will make a righteous Branch sprout from David's line." That meant God would send someone who was related to David—one of his children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, or great-great-great-great-grandchildren.

Invite the children to talk with those nearby about some of the people in their family lines, such as their parents or grandparents.

Say: The person God sent was Jesus. God promised to send Jesus to save everyone who believes in Jesus. And years and years and years —a really long time—after God made the promise, ▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Explain whether you think your great-grandparents knew exactly who you'd be—what you'd look like, how you'd act, the things you'd like.
- What's so special about the promise God made to send Jesus?

Say: God made a really big promise—it was a promise that no person could ever fulfill, except for Jesus. That promise can help us remember that God loves us and that Jesus loves us because ▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE.

Family Lines

What You'll Do

Say: God made a promise to Jeremiah hundreds of years before Jesus was born. He promised that God's people would be saved by someone in David's family line. Let's do an activity to help us understand what a family line is.

Have kids stand at one end of the room. Choose one child to be David, and have that child move to the other end of the room. Explain that David had a son named Solomon. Choose a child to be Solomon, and have that child go over and hold hands with "David." Have the two children stand with arms outstretched between them. Then say that Solomon had a son, and choose another child to hold hands with the first two. Continue choosing kids and explaining that each son had a son, until all kids are holding hands in a long line.

Say: Look how the person at the end of the line is connected to the person at the beginning of the line. That's how Jesus was connected to David, even though Jesus was born a long, long time after David. That's what a family line is like—a long line of people who are related to each other.

Invite one or two children to show their own family lines using children in the group to represent people in their families. Guide children to represent only one person in each generation. For example, a child might stand in as himself and then hold hands with a second person who represents his mother. His "mother" could hold hands with his "grandfather," and the "grandfather" can hold hands with the "great-grandfather" if that child knows of him.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Tell about the very oldest person you're related to.
- What do you think about God making a promise that won't happen for hundreds of years?
- Explain whether knowing about promises like that helps you trust God with your life.

Say: Jesus was born hundreds of years after David was alive. But even so,

▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. God promised that Jesus would come
and save every person who believes in Jesus. God is the only one who can make
promises like that—and we can trust him to keep all his promises. We can trust
him to take care of us and to love us always.



Righteous Branches

What You'll Do

Say: In Jeremiah 33:15, God told Jeremiah that Jesus would be a righteous branch from the line of David. *Righteous* means that Jesus would always do what is right.

Raise your hand if you've always done everything right—I mean every single thing. You've never done anything wrong, ever. Pause. We're all human, and we've all sinned, but not Jesus. Jesus is the only one who has always done everything right.

Let's make something to remind us that Jesus is righteous. Give each child a paper lunch bag. Show kids how to open their bags and crumple them so the paper becomes wrinkled. Then demonstrate how to roll and twist a bag, starting at the bag's bottom, into a twisted paper branch. Use tape to keep the branches tightly twisted.

Say: Remember how the Bible said that Jesus would be a righteous branch from David's line? These branches can remind us that God promised that Jesus would be a righteous branch from David's family tree.

Set out green construction paper, pencils, scissors, and crayons. Show kids how to use the pieces from the "Leaves" stencil to trace two leaves on a sheet of construction paper. Then have kids cut out the leaves. As kids work, punch a hole in each leaf.

Point to the names you wrote on the paper ahead of time, and say: **Jesus was a righteous branch from David's family line.** Have each child write "David" on one leaf and "Jesus" on another leaf. Be ready to help kids write the names on their leaves.







Give each child two green chenille wires. Show kids how to put a chenille wire through the hole on the "David" leaf. Demonstrate how to "knot" one end of the wire behind the hole by bending the end of the wire back on itself. Then wrap the other end of the wire around one end of the branch so the leaf dangles from the branch. Use the other chenille wire to repeat the process with the "Jesus" leaf, attaching that leaf to the other end of the branch.

Say: When you look at your branch at home, remember what God told the prophet Jeremiah. God said that Jesus would be the righteous branch that sprouted from David's family line. God made a promise, and he kept it!

I JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. Let's learn today's Key Verse as a reminder.

God With Us

What You'll Do ■■■■■

Say: God promised to save his people, and ▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE.

Open your Bible to Matthew 1:22-23, and show kids the passage. Say: Our Key Verse for today tells us more about Jesus. It says, "All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: 'The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel'—which means, 'God with us' " (Matthew 1:22-23).

That means God promised to send a savior, and he did—Jesus is the Savior of the world. And one name they called Jesus was "Immanuel." Let's say our Key Verse together. Lead kids in the adapted verse: The Lord said through the prophet: They will call him Immanuel (Matthew 1:22-23). Repeat the verse several times.

Say: It's pretty amazing that God told Jeremiah that he'd keep his promise to send Jesus and then did! Our verse says that Immanuel means "God with us." That means God came down to earth as a human person—and that person was Jesus! I'll show you what I mean.

Point to the screen you made ahead of time.

Say: Before God sent Jesus, it was hard for people to understand what God was really like. People had heard about God, but they had trouble understanding who God really was.

Choose a child to hide behind the screen.

Say: Let's pretend that you had never met [child's name]. Let's pretend that I had told you about [child's name] but you had never met him [or her]. Describe as much as you can about what [child's name] is wearing. Allow time.

Say: You have met [child's name], so you do know some things. But what if you had never met him [or her]? Tell a partner whether you think you'd feel like you knew [child's name] if you'd never talked to him [or her]. Allow time.

Have the child come out from behind the screen. Say: Jesus is God. He's God in human form. So when he came to earth, it helped the people know God even better. Seeing Jesus, hearing him speak, and watching him do miracles helped

people know God. Now that we see [child's name], it's easier for us to feel like we know him [or her] and it's easier for us to interact with him [or her].

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- What's difficult about knowing someone you've never seen?
- Explain whether you feel close to people you don't know.
- What things do you know about Jesus that help you feel close to him?

Say: God wants everyone to know him. So God sent Jesus to earth to help people understand him better. By getting to know Jesus, people could get to know God. That's what our Key Verse means when it calls Jesus "Immanuel"—it means that God is with us.

JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. And even though Jesus isn't living on earth today, when we believe in Jesus, we can be part of God's family.



Family Trees

Tips If kids don't know a person's given name, let them write the name they use to address that person instead (Mommy, Daddy, Grandpa, and so on). The name isn't as important as the idea of a family line.

Also, be sensitive to children in your class who come from blended families. Help them add step- and foster-relatives' names to their trees.

What You'll Do

Say: Just as Jesus was part of David's family, we can be part of God's family when we believe in Jesus. Let's make something to show that we want to be part of God's family.

Show kids the family tree you made, and invite them to inspect it. Point to the different family members as you explain who they are. Then give each child a Lesson 1 My Bible Fun page.

Say: A family tree is a picture that shows all the people in a person's family. Let's make trees showing your families.

Have each child print his or her name on the tree where the trunk meets the leaves. Help the children print their parents' names above their own and their grandparents' names above those. Finally, help the children print their brothers' and sisters' names beside

theirs. Explain to the kids that if they get married someday, their husbands' or wives' names will go beside their names and their children's names will go below.

After kids complete their family trees, have them form pairs. Let partners explain their family trees to each other, and then invite a few children to show their family trees to the rest of the group.

Say: Jesus had a family tree, too. God told the prophet Jeremiah that Jesus was coming and would be part of King David's family tree—just like you're part of your family tree! Because JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE, when we believe in Jesus, we can join God's family tree! Have kids add Jesus' name to the top of their family trees.


