Jesus Teaches About Commitment Mark 8:31-38

M iddle schoolers are often idealistic and may be swayed into jumping into a cause or onto a bandwagon without giving sufficient thought to the cost or outcome. That's why it's sometimes easy for them to make highly emotional commitments to Christ during rallies, at camp, and on retreats. This Bible passage will be sobering to many young believers because it's not about all the benefits of coming to their Savior but the cost of following their Lord. Discipleship requires both. Be sensitive to how this passage is being received by your students, and be prepared to answer questions.

Jesus Teaches About Commitment

Mark 8:31-38

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Jesus Rebuked Peter

The disciples were likely counting on a great earthly kingdom in which Jesus would lead the Jews in overthrowing the Romans and would place his disciples in important positions. Jesus' statements didn't go along with those expectations! Peter wanted Jesus to change his mind and forget all this talk about dying.

Peter's thinking was based on wrong assumptions because he saw things from a purely human point of view. Here we see a clear statement about what it means to follow Jesus. Too often we think of God as a powerful being who can help us advance our own agendas. Instead, truly following Jesus means listening to what he says, discovering his will for our lives, and then obediently following, no matter how attractive or repulsive that may seem to us at the time.

Jesus Challenged the Crowd

A crowd had apparently gathered to hear Jesus, and he wanted to clarify his meaning. This is not a description of what some call "easy believism." Instead, Jesus points out how denying oneself means turning away from selfish, self-protective attitudes and seeking the true humility and faith God wants to see in us.

What does it mean to take up your cross? For Jesus' disciples to each take up his own cross didn't mean just to endure suffering. It meant to accept fully the suffering they would face because of their faith in Christ. Jesus wanted his disciples to know that their faith came with a cost.

Stand Firm in Faith

As he spoke of what it means to follow him, Jesus knew that many in the crowd around him wouldn't

be followers he would recognize as his own when he returns. Our generation is much like that of Jesus' day. People who claim to be religious—or even Christian often shy away from bold witnessing for Jesus. It's easy to say you believe in God, but it's much more difficult to confess you're a Jesus-following Christian.

The Jesus Connection

Humans are willing to sacrifice a lot for the sake of those they love. Your relationship with Jesus *will* require sacrifice, risk, and loyal commitment—but it's all worth it!

How can you take up your cross? Try living out the "Joy" acronym: Pray about one specific way you'll put *Jesus* first (such as spending time with him first thing each day), put *others* second (such as washing a friend's car), and put *yourself* last (such as giving up time watching TV in order to help someone else). You can write your prayer here.

Backstage Tour Passes

What You'll Do

Welcome students, and distribute yarn, index cards, and markers. Set out a hole punch to share.

Say: You're each about to create a backstage tour pass to join the tour of your choice. It can be any tour—the current international tour of your favorite band, a tour of major sporting arenas with your favorite sports team or professional golfer, even a tour with the presidential press pool. Anybody you'd want to follow around. The sky's the limit, but you have only five minutes.

After five minutes, have students form small groups of four in order to share their backstage tour passes and tell about them, and then gather everyone back together.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why did you choose to join that particular tour?
- Who would you hope to meet on your tour? Why?
- Best case scenario, what would it be like to follow that person or people around? Describe it in a few words.
- What might you have to give up in order to follow that person or people? Why would it be worthwhile?

Say: We've got quite a selection of backstage tour passes, and you obviously think it's very worthwhile to follow along on these tours and have access to the tour stars. There was a time several thousand years ago when hundreds of people decided to join Jesus' teaching tour. But they hadn't considered the cost. They hadn't realized what it means to COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS.

What You'll Do

Instead of the "Backstage Tour Passes" activity, have students watch a clip from the movie *Shrek* that illustrates what it means to follow.

First, set up the film clip. Say: Shrek is an ogre who has been recruited to rescue a princess who is being guarded by a dragon. The princess has a very clear and romantic idea of how her rescue should go—and Shrek as her rescuer doesn't fit the bill. And he's not too interested in doing things according to her plan, either.

