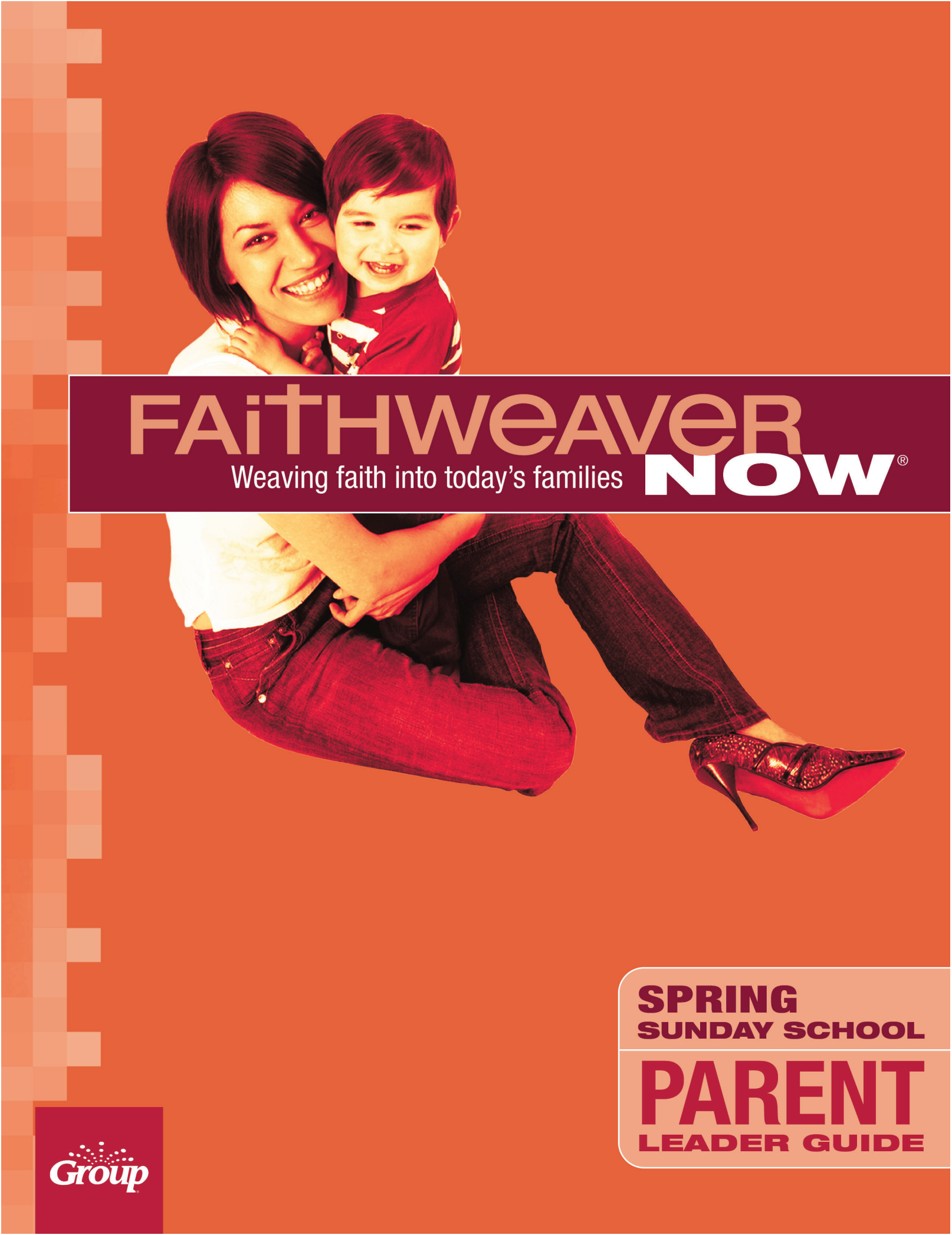

Jesus Teaches His Disciples to Pray

Matthew 6:5-13

BIBLE BACKGROUND
FOR LEADERS

How *Not* to Pray

This passage begins with Jesus instructing his followers how *not* to pray. The religious leaders of that time were accustomed to praying loudly on the street corners so that the people would see them as holy and religious. Instead, Jesus says, prayer is to be between the individual and God—sincere communication that is a direct result of one’s relationship with God.

