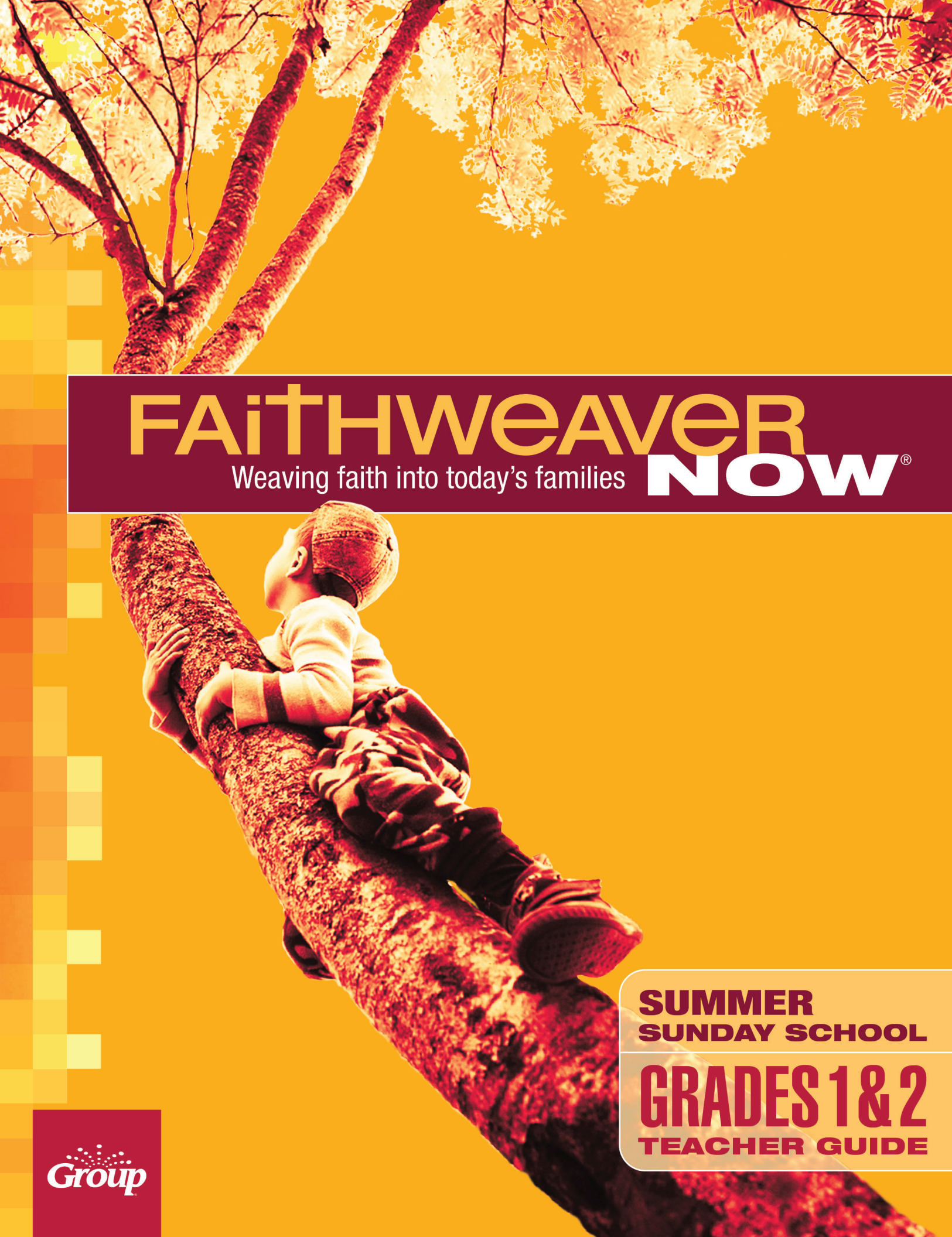

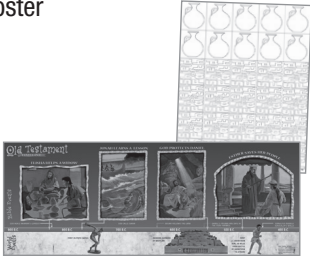




Elisha Helps a Widow and Her Sons

2 Kings 4:1-7

The basic needs of first- and second-graders are primarily taken care of by their families. Because of this, they probably don't think much about needing food, water, clothing, or a place to live. But whether at home or at church, the children in your group need love, patience, and guidance. God can use you to give these things to the children in your group. Use this lesson to show kids how to trust God to care for them and to care for needy people.

