David Becomes King

2 Samuel 5:1-5; Psalm 37

Most third- and fourth-graders are learning to be independent and to rely on themselves. Although we want to encourage responsibility in our children, kids must learn to rely on God to get them through tough times. Circumstances in their lives will occur that they can do nothing about, but God will help them through. God sees the whole picture where we see only roadblocks. Help your kids understand that because of our faith, we can rely on God even when things don't seem to go in the right direction.

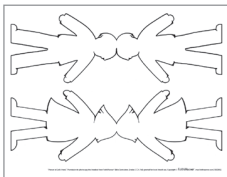

David Becomes King

2 Samuel 5:1-5; Psalm 37

BIBLE BACKGROUND
FOR LEADERS

David Mourns King Saul

We begin this quarter of Old Testament studies with the anointing of David as king of Israel. Many years earlier, Israel's first king, Saul, had turned from the Lord, and God had selected David to succeed Saul. For years after that, Saul sought to have David killed. However, David had refused to act against Saul or to become king until he was certain of God's timing. He had lived a difficult life, almost as an outlaw. Now Saul was dead; after being wounded in battle, he had taken his own life. In fact, Saul and three of his sons, including David's friend Jonathan, had died in the same battle (1 Samuel 31:1-6). So the door was wide open for David to become king of Israel.

David didn't rejoice when he learned of the deaths. Instead he and all his men mourned and wept the entire day (2 Samuel 1:1-12). David even wrote a song in honor of Saul and Jonathan, which can be found in 2 Samuel 1:19-27. He was truly saddened that their lives had ended as they did.

Uniting the Kingdom

David was made king of Judah. Israel followed Abner, the commander of Saul's army, who made Ish-Bosheth, a son of Saul, king over Israel (2 Samuel 2:1-9). After years of much fighting, intrigue, and bloodshed, Ish-Bosheth was murdered, and the leaders of Israel came to David to make him king over them.

David Leads Israel

David was 37 when he became king over all Israel. He had first been anointed to succeed Saul many years earlier, while still in his teens. After his long, patient wait, David was able to lead Israel to great prosperity, fend off the Philistines, and expand the boundaries of Israel during his reign. David wasn't perfect, but as

he relied on God, God rewarded him and Israel with prosperity.

David wrote Psalm 37, which describes his trust in God even when he was surrounded by enemies. In this psalm, David says to “delight yourself in the Lord and he will give you the desires of your heart” (Psalm 37:4). This could have been the theme of David’s life.

The Jesus Connection

Through Jesus, God showed us how to take every step of life relying on him. Because of Jesus' courage, we can believe that trusting God will always be worth it!

What past experience has God used to teach you how to rely on him?

God has a wonderful way of not letting teachable moments in our lives go to waste. What is God using to teach you right now?

Ask God for wisdom to see and strength to move forward with faith, knowing that he'll always have everything you need. You can write your prayer here.

1 GETTING STARTED

Getting There

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Have kids form two groups. The first group will form a line and link arms. This group will try to act as a roadblock to keep the other group from crossing the room. Members of the second group will individually try to go from one side of the room to the other. Try this game a couple of times, and then have the groups switch roles.

After the groups have switched roles and played again, have them play once more. But this time, add a new rule. The first group members, who have their arms linked, cannot touch or be touched by you, the teacher. Move around, and try to keep the linked group members to one side of the room so that the other group has plenty of room to get by them. Switch roles, and again keep the linked group from blocking the path of the other group.

Talk With Kids

Ask:

- Why was it easier to cross the room when I was part of the game?
- When have you ever wanted to get something done and it seemed like things blocked your way?
- What or who do you rely on to help you through frustrating times?

Say: Today we'll learn that David had some very big problems in his life that blocked his way, too. We'll also talk about why ► WE CAN RELY ON GOD, even when things happen that seem to block our paths.

2 BIBLE EXPLORATION

Obstacles Along the Way

What You'll Do

Show kids the “David Becomes King” panel of the Bible Timeline. Have a willing child read aloud 2 Samuel 5:1-5 to the group.

Say: **In these verses, we learn that David was 30 years old when he became king. He was king over Judah for seven years and six months, and in Jerusalem, he reigned over all Israel and Judah for 33 years.**

But the path to the throne was anything but easy. There were many obstacles in the way of David becoming king and wearing his crown. Today, we'll see how David—and others—relied on God to guide him through all his troubles to lift him up and finally make him king of all Israel and Judah.

