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



Elisha Helps a Widow and Her Sons

2 Kings 4:1-7

When teenagers learn about or see people in need, they might experience emotions of discomfort, sadness, guilt, powerlessness, or sympathy. But because they often aren't mature enough to process these emotions, they may react in an unhealthy way. For instance, they might ignore the needs they see and focus instead on "easier" issues such as friends, hobbies, family, or self. Or they might make jokes about being in need. Help students see God's compassion for the needy.



► Bible Point
God cares for needy people.

1 FAITH CONNECTION

Step Into My Shoes

What You’ll Do ■■■■■■

Have students form a line and turn their backs to you. Use tape to attach a slip of paper from the “Step Into My Shoes” handout to each student’s back. Make sure each type of need goes on two different students’ backs, because students will later form pairs by finding someone with the same need. It’s okay if you don’t use all the needs. Then explain to the group that they all have a statement about a kind of need affixed to their backs.

Say: **I’m giving you just a few minutes to mingle with each other, asking yes-or-no questions as you try to guess what need or problem your back says you have. A hint: You want to ask questions such as “Is my need money-related?” or “Is my need a physical need?” Now, begin!**

After a few minutes, have students remove their slips and read them to see how close their guesses were. Then have students find their partners—another person labeled with the same need.

Talk With Students ■■■■

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- **What was it like to determine your needs?**
- **When have you encountered someone with a need like the one you had on your back?**
- **How was determining your need in our game like or unlike the way you determine other people’s needs?**

Say: **The needs we discussed put people in really tough situations. In times of need, it can be tempting to wonder if God really loves you or if God even exists. Well, God *does* love people in need, just as he loves all of us. Today we’re going to talk about how ► **GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE.** We’ll see an example of that in the Bible.**

Media Connection (Option)

What You’ll Do ■■■■■■

Instead of doing the “Step Into My Shoes” activity, have students form as many groups as there are smartphones among them. Then have students use the Internet to search for agencies in your area that are doing things to help the needy. Also have kids visit city-data.com and look up the poverty rate in your city or town.



Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- What discoveries did you make about the needs in our city and how they're being met?
- What are some other needs you've seen in our area?
- Tell about a time you encountered someone with a really obvious need. What did you do?

Say: People in our community—in every community—are in really tough situations. In times of need, it can be tempting to wonder if God really loves you or if God even exists. Well, God *does* love people in need, just as he loves all of us. Today we're going to talk about how ► **GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE.** We'll see an example of that in the Bible.

BIBLE EXPLORATION

I Need a Sign


What You'll Do

Hand out cardboard scraps or paper and markers. Also make sure everyone has a Bible. Say: **Sometimes when homeless or poor people need food, they'll hold up cardboard signs that say things like "Will work for food." We're going to make our own signs to depict the needs displayed in our Bible passage. If you don't find any needs, make a sign of thanks instead. For a background, understand that this was a very desperate situation. Since the woman's husband died, she was in big trouble economically. Women couldn't go out and get jobs in that day; each woman was entirely dependent on her husband's income to survive. To make matters worse, this woman's husband had accrued debt, and we're not just talking about a small credit card bill.**

Have students form groups of four and read the passage in the following sections, making a sign to depict the need in the verses they read.

- 2 Kings 4:1
- 2 Kings 4:2
- 2 Kings 4:3-4
- 2 Kings 4:5-6
- 2 Kings 4:7

Have groups show their signs to everyone else.



Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

- On a scale of 1 to 10, 10 being the worst, how bad was this woman's situation? Explain your answer.
- What are some situations in modern times that are similar to this woman's situation?
- What solutions might the woman have if this were happening now?
- How did you see her emotional and spiritual needs met at the same time as her more obvious practical needs?

Say: **Let's personalize this passage by thinking about our own needs.** Have students take a couple of minutes writing answers to the questions on the "Think It Over" section of their Bible Trek pages. Then have a few students share what they wrote.

Say: **There are three critical points in this event. First, the woman was in a very desperate situation. Situations just like hers (and even worse) still exist in the world today.**

Second, God's miracle was a private provision of love and grace, not a public sensation or spectacle. By having her close the doors and experience the miracle in the privacy of her home, God protected her dignity and showed his love in a very personal way.

And third, God used other people as part of his miracle in helping this needy woman. In the same way, God wants to use loving people today to show how

3 WEAVING FAITH INTO LIFE

Notice the Needs

What You'll Do

Say: **It can be easy to go through life ignoring the needs of others, without even intending to do so. Often when we see people in need, we look away and go on with our lives. Today we're going to set up a reminder of the real needs and challenges many people in the world face.**

Let students use the supplies to create a scene representing the lives of needy people. Encourage them to portray lots of different types of needs in their scene, and make sure students work together to create the scene.

