David Becomes King

2 Samuel 5:1-5; Psalm 37



David Mourns King Saul

We begin this quarter of Old Testament studies with the anointing of David as king of Israel. Many years earlier, Israel's first king, Saul, had turned from the Lord, and God had selected David to succeed Saul. For years after that, Saul sought to have David killed. However, David had refused to act against Saul or to become king until he was certain of God's timing. He had lived a difficult life, almost as an outlaw. Now Saul was dead; after being wounded in battle, he had taken his own life. In fact, Saul and three of his sons, including David's friend Jonathan, had died in the same battle (1 Samuel 31:1-6). So the door was wide open for David to become king of Israel.

David didn't rejoice when he learned of the deaths. Instead he and all his men mourned and wept the entire day (2 Samuel 1:1-12). David even wrote a song in honor of Saul and Jonathan, which can be found in 2 Samuel 1:19-27. He was truly saddened that their lives had ended as they did.

Uniting the Kingdom

David was made king of Judah. Israel followed Abner, the commander of Saul's army, who made Ish-Bosheth, a son of Saul, king over Israel (2 Samuel 2:1-9). After years of much fighting, intrigue, and bloodshed, Ish-Bosheth was murdered, and the leaders of Israel came to David to make him king over them.

David Leads Israel

David was 37 when he became king over all Israel. He had first been anointed to succeed Saul many years earlier, while still in his teens. After his long, patient wait, David was able to lead Israel to great prosperity, fend off the Philistines, and expand the boundaries of Israel during his reign. David wasn't perfect, but as

he relied on God, God rewarded him and Israel with prosperity.

David wrote Psalm 37, which describes his trust in God even when he was surrounded by enemies. In this psalm, David says to "delight yourself in the Lord and he will give you the desires of your heart" (Psalm 37:4). This could have been the theme of David's life.

The Jesus Connection

Through Jesus, God showed us how to take every step of life relying on him. Because of Jesus' courage, we can believe that trusting God will always be worth it!

What past experience has God used to teach you how to rely on him?

God has a wonderful way of not letting teachable moments in our lives go to waste. What is God using to teach you right now?

Ask God for wisdom to see and strength to move

forward with faith, knowing that he'll always have everything you need. You can write your prayer here

What You'll Do

Start by getting students thinking about their futures. You may choose to provide (or have students bring in) old photos of students and their families. Or you may have some of your own old yearbooks on hand to help generate discussion. As students laugh at goofy pictures, share thoughts about old classmates who may have been voted things such as "most likely to succeed," "most likely to become a rock star," or "most likely to collect belly lint." Ask students to consider what things might await them 20 years down the road.

Give them a few minutes to brainstorm their own personal, zany "success" stories. Encourage even the wildest and unlikeliest ideas! Provide each student an opportunity to share his or her story with others. If you have a small group, you may have each student share with everyone; if you have a large group, you may have students form smaller groups and share their stories there. Then have students write answers to the questions on the "David Becomes King" section of their Bible Trek pages.

Talk With Students

Say: It's hard to imagine exactly how our lives will go, but today we'll look at some important keys in making sure they're headed in the right direction.

Ask:

- How would you define success?
- What are society's formulas for success? How do you recognize this?
- What role do you think God plays in our successes?

Say: Let's take a look at someone who was successful by any standards—he was a king. We'll learn his secret for a life of accomplishment and favor, and we'll talk about why WE CAN RELY ON GOD.

What You'll Do

Instead of using "The Dream" activity, show a brief clip from the movie *Cars*. Start the movie at 01:16:00, when Lightning McQueen sees Doc Hudson on the dirt racetrack. In this scene, students will see that success is fleeting and unreliable. You'll end the clip at 1:19:54 as Doc Hudson leaves Lightning in his garage.

Talk With Students

Ask:

- What did this clip teach you about success?
- What are society's formulas for success?
- Based on this clip, why are those formulas unreliable?
- What role do you think God plays in our successes?