Let's look back to when the Bible first introduces David. God had used Samuel the prophet to choose Saul as the first king of Israel. But Saul had turned away from God. So Saul had become an obstacle along the way. God told Samuel to go to Jesse's home to see the one God had chosen to replace Saul. Let's find out what happened.

Ask someone to read aloud 1 Samuel 16:1-5.

Say: **Samuel's obstacle was that he feared for his own life—if Saul knew what was going on, he might try to have Samuel killed. But God had a plan to help Samuel, and Samuel followed it.**

For the next obstacle, I need some helpers to join me here and be Jesse's sons.

Allow as many as want to join you to do so. You need at least four kids.

Read 1 Samuel 16:6-13 one verse at a time. When you come to one of Jesse's named sons, go to the tallest of your helpers and make a big deal over him or her, but excuse the child and let him or her sit down. Go through the verses until all the kids except one have returned to their seats. When you get to the last child standing, make a big deal over him or her as if he or she were the young David first seen by Samuel.

Say: **After Samuel's obstacle of not knowing exactly who God had chosen, David himself experienced year after year of obstacles along the way to becoming king. Some of the obstacles David faced were: He was a just young shepherd, Saul was already king of Israel, and Saul ended up hating David.**

Hold up the paper crown for kids to see.

Say: **This crown represents being a king. Each of you will get to wear this crown, but like David, you must go through some obstacles to get it. You must also rely on a partner to help you, because you'll be blindfolded.**

Have kids form pairs. Select one pair to be the first to try to get the crown. Then have the rest of the group create a human obstacle course. Some suggestions you may want to give to kids include the following:

- **Get down on all fours, and make the person step over you.**
- **Form a "tunnel" with several other kids by kneeling and creating an arch with your arms, and make the person crawl through.**
- **Stand with your legs apart, and make the person crawl through.**





Have one child in the first pair put on the blindfold. Then have the other child guide the blindfolded child through the obstacle course. When the pair reaches the end, have the child remove the blindfold and put on the crown. Then the “King” will decree one simple instruction for the rest of the group to follow. The King might suggest kids run in place for 10 seconds, do three jumping jacks, or sing a silly song. Have partners switch roles. Have the rest of the group members slightly change their positions in the human obstacle course and then repeat the activity. Do this until everyone who wants to be King has had an opportunity.

Talk With Kids ■■■■

Ask:

- What was it like to have obstacles on your way to being the King?
- How were your obstacles like or unlike David’s and Samuel’s?
- How did your guide help you get through the obstacle course, and how did you rely on that guidance?
- How does God help guide you, and how do you show you rely on God?

Say: **David relied on God to make him king. David’s path to the crown of all Israel was very hard and very long. Many troubles and hard times arose—when David probably couldn’t see how he’d ever be king. But God sees things from a different perspective. God knew exactly how to guide David to become king. David knew he could rely on God because God can guide us through all the troubles in our lives.**

Just as you had to rely on your partner to help you through our human obstacle course, David had to rely on God to guide him. And just as David did, ► **WE CAN RELY ON GOD** to guide us through all the troubles in our lives.

Who Do You Rely On?

What You’ll Do ■■■■

Have a willing child read Psalm 46:1: “God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble.”

Direct kids to the bowls of water. Give a few small items to each person, and direct them to place a toilet-paper strip on top of the bowl, resting in the water.

Say: **I want you to think of some troubles you or someone you know might face. The small items you hold will represent those problems. We’re going to see who we can rely on to help us with all these problems.**

Pretend the toilet paper in the bowl is like trying to rely on yourself to help you out of all your troubles. As you think of a problem, get ready to place your small items on the toilet paper.



Ask:

- **Do you think the toilet paper will hold the small items up? Why or why not?**

Allow kids time to think and then to place their small items on top of the toilet paper. Ask kids to try to lift the toilet paper with the small items on it.

Ask:

- **How is relying on ourselves to lift us out of our problems like trying to lift the small items with the toilet paper?**

Have kids remove the toilet paper from the bowls. Now have kids each place a piece of construction paper in their bowl of water.

Say: **Now pretend that the construction paper is like trying to rely on your friends to help you out of all your problems.**

Have kids place the small items on top of the piece of construction paper.