Invite a student to read the Key Verse, Deuteronomy 10:18, aloud: "He defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the alien, giving him food and

clothing.” Then direct the students to write the verse on a piece of cardboard and set it in the scene as a reminder of God’s presence and care in needy people’s lives.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- **What needs are you representing with these objects? Why?**
- **What is the visual and symbolic impact of putting this cardboard message in the scene?**
- **How will this experience—and the impact of the Key Verse—change the way you respond to those in need? Be specific.**
- **How does the message of this verse change your view of God?**

Say: **In the midst of a need—whether it’s physical, spiritual, or emotional—it can be hard to see God. But in our Bible passage, it was the woman’s need that enabled her to ultimately see God at work in her life. When you experience needs or see other people in need, remember our Key Verse and that ► GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE. He can use our needs to point us to him.**

Choose Your Own Adventure

What You’ll Do

Say: **In our adventures today, we have two activities you can choose from. Adventure 1 uses music and art, and Adventure 2 uses nature. The directions are on your Bible Trek papers. Look them over and decide which activity you want to do. You can work with the others who choose the same activity.** Allow time for students to decide which adventure they want to do. Summaries of the adventures follow.

ADVENTURE 1—MUSICAL ART: TAKE MY LIFE

In this adventure, students will draw a prayer about giving their lives to serving God by using the lyrics of the hymn “Take My Life and Let It Be.”

ADVENTURE 2—NATURE WALK: MINUSCULE MEDITATION

In this adventure, students’ prayers of dedication will be prompted by what they observe in nature.

Say: **After you finish your adventure, you’ll present some of what you experienced, so keep that in mind. When everyone has finished, we’ll talk about what we’ve learned. You have 10 minutes to complete your adventures.** Move between the stations, and offer assistance as needed. Let groups know when they have about five minutes left so they can wrap up their work.

After 10 minutes, have all groups take turns presenting what they experienced.



Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did you discover about how you can serve God by caring for the needy?
- What discoveries did you make about the way God sees the needy?
- How does God's view of needy people compare to the way most people treat them?

Say: ► **GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE**, and he can use you to make a difference in their lives! As you give him your life, he can use you like he used the widow's neighbors to bless someone in need.

Be the Miracle

What You'll Do

Say: **How is God calling you to be a part of his care for needy people? Let's look at some ways we can be like the neighbors in the Bible and take action to help people in need.**

Set out the cups so students can see the labels.

Give paper, scissors, and pens to students, and tell them they have five minutes to brainstorm specific ways middle school students could help care for people with the needs on the cups. Encourage students to think about practical needs (such as clothing, food, and healthcare); emotional needs (such as encouragement, friendship, and guidance); and spiritual needs (such as prayer, Scripture, and developing a personal relationship with Jesus). For each idea, have students cut out a small coin shape from a piece of paper, write the helpful idea on the coin, and put it in the appropriate cup.

After five minutes, pull out one or two of the coins from each cup and read the ideas aloud.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- How are these ideas helpful for the needy people represented by each cup?
- What holds you back from reaching out to needy people?
- What surprised you about ways students your age can make a difference and show God's love to the needy?

Say: **When we see or hear about people in need, we often feel bad, guilty, or depressed. We can feel powerless—as if we can't do anything to help. And so often, we don't help. But we just discovered there are all kinds of ways we can reach out and show how ► GOD CARES FOR NEEDY PEOPLE. The widow's neighbors had no obligation to help her, but when they did, God literally multiplied their efforts. He can use us in bigger ways than we imagine, too.**



4 LASTING IMPRESSIONS

Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

Set out the coins from the “Be the Miracle” activity, and have each student select one to take home. Students will pick a coin they can commit to following through on this week. This will be their Daily Challenge. Direct students to tape the coin onto the Daily Challenges section of their Bible Trek pages.

Talk With Students

Ask:

- **What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Share a time, place, or other ideas.**


Say: **We saw the way God cared for the needy widow in the Bible. Let's remember that ► GOD CARES FOR THE NEEDY as we follow through with our Daily Challenges. We can show his heart as we serve those in need.**

Weaving Faith at Home

Hand out the letter to parents from the Bible Trek student books, one to each student. Also encourage students to talk with their parents about the Daily Challenges they chose and what they learned about prayer. Students can also do the activities on the “Bringing It Home” section of their Bible Trek pages with their families.

End the study with a prayer where students each pray one word or phrase to describe a need of someone they know. Ask God to help with the needs students named, and to use the middle schoolers in your group to help meet those needs.




