Solomon Tells of Jesus' Coming

Psalm 72:1-19

In iddle schoolers/junior highers have a lot to think about—new decisions, new feelings, new responsibilities, and new expectations. And in the midst of all this, Jesus is at work in their lives. However, students often find it difficult to see how Jesus is working in them and their situations. If things start going badly, they may become overwhelmed with discouragement or depression. This study will help students look at the great things Jesus has done and see his work in their own lives.

Solomon Tells of Jesus' Coming

Psalm 72:1-19



Writing Psalm 72

Some believe that Psalm 72 was written about Solomon and not by him. It is true that some elements of the psalm could well describe Solomon, but many elements describe a king whose actions go far beyond Solomon's capabilities. The early church believed that this psalm was written as a prayer for a king to come in the line of David and Solomon: the Messiah, Jesus. That's the approach taken in today's lesson.

The Psalmist Points Beyond Himself

Some elements of the psalm could indeed describe Solomon. He judged righteously and with great wisdom, as illustrated in the story of the two women who each claimed to be the mother of the same infant (1 Kings 3:16-28). He reigned over a prosperous kingdom, the wealthiest in Israel's history. He expanded the boundaries of the kingdom to encompass more territory than ever before. And he was sought by the queen of Sheba, who came to him bearing gifts.

However, much of this psalm points directly to the Messiah. Only Jesus' kingdom will truly extend to the ends of the earth (Psalm 72:8), and only to Jesus will all rulers eventually bow down (Psalm 72:11). There isn't a lot of biblical evidence that Solomon cared for the needy and afflicted (Psalm 72:12-14), but Jesus' life and ministry were characterized by such caring. And while the statement that all nations would be blessed through him (Psalm 72:17) could possibly refer to Solomon indirectly, it definitely refers to Jesus.

The Works of the Messiah

If Jesus is indeed the subject of Psalm 72, it is easy to answer the question: What does Jesus do? Jesus does amazing things for us! He takes care of the needy and their children, and he defeats oppressors (Psalm 72:4, 12-14). He lives forever, despite the fact that he died on the cross for us (Psalm 72:5). When he returns, Jesus will reign over the entire earth (Psalm 72:8). Surely he deserves from us the same kind of praise and honor given in verses 18 and 19!

The Jesus Connection

We've learned about many different facets of Jesus' life and ministry on earth. But let's never forget what Jesus has done for us. He is worthy of all our praise for that alone.

What's the first thing that comes to mind when you think about Jesus?

Who is Jesus to you? A teachera ministera preachera martyra savior? Concentrate on the last one—savior. Spend two minutes prayerfully considering how Jesus is your Savior. You can write your prayer here.

Choose Your Own Adventure

What You'll Do

Hand out the Bible Trek pages, and have students fill in answers to the questions in the "Solomon Tells of Jesus' Coming" section.

Say: In our adventures today, we have two activities you can choose from. Both will allow you to think some more about making predictions. Adventure 1 uses a comedy skit, and Adventure 2 uses logic. The directions are on your Bible Trek pages. Look them over and decide which activity you want to do. You can work with the others who choose the same activity. Allow time for students to decide which adventure they want to do. Summaries of the adventures follow.

ADVENTURE 1—COMEDY SKIT: THE WORST WEATHERPERSON EVER

In this adventure, students will create a skit of a weatherperson making wacky predictions about the weather and connect the process of prediction with the prophecies in today's Bible story.

ADVENTURE 2-LOGIC: NEXT!

In this adventure, students will figure out the missing items in several sequences and connect the process of prediction with the prophecies in today's Bible story.

Say: After you finish your adventure, you'll present some of what you experienced, so keep that in mind. When everyone has finished, we'll talk about what we've learned. You have 10 minutes to complete your adventures. While students are working, move between the stations and offer assistance as needed. Let groups know when they have about five minutes left so they can wrap up their work.

After 10 minutes, have your groups take turns presenting what they experienced.

Talk With Students

When groups have finished their presentations, call everyone back together. Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did the answer to your first question from the "Solomon Tells of Jesus' Coming" section shape your predictions about what Jesus would do in the future?
- How was making predictions in your adventure like or unlike making predictions about Jesus?
- How well do you think people can predict what God will do?
- What makes a prediction trustworthy? untrustworthy?

Say: The Bible is full of prophecies, which are different from predictions since they aren't just *guesses* about the future. Prophecies come from God and are always trustworthy. Today we're going to focus on a prophecy that helps us see that **>** JESUS DOES GREAT THINGS.

He Will

What You'll Do

Say: Many people in the Old Testament made prophecies about the future based on what God told them would happen. Solomon did this, and we're going to read about it in Psalm 72. This prophecy focuses on Jesus doing great things.

Form five groups. Number each group, and tell them to look up their group's passages from their Bible Trek pages in the "He Will" section. The passages are listed below for your reference.

- Group 1: Psalm 72:1-2; John 8:1-11
- Group 2: Psalm 72:3, 7; Matthew 14:13-21
- Group 3: Psalm 72:4-6; Matthew 15:21-28
- Group 4: Psalm 72:8-11; John 12:12-16
- Group 5: Psalm 72:12-14; Mark 2:1-12

Distribute paper, markers, and scissors. Say: As a group, read your two passages. Your verses from Psalm 72 will give you Solomon's prophecies about Jesus. Your verses from Matthew, Mark, or John will be an event in Jesus' life. Compare your prophecy with what really happened, and see how the two line up. Then draw a "before" picture to show what the event was like before Solomon's prophecy about Jesus came into play. Use another paper to make cut-out figures that you can hold up to make an "after" picture that shows what happened because Solomon's prophecy was fulfilled.