Ask:

- **Do you think we can lift the construction paper with our troubles on it? Why or why not?**
- **How is relying on our friends to lift us out of our problems like trying to lift the small items with the construction paper?**

Have kids remove the construction paper from the bowls. Now have kids each place the small items into a piece of aluminum foil, and then set the foil in the bowl with the water covering it. They may want to bend in the sides to create more of a bowl shape.

Say: **Now pretend that the aluminum foil is like trying to have God lift you out of all your problems.**

Ask:

- **Do you think we can lift the foil with our small items on it? Why or why not?**

Have kids lift the aluminum foil up and out of the water. Remove the bowls of water, toilet paper, construction paper, and foil.

Talk With Kids ■ ■ ■ ■

Ask:

- **In what ways is God like our aluminum foil?**
- **How can relying on other people and things let us down, the way the toilet paper and construction paper did?**
- **When faced with problems and messes, how do we know what to rely on?**

Say: **Relying on God to lift us out of our troubles and to guide us is better than relying on ourselves, our friends, or anything else. He's the only one who's strong enough to stand up to any challenge. David relied on God through all the obstacles that stood in the way of his becoming king. Let's remember that ► WE CAN RELY ON GOD to guide us through all our troubles. Our Key Verse reminds us of that, too! It says, "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble" (Psalm 46:1). Just like our aluminum foil provided strength for our items, God is our strength and will lift us up when we face problems. Let's repeat the Key Verse together.**

Lead kids in repeating the Key Verse a few times, and then close the activity in prayer, thanking God for strength in times of trouble.

3 WEAVING FAITH INTO LIFE

In God's Hand

What You'll Do ■■■■■■

Say: **We've been learning about how David relied on God through troubles. Let's read some words he wrote about that.** Read Psalm 37:39-40 aloud to the kids.

Distribute the "Person in God's Hand" copies, giving each girl a girl figure and each boy a boy figure. Have kids color the figures to look like themselves. Then have kids think of problems that they or their families are facing. Have each child quietly write these on one side of the figure.

Play "He's the King" (track 2 on the CD) as kids work. When the song is over,

Say: **God knows what each of our problems is, and wants to help us with them.**

► **WE CAN RELY ON GOD to take the problems we just wrote about and turn them into good things.**

Have kids fold the figures so they stand up. Hand out the Bible Truth Sleuth pages, and direct kids' attention to the "In God's Hand" activity.

Have kids each tape their figure to the picture of God's hand on the Bible Truth Sleuth.

After kids have finished, say: **Let's sing "He's the King" as worship to God and as a prayer of thanks to him because he holds us in his hand and lifts us out of all our problems.** Pass out copies of the lyrics.

When the song is over,

Ask:

- What does it mean to place your problems in God's hand?
- If God is a king, what can he do with your problems?

Say: **Everyone has troubles. When we feel overwhelmed by problems, we can go to God for refuge. David encountered one trouble after another on his way to becoming king. And once he was king, he faced battle after battle. But even as his problems kept coming, David knew ► WE CAN RELY ON GOD.**

What You'll Do

Say: **Let's think about how ► WE CAN RELY ON GOD this week.**

Direct kids to find this week's Daily Challenges on their Bible Truth Sleuth pages. Read these Daily Challenges aloud, and ask kids to choose one that they'll commit to this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

- **Have a sleepover at your house, and teach your friends the Key Verse.**
- **Each night before you go to bed, thank God for taking care of you that day.**
- **Each morning tell your parents that you trust God to take care of your family that day.**

Make sure you choose a Daily Challenge as well, and share your decision with kids. Kids will be more inclined to follow through on their commitments when they see you doing the same.

Talk With Kids

Ask:

- **What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Share a time, a place, or other ideas.**

Say: **► WE CAN RELY ON GOD the way David did. As we grow closer to God and rely on him alone, God makes our lives something very special. Let's rely on God by following through with our Daily Challenges this week.**

Send the parent letters home with your kids or give them to parents when they pick up their children. This is a great way to show families they're important to your church and to support their role as spiritual leaders to their children.

Encourage kids to talk with their parents about the Daily Challenges they chose and what they learned about relying on God. Also encourage kids to do the activities on the "HomeConnect" section of their Bible Truth Sleuth pages with their families.

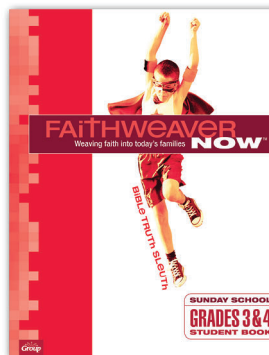