Start the clip at 00:35:10, when Shrek is shaking himself off after crash landing. In this clip, Shrek attempts to rescue Princess Fiona, but she protests his methods. Stop the clip at 00:37:00, when the princess says, "But this isn't right!" (Make sure to stop the movie immediately because there is a swear word coming up!)

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did the princess expect her rescue to be like? In what way did it not meet her expectations?
- Explain whether you think the princess should've followed or not followed her rescuer.
- What costs would there be for the princess to follow the rescuer? to not follow?
- How do you decide whether something is worth following?

Say: There was a time several thousand years ago when hundreds of people decided to follow Jesus. But they hadn't considered the cost, and a lot of their expectations probably weren't met. They hadn't realized what it means to ► COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS.

2 BIBLE EXPLORATION

Give Up?

What You'll Do

Make sure everyone has a Bible, and have students open to Mark 8:31-38. Give students each six pieces of wrapped candy, and tell them not to open them yet. Say: We're going to look at some costs Jesus said were involved in following him. And we'll decide whether we're willing to make these commitments. As we discuss each commitment, you'll decide whether you're in or out. If you're willing to make that commitment, you'll have to give up a piece of candy.

Begin by reading aloud Mark 8:31-32. Say: The first cost involved in following Jesus

is believing that he died and miraculously came back to life. It's a belief that might not always make you popular. What do you think are some pros and cons of believing this about Jesus? Allow time for students to share pros and cons, and then have everyone who's willing to believe Jesus died and came back to life set aside a piece of candy to show their sacrifice. Don't try to coerce anyone into giving up candy, but rather let this be a reflection of their decision on each of the following discussion points.

Next read aloud Mark 8:33. Say: Jesus also said that following him means putting God's concerns above our own. What do you think about that? Share some pros and cons. Allow time for students to discuss, and then have everyone who's willing to put God's concerns first set aside another piece of candy.

Read aloud Mark 8:34. Say: Jesus also said that we need to deny ourselves if we're going to follow him. What does that mean? What are the pros and cons? Allow time for discussion and for willing students to set aside another piece of candy.

Read aloud Mark 8:35. Say: Following Jesus also means being willing to die for him. What are the pros and cons of that? Are you really willing to *die* for Jesus? Allow time for discussion and for willing students to set aside another piece of candy.

Read aloud Mark 8:36-37. Say: If we don't follow Jesus, we could potentially "gain the whole world." That means following him might involve sacrificing some of the opportunity for power and wealth. What are the pros and cons of that? Allow time for discussion and for willing students to set aside another piece of candy.

Finish up by reading aloud Mark 8:38. Say: **Finally, following Jesus means not showing shame in believing in him. That might cost you some popularity! What else could it cost? What are the pros and cons of boldly believing in Jesus?** Allow time for discussion and for willing students to set aside another piece of candy.

Say: Well, you've considered the costs and you've made your decision. You might think that the candy you set aside to give up for Jesus is something I'm going to take. But the fact is, following Jesus gives us far more than we could ever hang on to by not following him. He's worth the cost! You actually get to keep any candy you set aside to show that the rewards for following Jesus outweigh the cost.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

Study 1

- Considering everything we've discussed about pros and cons, is following Jesus worth it? Why or why not?
- What have you personally sacrificed to follow Jesus?

Say: Most people thought the Messiah would show up and raise an army to drive Roman soldiers out of Israel. Then the Messiah would be like a king and run the country. Peter thought Jesus was the Messiah, but he was probably thinking Jesus would be the king in Jerusalem. Peter wasn't expecting Jesus to suffer and die, so when Jesus predicted it, Peter jumped in to set him straight.

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But Jesus expected his followers to follow, even if he led them to places they weren't planning to go. And then he talked about what following him really looks like. It might not sound pleasant to give up all those things, but when we ► COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS, we'll find that ultimately the costs pale in comparison with the rewards. Let's take some time now to reflect more on that.

