God Tests Abraham

Genesis 22:1-18

The will of middle school/junior high students is constantly being tested. They are daily being faced with new choices and circumstances that require them to think about obedience and the consequences of choosing not to obey. Many of the decisions they will be making have little or no long-term effects, but as they grow older, they will face more and more serious choices that could have a long-term impact on their lives. During this study, emphasize the fact that when we live in obedience to God's authority, we gain a new kind of freedom: freedom from guilt and sin.

God Tests Abraham

Genesis 22:1-18

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

A Preface for Today's Material

This account may seem horrifying if one doesn't study it carefully. It's hard to understand how our good God could command a parent to sacrifice a child. But if we examine the text, we can take comfort in knowing that God never intended for Abraham to sacrifice Isaac. The whole event was designed to test Abraham; it was a chance for him to grow his faith and learn about God's faithfulness.

Abraham Obeys God's Command to Sacrifice His Son

Isaac was the embodiment of all of God's promises to Abraham. However, no matter how surprised or saddened Abraham must have been, Abraham obeyed. The Bible says he set out the very next day. When Abraham knew what God wanted him to do, he set out to do it.

Abraham's faith in God and his willingness to obey are truly amazing. Not only was he willing to sacrifice his son, but he maintained faith in God's promise about Isaac. He said to his servants, "We will come back to you" (Genesis 22:5). Somehow Abraham was confident that in spite of this recent command, God would preserve Isaac, through whom God had promised to make Abraham's descendants as numerous as the stars in the heavens!

Abraham and Isaac Journey to the Place of Sacrifice

It took Abraham and Isaac three days to travel about 50 miles over rough, mountainous terrain. During the trip, Abraham had time to think. Certainly questions flooded his mind: "What if God really does let Isaac die? What will I tell Sarah? Might this God I'm serving abandon me now after all these promises?" Abraham could easily have justified disobedience in this caseafter all, this was the child God had promised to him and Sarah; maybe the voice he had heard wasn't God's after all. But whatever thoughts went through his mind, Abraham never swerved from his steadfast obedience.

Isaac Also Obeyed God

The Bible tells us nothing of Isaac's thoughts or feelings during this trip. He must have noticed that his father was behaving strangely. But Isaac showed faith, too. He submitted to being placed on the altar in obedience to God's command.

The Jesus Connection

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God loves us and he loved Abraham. God's test helped Abraham realize his own commitment to God, and the tests in our lives can help strengthen and deepen our faith, too.

How can you trust God in the middle of trials and difficulty? Invite God into your decisions and challenges and trust him to lead you no matter what the road ahead looks like. You can write your prayer below.

What You'll Do


Have students form groups of five or six.

Ask:

- Do you generally follow directions or obey rules? Why or why not?
- How do you react when you don't agree with a rule or set of directions?

Distribute a piece of paper and scissors to each student. Say: Just about everything we do in life involves rules or directions that we need to follow. Let's do an experiment involving following directions. Follow my directions exactly-even though you don't know what you're making. As you read the following directions aloud, act very bossy and gruff. Use the diagram to help students if they're unsure what to do, but act bossy even as you help.

- Step 1: Fold the paper diagonally until it touches the other side, and cut off the excess. Unfold the paper to show a square.
- Step 2: Fold the paper in half both ways, and unfold it to show the square.
- Step 3: Fold each corner into the center point made by the folds.
- Step 4: Holding the paper like a diamond, fold the top two edges of the diamond into the center line.
- Step 5: Fold the bottom corner up, folding along the bottom of the triangles you just made.
- Step 6: Fold the lower corners of the triangle into the center.
- Step 7: Fold the bottom up about an inch. Then fold half of that inch back down onto itself.
- Step 8: Fold the top point down about an inch.

When everyone is done, have students place their origami shapes folded-side down on a hard surface and make them hop by pressing on the backs.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- How well were you able to follow my directions, even though you didn't know the end result?
- How willing were you to follow my directions?
- Did you want to do things your own way rather than what I was instructing you to do? Why or why not?

Say: God has given us some specific instructions as to how we are to live. It's up to us to decide whether to follow them or not—but we can be sure the end result is worth it. Today we'll look at a man in the Bible who got an unbelievably hard instruction from God. As with our origami, he didn't know how things would end if he obeyed. We'll explore his obedience and how we can ▶ OBEY GOD.

What You'll Do

Instead of the "Who's the Boss?" activity, watch a clip from the movie *Despicable Me* to lead into a discussion about rules. Start the clip at 00:32:54, when Gru says, "As you can see, I have provided everything a child might need." In this clip, Gru lays some ground rules for the three girls he's just taken into his care. End the clip at 00:34:15, when Agnes sticks her face in the candy bowl.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did you think about Gru's rules?
- What are some rules you have to follow that you think are too strict or don't make sense?
- Why is it important to obey even when you don't understand a rule?

The Big Picture

Easy Prep

Say: Gru's rules may have been pretty over the top. He clearly wasn't ready to take care of kids! But God's rules for us are important to follow—even if they don't make sense to us at the time. Today we'll look at a man in the Bible who got a seemingly nonsensical instruction from God. We'll explore his obedience and how we can \blacktriangleright OBEY GOD.

BIBLE EXPLORATION

The Big Picture

What You'll Do

Hand out a marker and a piece of paper to each student. Ask students to each draw a picture of the person who is most precious to them. This can be a parent, sibling, grandparent, or friend. Let them know they won't be required to show the pictures to anyone.