Say: Lightning McQueen was obsessed with success. He wanted to get back to the track and win as many races as possible. But Doc Hudson had learned that success only gets you so far. In the end, you can't count on people who only care about success. But you can rely on people who care about others. And no one cares about others as much as God! That's why WE CAN RELY ON GOD.



Choose Your Own Adventure

What You'll Do

Say: In our adventures today, we have two activities you can choose from.

Adventure 1 uses campaign-creating, and Adventure 2 uses songwriting. The directions are on your Bible Trek pages. Look them over and decide which activity you want to do. You can work with the others who choose the same activity. Allow time for students to decide which adventure they want to do. You can see the summaries of the adventures below.

ADVENTURE 1—CAMPAIGN-CREATING: KING CAMPAIGN

In this adventure, students will create a campaign to highlight King David's kingly qualities. They will then discuss what qualities God values most.

ADVENTURE 2—SONGWRITING: ICONS

In this adventure, students will write songs for King David's coronation. They'll go on to discuss popular competitions on television that choose a winner based on various criteria, and they'll talk about the criteria God considers.

Say: After you finish your adventure, you'll present some of what you experienced, so keep that in mind. When everyone has finished, we'll talk about what we've learned. You have 15 minutes to complete your adventures. Move between the stations, and offer assistance as needed. Let groups know when they have about five minutes left so they can wrap up their work.

After 15 minutes, have groups take turns presenting what they experienced.

Talk With Students

Ask:

- How did David's approach to life show that he relied on God?
- Why would you say David was a good candidate for king?
- What did you learn about relying on God from David's experiences?

Say: David's life wasn't free from trouble. He wasn't born into the kind of advantages that would pave the way for someone to become something special. He had his share of down times—when he was afraid for his life, when he felt really depressed, when people thought he was a nobody. In each of those times, he relied on God for protection, comfort, and worth. As a result, God provided for him and blessed him beyond what David could have imagined. David knew that the only thing he could count on was God. He knew WE CAN RELY ON GOD. Now, let's consider how we can follow David's example.

Take a Stand Supplies

Bible ice hair dryer pawns from a board game (1 per student)

Take a Stand Easy Prep

Keep the ice somewhere it will stay frozen until this part of the study. Plug in the hair dryer when you're ready to begin.

Take a Stand

What You'll Do

Have students sit fairly close together, near the hair dryer. Give each student an ice cube and a pawn. Have students each place their pawn on their ice cube.

Say: The world is full of empty promises of what will bring success and well-being—things like wealth, fame, and popularity. As I turn on this hair dryer, call out things people rely on that really won't last. Use the hair dryer to melt the ice as students share. Aim low to avoid blowing over the pawns.

Say: There's only one thing we can always rely on: God. Set your pawn on the Bible. As I run the hair dryer, pray silently about ways you can rely on God this week. Blow the hair dryer on the Bible as students pray. Be careful not to blow the pawns off the Bible.



Talk With Students

Ask:

- How was the ice like or unlike things in the world that people rely on?
- What makes God more reliable than those things?
- Have a student read aloud Psalm 46:1. What are some ways you've seen God protect and strengthen you?

Say: The only thing that's a lasting, true blessing comes from God, found only when we rely on him completely. A close relationship with Jesus is the only thing out there that holds up forever. That's why WE CAN RELY ON GOD.

What You'll Do

Say: Let's think about how ▶ WE CAN RELY ON GOD more deeply every day!

Direct students to find this week's Daily Challenges in their Bible Trek pages and to choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:


- Find other verses in the Bible that remind you that God is always there for us and that we can always rely on him. Write them down and keep them where you can look at them when you need them.
- Think of more ways you can invite God into your everyday life. You could pray before every test, project, practice, or important event and ask God to help you through it.
- Have that conversation with the friend or family member that you know God's been wanting you to have, let God guide you with what to say, and then trust him with whatever happens.

Talk With Students

Ask:

What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Share a time, a place, or other ideas.

Say: God alone can provide the true success, worth, protection, and blessings we are looking for. As we grow closer to him and rely on him alone, he makes our lives something very special. Let's rely on him by following through with our Daily Challenges this week.