Have students find the "Think It Over" section on their Bible Trek pages and take a couple of minutes to answer the questions on their own.

Choose Your Own Adventure

What You'll Do

Say: In our adventures today, we have two activities you can choose from. Adventure 1 uses movement, and Adventure 2 uses analogies. The directions are on your Bible Trek papers. Look them over and decide which activity you want to do. You can work with the others who choose the same activity. Allow time for students to decide which adventure they want to do. Summaries of each adventure follow.

ADVENTURE 1-MOVEMENT: JOIN TOGETHER

In this adventure, students will symbolically unite and encourage each other to follow Jesus.

ADVENTURE 2-ANALOGIES: ENCOURAGING WORDS

In this adventure, students will create analogies that will help them—and others—when following Jesus feels difficult.

Say: After you finish your adventure, you'll present some of what you experienced, so keep that in mind. When everyone has finished, we'll talk about what we've learned. You have 12 minutes to complete your adventures. While students are working, move between the stations, and offer assistance as needed. Let groups know when they have about five minutes left so they can wrap up their work.

After 12 minutes, have your groups take turns presenting what they experienced.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- What insight did you gain into what it's like to follow Jesus?
- Given what you've discovered, what's one change you need to make to follow Jesus more closely?

I'm Not Ashamed Supplies

Bibles paper pens Say: When Jesus had some not-so-good news about his own fate, Peter protested. That wasn't what he expected following Jesus to be like! When we ► COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS, we'll experience some ups and downs. But we know it will always be worthwhile!

I'm Not Ashamed

What You'll Do

Say: One of the things Jesus told Peter and the other disciples was that they needed to not be ashamed of their relationship with him. Our Key Verse has a similar message. Let's read it together. Have a willing student read aloud Romans 1:16 as others follow along: "I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes: first for the Jew, then for the Gentile."

Distribute paper and pens. Say: Paul, who wrote the book of Romans, gave one reason why he wasn't ashamed of his faith. What about you? Why would you say you're not ashamed? On your paper, write the first part of our Key Verse: "I am not ashamed of the gospel..." Then finish it with your own thoughts.

Allow a few minutes for students to write, and then give willing students a chance to share.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did thinking about the end of your "not ashamed" sentence make you think differently about following Jesus?
- What can you do this week to show that you're not ashamed of following Jesus?

Say: When we ask Jesus to forgive us and we ► COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS, he becomes our Savior. He saves us from sin. But there's a second part to the deal: He then becomes our Lord. He's in charge. That's the message that was coming into focus for the disciples gathered around Jesus. Following him was tough and costly. And Jesus didn't explain why he was taking them into such dangerous territory. The only thing Jesus wanted to know was, "Will you follow me? No matter what?" Those are some great questions for us to consider. Jesus doesn't want us to have faith only in the good times. He wants us to commit to following him no matter what the cost.

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Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

Direct students to the Daily Challenges in their Bible Trek pages, and have them choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

- Follow Jesus by taking a risk to stand up for your faith.
- Pray about any big decisions this week and journal about them, committing to follow Jesus in whatever decision you make.
- Find a partner, commit to a way to follow Jesus, and call or text each other every day to share how it's going.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Include a time, a place, and other ideas.

Say: When all was said and done, Peter and most of the other disciples took the plunge. They followed Jesus even though it did ultimately lead to most of their deaths. Let's ► COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS no matter what it costs by following through with our Daily Challenges this week.

Weaving Faith at Home

Hand out the letter to parents from the Bible Trek student books, one to each student. Also encourage students to talk with their parents about the Daily Challenges they chose and what they learned about following Jesus. Students can also do the activities on the "Bringing It Home" section of their Bible Trek pages with their families.

End the study by asking several willing students to pray for the group—that God would show all of you what it's like to truly follow Jesus and that he would help you follow Jesus despite the cost.