Two Basic Parts

Jesus gives this prayer as a pattern or a form—an outline for prayer. One way to understand it better is to break his prayer into two basic parts: adoration and petition.

The first verse of the Lord's Prayer expresses praise for God's majesty and acknowledges God's love for us. The single word we translate as "our father" is an intimate word that can be translated as "daddy" or "dearest father." Jesus lets his followers know that they can share in his close relationship with God.

The first petition in the prayer is not related to personal needs. Rather, it addresses seeking what God wants.

After we seek God's will, we turn to asking God to fulfill personal, daily needs for food, forgiveness, and freedom from temptation. Without God working in our lives and our world, there would be no food or forgiveness. And if Satan were not restricted from tempting us, our lives would be nearly unbearable.

Putting God First

Remember that Jesus insisted on putting God first. If God isn't first in our lives, as well as in our prayers, God will not be honored, no matter how eloquently we pray.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus showed us how to pray, but more importantly, he also set the example of putting God first. Everything Jesus did was for God, so it was only natural for his prayer to be focused on praising God and seeking God's will.

Think of the last prayer you prayed. Maybe it was a quick “God, help me impress my boss” or “Lord, give me patience with my child.” There’s nothing wrong with quick prayers seeking God’s help. But these quick prayers can reveal our real view of God. Consider the motivations behind your last prayer. Did you want to impress your boss or have patience with your child so the other person could see Jesus living in you? Stop and pray now for God to be the center of your life—and your prayers. 1 GETTING STARTED

Prayer Partners

What You'll Do

Greet parents warmly as they gather.

Have parents form groups of three.

Say: **Share with each other how your week went with your kids. Then discuss Questions 1 through 3 in your FaithWeaver NOW Parent Handbook. We'll gather back together in 10 minutes.**

QUESTION 1

What did you learn about prayer as a child? How did that change as you grew?

QUESTION 2

If you pray with your child, how do you go about it?

QUESTION 3

What does your child struggle with when praying?

Bring everyone back together after 10 minutes, and ask them to share insights from their discussion with the whole group.

Say: **There is power in prayer, but as wonderful as it is, sometimes prayer can be hard, frustrating, and even discouraging. If this is true for us, we know it's just as mysterious and hard for our children. But Jesus gave us all a gift. Jesus showed us how ► WE PRAY TO GOD. The Bible records a prayer Jesus gave his disciples as an example for us to use. Let's see what we can learn from this model for ourselves and our children.**

2 BIBLE EXPLORATION

Lord, Teach Us to Pray

What You'll Do

Make sure everyone has a Bible and a pen.

Say: **Before we talk about the model that Jesus gave us for how to pray, he gave a**

colorful description of how *not* to pray. Let's take a look at the examples Jesus gave.

Form groups of four.

In their groups, have parents read Matthew 6:5-8. Then have them prepare a "hypocrite's" prayer and a "pagan's" prayer based on the examples given by Jesus in the Bible passage. Give parents about five minutes to prepare, and then have groups each share their prayers with the whole group. When all groups have presented, thank them for their good work and participation.

Say: **Jesus made it clear that God wasn't interested in insincere or incoherent prayers. When we pray, it isn't to impress others with how ► WE PRAY TO GOD. As adults, we sometimes use words and phrases that are difficult for children to understand. We might be saying very important things, but those things are lost on our children because we're using language that is meaningless to them.**

Hand out the "Lord's Prayer Cards," making sure each group has two or three cards.

Say: **Read Matthew 6:9-13, and then read the phrases on your cards. Working together, come up with a child-friendly explanation or definition for each phrase. Keep the ages of your kids in mind. You can use the Notes section in your handbooks to brainstorm ideas. We'll come back together in 10 minutes to share what you've discovered.**

Gather everyone's attention after 10 minutes, keeping them in their groups. Ask parents to share what they discovered with the entire group. Then have groups discuss Questions 4 and 5 in their handbooks.

