#### Solomon Tells of Jesus' Coming

Psalm 72:1-19





#### **Writing Psalm 72**

Some believe that Psalm 72 was written about Solomon and not by him. It is true that some elements of the psalm could well describe Solomon, but many elements describe a king whose actions go far beyond Solomon's capabilities. The early church believed that this psalm was written as a prayer for a king to come in the line of David and Solomon: the Messiah, Jesus. That's the approach taken in today's lesson.

#### The Psalmist Points Beyond Himself

Some elements of the psalm could indeed describe Solomon. He judged righteously and with great wisdom, as illustrated in the story of the two women who each claimed to be the mother of the same infant (1 Kings 3:16-28). He reigned over a prosperous kingdom, the wealthiest in Israel's history. He expanded the boundaries of the kingdom to encompass more territory than ever before. And he was sought by the queen of Sheba, who came to him bearing gifts.

However, much of this psalm points directly to the Messiah. Only Jesus' kingdom will truly extend to the ends of the earth (Psalm 72:8), and only to Jesus will all rulers eventually bow down (Psalm 72:11). There isn't a lot of biblical evidence that Solomon cared for the needy and afflicted (Psalm 72:12-14), but Jesus' life and ministry were characterized by such caring. And while the statement that all nations would be blessed through him (Psalm 72:17) could possibly refer to Solomon indirectly, it definitely refers to Jesus.

#### The Works of the Messiah

If Jesus is indeed the subject of Psalm 72, it is easy to answer the question: What does Jesus do? Jesus does amazing things for us! He takes care of the needy and their children, and he defeats oppressors (Psalm 72:4, 12-14). He lives forever, despite the fact that he died on the cross for us (Psalm 72:5). When he returns, Jesus will reign over the entire earth (Psalm 72:8). Surely he deserves from us the same kind of praise and honor given in verses 18 and 19!

#### **The Jesus Connection**

We've learned about many different facets of Jesus' life and ministry on earth. But let's never forget what Jesus has done for us. He is worthy of all our praise for that alone.

What's the first thing that comes to mind when you think about Jesus?

Who is Jesus to you? A teachera ministera preachera martyra savior? Concentrate on the last one—savior. Spend two minutes prayerfully considering how Jesus is your Savior. You can writ your prayer here.

#### Wait for It...

**Tip** Consider bringing in a two-minute timer or a clock with a loud ticking sound to increase the sense of waiting.

#### What You'll Do

Greet parents warmly as they gather.

Say: In today's lesson, we'll look at what it means to look forward to the coming of Jesus.

In these few weeks before Christmas, we're given an opportunity to experience a bit of what the Jews experienced for hundreds of years as they awaited the coming of the Messiah.

So now, parents, let's think about a time we had to wait. Think back to when you were kids. Find a partner, and discuss Question 1 in your FaithWeaver NOW Parent Handbooks.

#### QUESTION 1

What can you remember from a Christmas season when you were growing up—maybe even when you were the same age as one of your kids? What was the most difficult part about waiting for Christmas?

Gather everyone's attention after five minutes, keeping parents in pairs. Invite them to share highlights and insights from their discussion time.

Say: You might not have the same level of anticipation for Christmas now. Perhaps that's because you have so much more to do and focus on during the season now than you did when you were a kid. We're going to do a little activity that may bring back some of those memories you had when you were little and had to wait for Christmas. We're going to do absolutely nothing for just two minutes—except wait. Please don't pray, read, talk, close your eyes, or check your cellphones. Just wait. Ready? Go.

After two minutes of...well, nothing...have partners discuss Questions 2 and 3 in their handbooks.



#### QUESTION 2

How were the feelings you experienced just now like the anticipation of Christmas you had as a kid? How were they different?

#### QUESTION 3

What things of the season tend to distract you and your family from the *reason* for the season—the great things Jesus has done?

Give pairs another five minutes to talk, and then bring everyone back together. Ask for parents to share insights from their discussion time.

Say: > JESUS DOES GREAT THINGS. Today we're going to look at a prophetic psalm about the great things Jesus would do. This psalm was written hundreds of years before Jesus was born. After you read it, we'll talk about how we can focus on the great things Jesus can do in our homes.

#### **Looking Forward**

#### What You'll Do

Give each person a square of wrapping paper. Make sure everyone has something to write with.

Say: There are few things that cause anticipation like a wrapped present. What you're going to do now is think about some of the presents Jesus has already given you. Answer Questions 4 and 5 in your handbooks. For now, write your answers on the blank side of the wrapping paper without talking to anyone else.

