Prophets Foretell Jesus' Coming

Jeremiah 33:14-16

Because early adolescents are on a roller coaster trying to figure out who they are and how they fit in the world, they tend not to be the most reliable people. This can mean a lot of broken promises in their lives, both promises they've made and promises they've received. Broken promises can easily lead to broken hearts as feelings of betrayal or guilt weigh them down. Use this study to encourage your students that God will always be faithful to them, God will always keep his promises, God will love and forgive them no matter how many promises they've kept or broken, and God can even help them keep their promises.



► Bible Point

Jesus fulfilled God's promise.

Key Verse

"All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: 'The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel'—which means, 'God with us'" (Matthew 1:22-23).

Prophets Foretell Jesus' Coming

Jeremiah 33:14-16

BIBLE BACKGROUND
FOR LEADERS

Jeremiah Preaches Hope in Times of Trouble

This passage was written nearly 600 years before Jesus was born. The northern kingdom of Israel had fallen to the Assyrians, who had in turn fallen to the Babylonians. Jeremiah also saw the fall of the southern kingdom of Judah to the Babylonians, concluding with the destruction of Jerusalem in 587 B.C.

Despite all that was going on around him, Jeremiah's message in this passage is one of hope. Repeating nearly word for word the message he had given in Jeremiah 23:5-6, Jeremiah utters here his most important message about the coming Messiah. This King would be a descendant of David but would rule with more wisdom, justice, and righteousness than any other king had ever done. This coming Messiah would not only rescue his people from their oppressors but also reunite the kingdoms of Israel and Judah, which had been divided since the death of Solomon more than 300 years earlier.

Jesus Fulfills Prophecy, but Not as Expected

After reading this passage, it's easy to understand why people of Jesus' day expected a Messiah who would lead them in throwing off Roman rule and restoring the unified kingdom of Israel. From our standpoint in history, we know that Jesus came first as the suffering servant (see Isaiah 53), drawing people to himself through his perfect life and his message of repentance. One day, however, Jesus will return to complete his fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies and rule as king over all heaven and earth.

As we look forward to our celebration of Jesus' birth, we can also look forward to the day Jesus will return to take those who believe in him to live with him in heaven. That's God's message of hope for Christians in today's broken world!

The Jesus Connection

Your relationship with Jesus is an amazing gift. And God planned long ago to give you that gift. Thank him for this life-giving blessing!

Long ago, God chose to prepare the hearts of his people with the news that a Savior would come. As you prepare for Christmas, take some time to allow God's message of hope and salvation to sink in for you. Choose to believe God's promises—and allow the wonder of Jesus' incarnation to overwhelm you. Pray about your heart's desire to live this Christmas season immersed in the meaning of God's promises. 1 FAITH CONNECTION

Heads or Tails?

What You'll Do ■■■■■■

Have students form pairs. Give each pair a coin and a pen. Also distribute this week's Bible Trek pages, and have students find the “Heads or Tails?” section. Say: **We're going to play a guessing game. In the next five minutes, flip your coin as many times as you can. Before each flip, write on your Bible Trek page a guess of how it will land—heads or tails. Then flip the coin, and note whether you were right or wrong.**

After five minutes, have pairs compare how many correct guesses they had.

Talk With Students ■■■■

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- Explain whether you tried to use any logic to make your guesses.
- What's something in your life you wish you could accurately predict the outcome of?
- Today we're going to learn about prophecy. How is prophecy like or unlike guessing how a coin will land?

Say: **Prophecy might seem a lot like really good guesswork or psychic powers. But it's not. Prophecy is God speaking to us through people. Prophets didn't have to guess what would happen—they just repeated what God said. Often this was about things that would happen in the future, but it wasn't a guess because God knew! Sometimes God made promises through the prophets, and that's what we'll explore today—how ► JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE.**

Say: **To think more about promises—let's consider the questions in the “Think It Over” section of our Bible Trek pages.** Have students write answers to the questions in the “Think It Over” section.

What You'll Do

Instead of doing the “Heads or Tails?” activity, watch a clip from *It Could Happen to You*. Set up the clip by saying: **In this movie, Charlie was a customer at a restaurant and realized he couldn't pay the tip. He promised the waitress he'd come back and give her half of his winnings if he won the lottery. He didn't expect he'd win—but he did! We'll see what happened when he went back to the restaurant.** Begin the clip at 00:25:39, when Charlie says, “About our little agreement.” In this clip, Charlie gives the waitress a choice between him keeping his promise or doubling her current tip. Not knowing that he won the lottery, she picks that anyway, and ends up with half of his \$4 million winnings. End the clip at 00:30:01, when Yvonne and Charlie hug.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- Do you think Charlie really had to keep his promise? Explain.
- Tell about a promise you wish you hadn't made.
- How big a deal is it to keep a promise?

Say: **People make promises a lot. Sometimes they don't think they'll *really* have to follow through, just as Charlie thought when he made his promise. And sometimes, unlike Charlie, people don't follow through on their promises. But God always does. Today we'll explore some promises he made through the prophet Jeremiah and consider how ► JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE.**

To think more about promises, let's consider the questions in the “Think It Over” section of our Bible Trek pages. Distribute the Bible Trek pages and pens, and have students write answers to the questions in the “Think It Over” section.

BIBLE EXPLORATION

Choose Your Own Adventure

What You'll Do

Say: **In our adventures today, we have two activities you can choose from. Adventure 1 uses analysis, and Adventure 2 uses painting. The directions are on your Bible Trek papers. Look them over and decide which activity you want to do. You can work with the others who choose the same activity.** Allow time for students to decide which adventure they want to do. Summaries of each adventure follow.

