"I did not want just the few, the missionary-minded people like the Salvation Army, to be kind to the poor, as the poor. I wanted everyone to be kind. I wanted every home to be open to the lame, the halt and the blind."

—Dorothy Day, *The Long Loneliness*

- Explain whether you admire Dorothy Day's choice to become poor?
- Do you think giving up everything to care for the poor is required of Christians?
- What are some ways our family can care for needy people?

Dorothy Day was a journalist whose life was changed by Christ. She purposefully chose to live among the poor—to become poor herself. She was a living example of Jesus' comment to the rich man in Matthew 19:21: "Go, sell your possessions and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me."

Instead of choosing a Daily Challenge this week, pick one of the coins from the "Be the Miracle" activity. Tape it here, and commit to following through on your coin this week.

Grab a calculator and figure out how much money your family spends for groceries for a dinner at home. Then plan to fast for a meal as a family. Plan to use the money you'd normally spend on that meal to help someone in need. Gather around the table at dinner time to just drink water or juice, and spend the time deciding as a family how you'd like to use the money to make a difference in a needy person's life.

Friday/JAMES 1:27-2:4 • How can you care for people in crisis situations? How can you keep from showing favoritism to those who are rich, popular, or powerful?

Saturday/ACTS 4:32-35 • How did the early church help the needy? What are practical ways you can follow its example?

Elisha Helps a Widow and Her Sons MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDY 1 2 Kings 4:1-7

BIBLE POINT: God cares for needy people.

KEY VERSE: "He defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the alien, giving him food and clothing"—Deuteronomy 10:18.

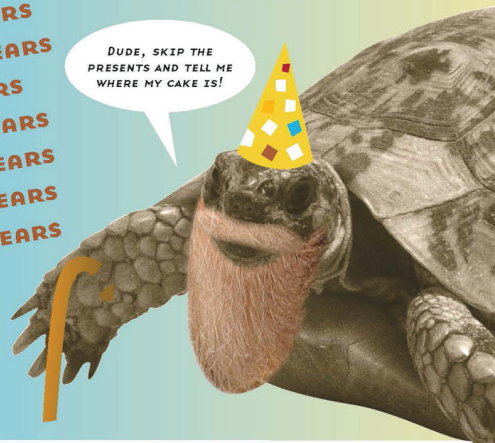

ADVENTURE 2

MiniS CuLE mEDiTaTiOn

Here's What You Need to Do...

1. TO START OFF...

Say hi to the other people in your group. Then, with your group, follow the rest of the instructions for your adventure!

2. READY, GET SET...

Go outside with your group, and get ready to take a nature walk. Or, if the weather is bad, take a walk in the area your leader



directs you to. Here's the twist: You need to lean down close to the ground as you walk. (You can even crawl if you want!) Your job is to take time to notice all the small, unnoticed things you usually ignore: pebbles, bugs, blades of grass, pennies, paper clips, gum wrappers, carpet fibers, and so on.

3. Go!

Take five minutes to silently walk (or crawl!) and observe the little, often-unnoticed things. Silently meditate (have a conversation with God) about what you observe. Think about these questions on your own, and then discuss as a group:

- How are needy people often unnoticed and overlooked by society?
- What thoughts do you have about how lonely people are—how invisible they must

you've both shared, discuss these questions:

- **How were you challenged as you drew your self portrait?**
- **How can you practically use your hands, your feet, your voice, your words, or your money to help needy people?**

5. DON'T JUST SAY IT, PRAY IT.

After everyone has finished chatting, get back together and read the song lyrics as a prayer together, while holding your drawings.

Here's the key: Don't just say it, *pray* it. Read the words to God as if you're talking directly to him. Think about each phrase as you say it. Then decide how to present your prayers to the other group.

Wrap up your time of meditation with God by silently praying this prayer:

God, forgive me for ignoring the needs all around me. Open my eyes to see the needy people in my life, in my community, and in my world. Open my ears to hear their cries for help. Open my hands that I might give them resources, work, or time. Open my heart to care for needy people as you do. I'm so glad

you notice. I'm so glad you care. Help me show your love to needy people this week as I...[pray to God about your ideas for addressing needs that are ignored].
Amen.