QUESTION 4

Using the definitions suggested, how could your child pray for "daily bread" or for God's "will" to be done? How do you pray for these things?

QUESTION 5

Think about some things your child has recently been thinking about or experiencing. What part of the Lord's Prayer most speaks to that?

After about five minutes, say: **Prayer can seem like a very mysterious act. How do the words I say or think find their way to God? And by the way, who am I that God would even listen to my prayers? Interestingly, the best part of Jesus' prayer comes right at the beginning. "Our Father..." He didn't say "My Father," but "Our Father." He listens, because he is our Father and each of us is his child.**

QUESTION 6

How does the way you communicate with your children help them understand how to communicate through prayer? How could your communication with them help them approach God differently?



QUESTION 7

In what ways do you make praying more difficult for your kids? How could you make it easier and less intimidating?

Say: **When Jesus taught his disciples how to pray, he wanted to keep things simple and authentic. ► WE PRAY TO GOD so that we can grow in our friendship with God. One of the greatest gifts we can give our kids is a life filled with prayer and a desire to help them learn how to pray. Let's look at how we can do that.**

3 WEAVING FAITH INTO FAMILIES

The Gift of Prayer

What You'll Do

Say: **Prayer is something many of us aren't at ease with, especially when we have to pray out loud in front of an audience. We may feel insecure or uncomfortable with others listening to intimate conversation with God. Yet prayer is one of the greatest gifts God has given to us. It allows us to talk with God and to bring our concerns and worries to him. One of the greatest gifts we can give to our children is to help them learn how to talk with God.**

Form new groups of four. Pass out a gift bag, paper, and pens to each group.

Say: **As we discovered in the Lord's Prayer, how we pray isn't as important as the simple act of praying itself. The Lord's Prayer shows that God wants to hear about our needs (our "daily bread"), our failures (our "debts"), and our relationships with others ("as we forgive our debtors"). God desires to know us and talk with us, as we would talk with a parent or good friend.**

Take three minutes to discuss Question 8 from your handbooks. You may want to jot down ideas in your handbooks.

QUESTION 8

What can you do to help your child communicate with God in a meaningful way?

Say: **Let's practice praying with our kids by praying for each other today. Write a prayer request on a piece of paper, fold it up, and put it in your gift bag. When everyone is done, have each person take a request from the gift bag (making sure you don't get your own). Then spend several minutes praying for each other.**

Bring everyone back together after 10 minutes. Ask for insights about prayer that parents learned in this activity that they're willing to tell the whole group.

Say: **Today we've looked at how the Lord's Prayer is an example of prayer for us. We've looked at how Jesus said *not* to pray like the hypocrites and pagans**

and then the simple yet profound model of prayer that we know as the Lord's Prayer. We discussed how to make prayer more "user-friendly" for our children, and maybe even for ourselves. ► **WE PRAY TO GOD** so that we can grow in our relationship with him—*that's* the most important aspect of prayer. And we can help our kids grow closer to God through prayer, too.

Daily Challenge

What You'll Do

Say: This week, help your kids remember that ► **WE PRAY TO GOD**. Your Daily Challenge this week is to take a gift bag home with you and put it in a place where you and your kids can use it to pray for each other. Take a couple of minutes to talk to a partner about what this challenge might look like in daily life. Be as specific as you can be about how you'll help your kids discover how to communicate with God in meaningful ways. Allow time.

Say: Please join me in a closing prayer, which will include the Lord's Prayer.

Pray: God, thank you for sending Jesus to show us how *not* to pray and for giving us the gift of the Lord's Prayer as an example of prayer. Help us teach this prayer to our kids and grow in our own prayer life. And now, we join together in that prayer Jesus taught his disciples, saying, "Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one." In Jesus' name, amen.

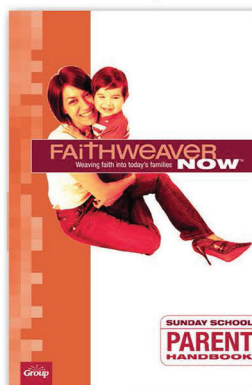