#### QUESTION 4

What great things has Jesus done in your life? in your kids' lives?

#### QUESTION 5

What special traditions does your family have or what efforts do you make during this season to celebrate those great things?

Give everyone two minutes to write answers, and then call time. Have parents get into groups of four and share the answers they wrote down. Then have them read Psalm 72:1-19 and discuss Questions 6 and 7 in their handbooks with their groups.



#### QUESTION 6

In what ways have you seen Jesus fulfill this psalm in your kids' lives?

#### QUESTION 7

What great things has Jesus done in your life that you've also seen reflected in your kids' lives? If you haven't seen those things reflected in your kids' lives, why do you think that is?

After 10 minutes, regain everyone's attention, keeping parents with their groups. Ask for someone from each group to share highlights and insights from the discussion time.

Say: Our Key Verse today is from 1 Timothy 2:5, which is, "For there is one God and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus." In your groups, take a few minutes to answer Question 8 in your handbooks.

#### QUESTION 8

What does it mean in your family life for Jesus to be the mediator between humans and God?

After three minutes, ask everyone to call out some of the highlights of what they discussed.

Say: Jesus has done so many amazing things! We have reason to celebrate his wonders all year long—and during this season especially. Tuck your sheets of wrapping paper into your handbooks as a reminder that ▶ JESUS DOES GREAT THINGS. Jesus arrived on earth, serves as the mediator between God and us, and is still able to do great things your life.

#### Preparing for Him

#### What You'll Do

Say: You probably do a lot of things this time of year without ever really stopping to think about why you do them. For example, have you ever thought about why you put ornaments on your Christmas tree—or maybe why you even have a Christmas tree? Have you ever thought about why you hang lights outside your home? Turn back to your groups, and discuss Questions 9 and 10 in your handbooks.

#### **QUESTION 10**

What year-round traditions can you create to help your kids remember what Jesus has done?

Give groups five minutes to discuss, and then regain their attention.

Say: It's important to have family traditions—both fun ones and serious ones. I hope you celebrate traditions that have been passed down to you, and that you're creating new traditions for your family, too. Let's develop one new tradition this season that's completely focused on the great things Jesus has done. And right now, let's start thinking through what we want that to look like.

In your groups, brainstorm a list of new traditions you can start in your homes that focus completely on the great things Jesus has done. Here are just a couple of examples to get you started:

- Have a day or period of fasting as Christmas approaches. It can be a fast from anything—food, the Internet, shopping, and so on.
- Have a day of service during which your family volunteers at church, a nursing home, or a food pantry.
- Throw a birthday party for Jesus—including cake and candles.

Take 10 minutes to work through your own ideas in your groups, and we'll share afterward. Remember, this is just brainstorming, so no idea is a bad idea. As we discuss them later, you can figure out which ones will work best for your family.


After 10 minutes, bring everyone back together. Give each group a chance to share a few of its favorite ideas with the rest of the larger group. To make sure every group gets a chance to share, invite each group to share one idea. When you get through all the groups, rotate through a few more times. Encourage parents to write ideas from this discussion in the "Notes" section of their handbooks. Thank parents for their ideas.

Say: Use one of these ideas—or come up with one of your own and write it down. Review your handbook this week, and plan how you'll try the idea with your family. See what God does with it from there.

▶ JESUS DOES GREAT THINGS. Jesus did a great thing when he came to this earth as a baby. Jesus has done great things in my life, and he has done great things in your life. Make a special effort this year to help each of your kids see his greatness this season and every season of the year.







#### **Daily Challenge**

#### What You'll Do

Say: This week, help your kids remember that 

JESUS DOES GREAT THINGS.

Your Daily Challenge this week is to look at the presents you wrote earlier on the wrapping paper and add to them as you look at what Jesus is doing in this Christmas season. Take a couple of minutes to talk to a partner about what this challenge might look like in daily life. Be as specific as you can be about how you'll help your kids see the great things Jesus does as you complete this challenge.

Allow time.

Say: Please join me in a closing prayer.

Pray: God, thank you for sending Jesus to save us from our sins so we can have a relationship with you, and thank you for all the other great things you're doing in our lives. Please help us show our gratitude, awe, and joy to you. Help our kids understand how great you are. In Jesus' name, amen.

Say: Your kids should be receiving a letter to you from their Sunday school class today with information about what they'll be doing this quarter. They'll also have a take-home paper from this week's lesson to show you. It has their Daily Challenges for this week and ideas for weaving faith at home as a family. 
