Jesus Teaches His Disciples to Pray

Matthew 6:5-13



► Bible Point

We pray to God.

Key Verse

“This, then, is how you should pray: ‘Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one’ ”
(Matthew 6:9-13).

How Not to Pray

This passage begins with Jesus instructing his followers how *not* to pray. The religious leaders of that time were accustomed to praying loudly on the street corners so that the people would see them as holy and religious. Instead, Jesus says, prayer is to be between the individual and God—sincere communication that is a direct result of one’s relationship with God.

Two Basic Parts

Jesus gives this prayer as a pattern or a form—an outline for prayer. One way to understand it better is to break his prayer into two basic parts: adoration and petition.

The first verse of the Lord’s Prayer expresses praise for God’s majesty and acknowledges God’s love for us. The single word we translate as “our father” is an intimate word that can be translated as “daddy” or “dearest father.” Jesus lets his followers know that they can share in his close relationship with God.

The first petition in the prayer is not related to personal needs. Rather, it addresses seeking what God wants.

After we seek God’s will, we turn to asking God to fulfill personal, daily needs for food, forgiveness, and freedom from temptation. Without God working in our lives and our world, there would be no food or forgiveness. And if Satan were not restricted from tempting us, our lives would be nearly unbearable.





BIBLE BACKGROUND

Putting God First

Remember that Jesus insisted on putting God first. If God isn't first in our lives, as well as in our prayers, God will not be honored, no matter how eloquently we pray.



**WEAVING FAITH
INTO FAMILIES**

Read Matthew 6:5-13 and think about your prayers. Are you comfortable talking with God, or do your prayers sometimes seem shallow and done out of habit? Do you shoot prayers up throughout the day, or pray only when you're in need?

The way you pray with your children provides an important model they will follow. What are you teaching them as they observe you? Fortunately, God didn't leave us wondering how to pray, and has shown us that we can have intimate conversations with him. Ask God to help you be a good example of how to pray—an example that would lead your kids into a growing friendship with their Creator.

Insight for Parents

As an option, you may want to create a family prayer box to accompany this activity. It can be as simple as a small, gift-wrapped box with an opening for slips of paper. Write several phrases from the Lord's Prayer on slips of paper, such as "Our Father," "hallowed be your name," "your kingdom come," and "forgive us our debts." Ask your children what those words mean, and help them come up with definitions they can understand.

On the back of the slips of paper, have each person write a prayer request and place them in a basket or small box. Let each person draw out a paper that belongs to another family member, and take turns praying for each other.

Faith Talk Starter

At the end of the day, talk with your children about the events that happened throughout the day. Encourage each person to share a "high" and a "low" from the day. For example, a high might be getting picked first for the soccer team and a low might be a bad grade on a test. Then encourage your kids to talk about what they think prayer is, what it looks and sounds like, and when they should pray. Remind your children that prayer is a conversation with God where we listen to God and talk to him. Explain that just as you talked to each of them about their days and listened to what they had to say, God wants to hear about every detail of our days and wants us to listen to him, as well.

Prayer Starter

Pray that your kids would come to know God as a tender Father and friend who wants to hear about every aspect of their lives, and know they can talk to him anytime.

WEEK 13	Paul Teaches in Athens (Acts 17:16-31)	"Do you not know? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth" (Isaiah 40:28).	God created heaven and earth.