Allow about 10 minutes for groups to read their passages and make their pictures. Then have groups use their pictures to share in order the prophecy and how it was fulfilled.

Say: Jesus has done great things! He did them in the New Testament, and he's still doing them today. Let's read Psalm 72:17-19 aloud together in response to the great things Jesus has done. Read Psalm 72:17-19 aloud with students.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- What picture of Jesus do these prophecies create? What is he like?
- Why did the people we looked at need Jesus to do great things?
- What great things do you need Jesus to do for you?

Say: Solomon lived long before Jesus came to earth. The two never met face to face on earth. And yet Solomon knew it would be true that ▶ JESUS DOES GREAT THINGS. The same great things Solomon predicted for the people during Jesus' day can be true in our lives. Let's look at another verse that will help us understand why we need Jesus to do great things.

Highlight or flag 1 Timothy 2:5, and bookmark the page.

Only One

What You'll Do

Send a student outside the room to wait. Tell him or her that another student will come out in a few minutes and deliver a message to read upon his or her return.

Say: There is only one person here who has all the qualifications needed to go and get our friend who's waiting outside. Let's have everyone stand. If I say a qualification that does not apply to you, please sit down. The last one standing will be the only one qualified.

List the qualities of students, starting broadly and getting very specific (so that only one person qualifies). You will want to think of this person beforehand and determine a way to narrow it down to just him or her. Some sample statements include "This person is here today," "This person is a girl," and "This person has at least one sister." You will probably end it with a statement about what the specific student is wearing.

Once only one person is standing, send him or her to give the Bible to the person outside and pass along the message to read the verse that is bookmarked and highlighted. The student waiting outside should return and read the verse to the rest of the group.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- How does this verse tie in with the activity we just did?
- Based on this verse, what makes Jesus so great?
- How are our lives impacted every day because of this great work of Jesus?

Say: This particular great work of Jesus occurred in the past, but its result is also happening in the present, as people continue to approach God with confidence because Jesus offers salvation. Jesus is our mediator, now and in the future. And just as there was only one person in our activity who was qualified, only Jesus was qualified to fulfill the prophecies made about him.

Not only has Jesus done great things in the far past, but he has done great things in our own pasts and ▶ JESUS DOES GREAT THINGS in our lives right now! Solomon knew Jesus would do great things, and we can experience those things!

Great Things

What You'll Do

Find a fairly blank spot on the wall. Say: Let's see if we can fill this wall with a collage of great things Jesus has done in our lives. You have five minutes to complete this challenge. Write one great thing per sticky note, and we'll all work together to stick as many sticky notes to the wall as we can in five minutes.

Allow five minutes for students to fill the wall with a collage of the great things Jesus has done in their lives.

Talk With Students

Have students survey the wall of sticky notes, and then lead them in this discussion.

Ask:

- What are some of the greatest things you saw on the wall?
- How can you respond to Jesus in light of the great things he's done for
- How does seeing this wall give you confidence that Jesus will continue to do great things in your life?

Say: Solomon accurately prophesied many of the great things Jesus would do while he was here on earth. But Jesus' greatness didn't stop when he came back to life and went to heaven. He's still working in our lives. This wall is proof that **▶** JESUS DOES GREAT THINGS.

What You'll Do

Instead of using the "Great Things" activity, show a brief clip from the movie *Charlotte's Web*. Start the clip at 0:36:20, when the sun shines on a weather vane. In this scene, a spider weaves a message showing off a pig named Wilbur, and news of the web spreads all around the region. You'll end the clip at 0:39:47 as Fern sits on a stool.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- How did you see greatness displayed in this clip?
- Explain whether you're more like Charlotte, showcasing Jesus' greatness while staying behind the scenes, or like Wilbur, reveling in the spotlight.
- If you could weave a message in a web about Jesus, what would it say?
- What can you do to show off Jesus this week?

Say: Charlotte did something pretty great, but it wasn't to show off her own webweaving skills. She wanted to point out that Wilbur was "some pig." Solomon showed off Jesus when he wrote about the great things he would do. We can share with everyone we know that ▶ JESUS DOES GREAT THINGS.

What You'll Do

Say: Let's think about ways we can focus on how ▶ JESUS DOES GREAT THINGS every day! Instead of a Daily Challenge, keep a journal of the things Jesus does this week and try to match up each thing with one of the "He will..." statements from Psalm 72. Stop and look at your list several times during the week. Thank Jesus for the great things he is doing, and then pray in hope for a great thing you would like Jesus to do in your future.

Talk With Students

Ask:

What's a practical way you're going to keep your journal? Share a time, a place, or other ideas.

Say: Solomon journaled Jesus' great deeds even before Jesus did them! Let's look for ways ▶ JESUS DOES GREAT THINGS by keeping up with our journals this week.



Weaving Faith at Home

Hand out the letter to parents from the Bible Trek student books, one to each student. Also encourage students to talk with their parents about the journal they'll be keeping and what they learned about the great things Jesus does. Students can also do the activities on the "Bringing It Home" section of their Bible Trek pages with their families.