Elisha Helps a Widow and Her Sons

2 Kings 4:1-7

BIBLE BACKGROUND
FOR LEADERS

Elisha the Prophet

Elisha was a prophet who ministered in Israel during the time of the divided kingdoms of Israel and Judah. Elisha's ministry spanned the reigns of four kings: Joram, Jehu, Jehoahaz, and Jehoash. And he was even consulted by Jehoshaphat, a king of Judah.

In 2 Kings 4:1-7, it is interesting to note that the husband who died had been from “the company of the prophets.” During this time in Israel in which few people followed God, groups of people gathered to promote the worship of God, with older prophets acting as spiritual mentors to younger ones. Thus it is quite possible that Elisha was familiar with the widow and her sons.

It Seems Cruel, But...

Apparently the man who died had left significant debt. Though it seems cruel, Mosaic law provided that a creditor could force debtors or the children of debtors into slavery in exchange for unpaid debt. And even though the widow had just lost her husband, a creditor was apparently threatening to take her two sons.

The oil the woman possessed wasn't even enough to cook with. The Hebrew word for *oil* used here indicates that she had only a small flask of oil that was used for anointing, not cooking.

God's Creative Plan

God didn't respond to the widow's need by having Elisha produce a bag of gold coins that would enable her to pay her debt. Instead, knowing that they had only a tiny bit of oil, Elisha asked her and her sons to gather jars from their neighbors to fill with oil. In this way, Elisha made the widow act on her faith in God.

It would have been easy for the widow to refuse Elisha's instructions, fearing that the neighbors would think her crazy for asking for jars when they knew she didn't have anything to fill them with. But she was faithful in following the instructions that came from God through Elisha. And her faithfulness was rewarded!

The Jesus Connection

Jesus showed even more care and compassion for needy people than Elisha did. And as followers of Jesus, we can model the same care.

Having needs can lead us to greater dependence on God. How has God helped you with needs already? What needs do you need to commit to him now? Ask God for help to depend on him with your needs. You can write your prayer here.

GETTING STARTED

Fill 'Er Up!

What You'll Do ■■■■■■

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Have kids form as many groups as you have “jars” (pitchers). Say: **Let's play a game called Fill 'Er Up! Show a “jar.” Your team's goal is to get your jar filled as quickly as you can. Show a cup. Using cups. Point to the buckets of water. You'll get your water from the buckets of water.**

Have each group collect a jar and put it along the wall opposite where the buckets of water are—each group will line their jar up across from the bucket that they will use. Have each group line up between their bucket of water and their jug.

Give each group a cup, and explain the rules: The child nearest the bucket of water will fill the cup and carefully pass it down the line to the last child, who will empty it into the team's jar. That same child will bring the cup to the bucket of water, filling it with water and passing it down the line again. The team repeats this process until the jar is full.

Check for understanding, and then have kids play the game.

Talk With Kids ■■■■■■

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was the hardest part about filling your jars?
- What could you have done if you'd run out of water in this game?
- What can you do when you don't have the things you need?

Say: **It was fun trying to fill our jars with water. We'll read today in the Bible about a woman who was poor—she didn't have everything she needed, and God helped her by filling her jars with oil. God took care of her because ► GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE.**

2 BIBLE EXPLORATION

Filled Jars

What You'll Do ■■■■■■

Open your Bible to 2 Kings 4:1-7, and show kids the passage. Then help kids find the verses in their own Bibles. Say: **Today we'll read about a woman who was in desperate need and discover how God cared for her.**

Show kids the "Elisha Helps a Widow" picture on the Bible Timeline.