ADVENTURE 1—ANALYSIS: WHAT'S IN A PROMISE?

In this adventure, students will analyze the promises in the Bible passage.

ADVENTURE 2—PAINTING: PROMISING ARTISTS

In this adventure, students will create artwork to help them understand the promises in the Bible passage.

Say: **After you finish your adventure, you'll present some of what you experienced, so keep that in mind. When everyone has finished, we'll talk about what we've learned. You have 20 minutes to complete your adventures.** While students are working, move between the stations, and offer assistance as needed. Let groups know when they have about five minutes left so they can wrap up their work.

After 20 minutes, have your groups take turns presenting what they experienced.

Talk With Students ■■■■

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about the way God fulfilled his promises?
- In what ways might Jesus have been like or unlike what you'd expect based on God's promises?
- Unlike Jeremiah, we can look *back* at when Jesus was born. What does it mean to you that Jesus came to earth?

Say: **Sometimes when we get caught up in everyday problems and busyness, we can lose focus on what a miracle it is that ► JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. Because of Jesus, we can trust in God's goodness. We can believe that God is with us. Let's consider that further.**

3 WEAVING FAITH INTO LIFE

My Promise

What You'll Do ■■■■

Say: **God's promises in Jeremiah weren't just for the Israelites back then. The promises we read today were about Jesus—and Jesus is for everyone! Let's consider how these promises apply to our lives.**

Have students spread out and get somewhere comfortable where they can reflect without distraction.

Say: **As I read our Bible passage again, listen for a line that jumps out at you as a promise for you.** Read aloud Jeremiah 33:14-16.

Allow about a minute for silent reflection, and then read the promises below along with the following points to reflect on.

- **God will do what is just and right. How has he done that for you? How do you wish he would do that for you?** (Pause for reflection.)
- **God promised to save Judah and give safety to Jerusalem. How has God kept you safe? In what areas do you feel unsafe?** (Pause for reflection.)
- **God called Jesus “The Lord Our Righteous Savior.” How has Jesus’ role as Savior made a difference in your life?** (Pause for reflection.)
- **In the Key Verse, Matthew 1:22-23, Jesus is called Immanuel—God with us. How have you experienced God’s presence? How would you like to experience his presence?** (Pause for reflection.)

Talk With Students

Lead everyone in this discussion.

Ask:

- **Explain which promise means the most to you.**
- **Which of these promises (if any) does it seem as if God isn’t keeping? How can you trust in God even when it feels as if God isn’t keeping his promises?**
- **What will you do this week to appreciate God’s promises fulfilled in Jesus?**

Say: It took a really long time for God to fulfill his promises by sending Jesus. We know ► **JESUS FULFILLED GOD’S PROMISE**, but there were a lot of people who were born and died between when Jeremiah made this prophecy and when Jesus was born. Sometimes it might seem as if God isn’t keeping his promises. But we can trust that in the end, he is faithful to keep all his promises. And in the meantime, we can trust that Jesus is God with us—no matter what we face.

Make or Break

What You’ll Do

Have students each fold a piece of paper in thirds. Provide pens.

Say: **Think of three promises people have made to you: one promise that was fulfilled, one promise that was broken, and one promise that has not yet been fulfilled or broken. In each of the three columns you created on your paper, draw or write something to show how you feel about these promises and the people who made them.**

Remind your students not to mention names or specific circumstances that others will easily identify. Gossip is always a temptation and can quickly sidetrack the study. Help students concentrate on their feelings and responsibility rather than on what this or that person did or didn’t do to hurt them.

After a few minutes, ask students to form small groups and share what they wrote or drew.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- Which column do you have the strongest feelings about? Why?
- In which of the three columns would you put God based on what we've explored today? Explain.
- In what way is Jesus a better or worse fulfillment of God's promises than people might have expected?

Say: **How we treat the promises we make can greatly affect the relationships we have with others. God made a promise to his people—including us—in Jeremiah. And when Jesus came, ► JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. We can trust that God will never fall into that "broken promises" column—and Jesus is a reason to hang on to that faith!**

What You'll Do

Direct students to the Daily Challenges in their Bible Trek pages and have them choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

- **Make or buy a simple Christmas decoration to give away. Explain to the person you give it to what it means to you that Jesus fulfilled God's promise.**
- **Before bedtime three nights this week, spend five minutes sketching a picture of one time that day you knew God was with you.**
- **Make a list of any promises you've made (at least three!), and do what you can to fulfill them.**

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

- **What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Include a time, a place, and other ideas.**

Say: **At the time Jeremiah prophesied, things were not great for the Israelites. And they were about to get worse! But God made a promise to them, and ► JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE and became God with us. Let's appreciate God's promise fulfilled this week by following through with our Daily Challenges.**



Weaving Faith at Home

Hand out a letter to parents from the Bible Trek student books, one to each student. Also encourage students to talk with their parents about the Daily Challenges they chose and what they learned about Jesus. Students can also do the activities on the “Bringing It Home” section of their Bible Trek pages with their families.

Talk to your Director about emailing the FREE FamilyConnect to all your church’s families! Available at group.com/digital.

Close with prayer. Have students fill in the end of the prayer with places they go or things they experience. Pray: **Dear Jesus, thank you that you are God with us. Thank you that you are with us when...** (allow time for students to respond). **In your name, amen.**

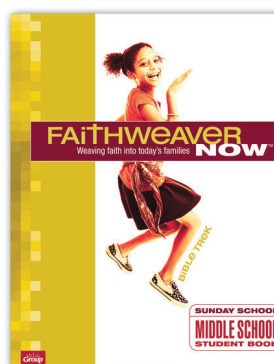