After they've completed their drawings, have students form groups of four or five. Make sure each group has a Bible. Invite them to share words or phrases that explain why the people they drew are precious to them. Then have each group read Genesis 22:1-2. Say: **We're on our way to destroy our pictures. If you're willing to do that, bring your picture with you.** Have each group read Genesis 22:3-7. Then lead students to where the scissors are. Say: **It's time to gather our supplies to destroy our pictures. Go ahead and get a pair of scissors.** Allow time.

Read aloud Genesis 22:8, and have groups discuss whether this verse shows obedient faith or a hidden unwillingness to obey.

Say: Okay, it's time to destroy the pictures of people we care most about. Scissors up! Just as students are about to start cutting, tell them to stop and put the scissors down. Then have groups read Genesis 22:9-14.

Talk With Students

Lead everyone in this discussion.

Ask:

- What would it take for you to truly believe God wanted you to hurt someone you love?
- What do you think about God even asking Abraham to do this? What was the point?
- Did Abraham do the right thing or the wrong thing? Defend your answer.

Say: We don't know what would've happened to Isaac if Abraham had disobeyed. But he did obey God, and God blessed him for that. After the verses we just read, God told Abraham that he would be blessed and have many descendants—and

they'd all be blessed, too. He certainly wouldn't have gotten that promise without his faithful obedience.

To think more about Abraham's obedience—and our own—let's consider the questions on the "Think It Over" section of our Bible Trek pages. Distribute the Bible Trek pages and pens, and allow time for students to write answers to the questions in the "Think It Over" section.

Say: Abraham had waited many, many years for a son. Isaac had been born when Abraham was very old. Isaac was someone Abraham loved very much, but he was also a dream come true. By obeying God's very strange command, he showed that obedience to God was more important than his dreams or the people he loved. Sometimes it takes sacrifice to > OBEY GOD, but he deserves first priority in our lives.



3 WEAVING FAITH **INTO LIFE**

Choose Your Own Adventure

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What You'll Do

Say: In our adventures today, we have two activities you can choose from. Adventure 1 uses brainstorming, and Adventure 2 uses reflection. The directions are on your Bible Trek papers. Look them over and decide which activity you want to do. You can work with the others who choose the same activity. Allow time for students to decide which adventure they want to do. Summaries of each adventure follow.

ADVENTURE 1-BRAINSTORMING: RULES OF THE ROAD

In this adventure, students will discuss the rules of driving and the consequences of not following those rules.

ADVENTURE 2-REFLECTION: MY SACRIFICE

In this adventure, students will reflect on areas of disobedience in their lives.

Say: After you finish your adventure, you'll present some of what you experienced, so keep that in mind. When everyone has finished, we'll talk about what we've learned. You have 10 minutes to complete your adventures. While students are working, move between the stations, and offer assistance as needed. Let groups know when they have about two minutes left so they can wrap up their work.

After 10 minutes, have your groups take turns presenting what they experienced.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- What are some negative consequences you've faced for disobeying? What about positive consequences for obeying?
- Do you have to know "why" before you are able to obey? Explain.
- God has a plan for all of us. Are you able to trust God even though you might not understand the reason behind some of God's commandments? Why or why not?

Say: God created us and knows us better than anyone else does. God also loves us more than anyone else does and wants the best for us. He even wanted the best for Abraham when he asked him to sacrifice his son. God's commands are always for the best—even if they don't make sense to us or require us to make sacrifices. That's why we ▶ OBEY GOD.

Keep Your Eyes on the Goal

What You'll Do

Make sure students all have Bibles, and have them look up the Key Verse, Deuteronomy 5:32-33.

Say: Listen closely as I read the words, and follow along in your Bibles because you'll need to be able to recite at least part of the Key Verse for this activity: "So be careful to do what the Lord your God has commanded you; do not turn aside to the right or to the left. Walk in all the way that the Lord your God has commanded you, so that you may live and prosper and prolong your days in the land that you will possess."

Give students a few minutes to read over and memorize the Key Verse. If they are having a hard time, suggest that they focus on the first sentence. As they do, make a masking tape line all the way across your room.

Have one student stand at one end of the masking tape line. Stand at the other end with the candy. Have the rest of the students stand along the sides of the line. Explain that one by one, each person is to look directly at you and walk straight to you without looking at anything but the candy you're holding. As the student walks toward it, he or she is to also recite the first sentence of the Key Verse over and over.

While each person is trying to reach the prize, everyone else will try to cause a distraction. Students can do anything they want—make faces, make noises, jump around—as long as they don't touch the person walking on the path. If a student walking the path takes his or her eyes off the candy or veers off the tape, the student should start over and try again. However, if a student makes it to you completely focused and without falling off the tape line, he or she can get a piece of candy.

Play the game until everyone has received a prize.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- Was it hard to keep your eyes fixed on the prize?
- What are some everyday situations or issues that can cause you to "turn aside to the right or to the left" instead of following God's path for you?
- How does Abraham's situation relate to the message of our Key Verse?

Say: Even though Abraham's own desires and love could've distracted him, he obeyed God's command and kept his eye on what God wanted. Throughout our lives, there are going to be things that come along that distract us from the plan God has for our lives. It's up to us to ► OBEY GOD and stay on his path.

Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

Direct students to the Daily Challenges in their Bible Trek pages and have them choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

- Risk shocking your parents, and do exactly what they tell you to do, right when they ask you, as practice for obeying God.
- Pray every time you do a chore or household task for God to teach you more ways to obey.
- Consider something you thought about sacrificing today as an act of obedience to God. Give up that thing this week.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Include a time, a place, and other ideas.

Say: God tested Abraham with a very difficult command, and Abraham obeyed. Let's ► OBEY GOD this week by following through with our Daily Challenges.