Say: **A prophet is a special man of God. This passage in the Bible tells about one prophet, Elisha. God gave the prophets messages to give to the people. And that's just what happened in 2 Kings 4, when a woman went to Elisha for help. And through Elisha, God helped this woman. Who do you go to when you need help?** Allow time for kids to share their answers.

Say: **Let's find out why this woman in the Bible needed help.** Play "Elisha and the Widow" (track 2 on the CD—this track ends with "as many jars as possible").

Have kids partner up. If you have more than 20 kids, form 10 groups. Then say: **Elisha told the woman to collect as many empty jars as she could. I've hidden pictures of jars around our room. With your partner, see if you can find one of the jar cards. When you find a jar card, come sit with your partner here by me.**

Give pairs time to find the jar cards. Remind partners to sit down after they've found a card. Give hints to pairs having difficulty finding cards. After everyone's found a card and is sitting down, collect the cards. Hold up one of the cards for kids to see.

Say: **You found lots of jars! And so did the woman in the Bible, even though she didn't know why Elisha had told her to collect them. Let's find out why.**

Have kids line up at a table, and give each child a crayon in a shade of yellow or gold.

Say: **Elisha told the woman what to do after she'd collected all of those jars. Listen.** Read aloud 2 Kings 4:4-6.

Say: **We can't pour real oil into these pictures, but we can color our jars so they look like they're full of oil. I'll pass each jar to the first person at the table, who will color in a little "oil" inside the jar. Then the first person will pass the jar to the next person, who will color in a little more oil. We'll keep passing and coloring until all the jars are filled with oil.** Check for understanding.

When kids understand the instructions, give the first jar card to the first child at the table. Have each child color in a little oil in the jar and pass the picture to the next child, in an

assembly-line fashion. Continue until all the jars are colored in with oil. Spread out the colored pictures on the table.

Say: **Elisha told the woman to pour her oil into the jars. Let's hear what Elisha said after she did.** Read aloud 2 Kings 4:7.

Say: **God miraculously provided all that oil for the woman to use to fill the jars. Then she could sell the jars of oil and use the money to take care of her sons. She was able to use the jars of oil to get money to pay her bills and take care of her family! Let's use our jars to get a yummy treat.**

Let kids trade their jars for treats.

Talk With Kids ■■■■

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- **What surprised you about what happened?**
- **Tell about a time you didn't have something you needed.**
- **What are some ways you've seen God taking care of you or your family?**

Say: ► **GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE.** God cares about everyone, and he cares for needy people like the woman we read about in the Bible. In fact, God cares about us so much that he sent his Son, Jesus, so that we could have a personal relationship with him. He knew we all needed forgiveness, so he sent Jesus!

Shields of Faith



■ **Tips** Be sensitive to kids from single-parent homes when discussing the word *fatherless*. Allow kids to share struggles and frustrations they may have about not having Mom or Dad around all the time.

What You'll Do ■■■■

Open your Bible to Deuteronomy 10:18, and show it to the kids. Help them find the verse in their own Bibles.

Say: **The Bible tells us how ► GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE.**

Listen while I read the Key Verse from Deuteronomy 10:18: "He defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the alien, giving him food and clothing" (Deuteronomy 10:18).

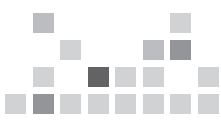

Have kids talk about the meaning of *fatherless*. Then say: **There are some kids who don't have fathers or don't get to live with their fathers. That can be very hard. But God understands how hard it is. He cares about their feelings and the things they need, just as he cared about the two sons in today's Bible passage after their father died.**

Have kids discuss the meaning of *widow*, if they know it. Then say: **A widow is a woman whose husband has died, like the woman we read about in the Bible. God cared so much for that woman that he sent Elisha to help her. God still cares for widows today.**

Have kids talk about what an alien is. Then say: **Some of you may think an alien is from outer space! But, really, *alien* can also mean "someone from another country."**

God defends and cares for all needy people. Today we heard about how God cared for a widow and her sons. Even though the widow didn't understand why Elisha told her to collect the jars, she had faith that God would help her. We can have faith that God will help us, too. God will always defend us and care for us and provide the things we need.

Let's make "Shields of Faith" to remind us to have faith that God will defend us, just like a shield. Give each child a sheet of construction paper, and help him or her cut out a shield from the paper. You can use the illustration as a guide.

Give each child a "Shield of Faith" card, and set out crayons for kids to share. Let kids color their "Shield of Faith" cards and glue them to their shields. Have kids draw pictures of food, clothing, shelter, and other things they need on their shields. As they do, lead them in a discussion about the difference between needs and wants. For example, you could ask children if they could live without food, as opposed living without their favorite toys.

Demonstrate how to cut a strip of construction paper and tape it the back of the shield as a handle. Help kids attach their handles. Then gather the kids in a circle with their shields.

Say: **Let's read our Key Verse, Deuteronomy 10:18, aloud again. This time repeat each part after me, and hold your shields up high. "He defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the alien, giving him food and clothing" (Deuteronomy 10:18).**

Read the Key Verse aloud several times, pausing to allow kids to repeat the words after you.

Talk With Kids ■■■■

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What are some ways God can care for kids without fathers?
- What are some ways God can care for widows?
- What are some ways God can care for people who live in new countries?
- What are some ways God can care for you?

Say: ► **GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE.** He cared for the boys without a father and the widow in our passage. He cares for kids without fathers, widows, aliens... and you!

I Need...

What You'll Do ■■■■

Say: Today we saw how God took care of the widow and her sons. God will take care of us, too! ► **GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE.**

Have kids turn to the "I Need..." activity on their My Bible Fun pages.

Say: In three of the jars, draw pictures of ways that God takes care of you and your family. In the last jar, draw a picture of a way you'll help needy people this week. What you draw will be your Daily Challenge for the week.

Give kids several minutes to draw. Walk around the room to offer help and suggestions as needed. For example, you could suggest that God cares for kids by providing loving family members, food, houses, and clothes. You could also suggest that kids share their bike with someone who doesn't have a bike or help their siblings with their homework when they don't understand it.

Talk With Kids ■■■■

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- How do you tell the difference between needs and wants?
- What are some of your needs?
- Explain whether you think God will always give you what you want.
- What can you do to care for someone in need?

Say: God loves all of us. He always wants what's best for us. That's why he'll always take care of our needs. ► **GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE**, like he did by filling all those jars with oil for the widow and her sons. Let's pray and thank God right now for caring for us.

Pray: Dear God, help us always trust you to provide everything we need, just like you did for the widow in the Bible. In Jesus' name, amen.

4 LASTING IMPRESSIONS

Daily Challenges

What You'll Do ■■■■■■

Say: Let's think about how ► **GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE** this week. As this week's Daily Challenge, try to follow through on helping someone in need the way you drew on your fourth jar on your My Bible Fun page.

Tell the kids how you'll care for someone in need. Kids will be more inclined to follow through on their commitments when they see you doing the same.

Talk With Kids ■■■■

Ask:

- What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Share a time, a place, or other ideas. Allow time.

Say: ► **GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE**. Let's remember how God helped the widow and her sons and follow through on our commitment to help someone in need this week.

Weaving Faith at Home

Send the letter to parents home with your kids or give it to parents when they pick up their children. This is a great way to show families they're important to your church and to support their role as spiritual leaders to their children.

Encourage kids to talk with their parents about their Daily Challenge to help someone and what they learned about God's care for people in need. Kids can also do the activities in the "HomeConnect" section of their My Bible Fun pages with their families.

Take a couple of minutes to pray with your kids, thanking God for caring for needy people. Then let each child have a chance to ask God for something he or she needs. Close the prayer after every child has a chance to share.
