

God Tests Abraham

Genesis 22:1-18



A Preface for Today's Material

This account may seem horrifying if one doesn't study it carefully. It's hard to understand how our good God could command a parent to sacrifice a child. But if we examine the text, we can take comfort in knowing that God never intended for Abraham to sacrifice Isaac. The whole event was designed to test Abraham; it was a chance for him to grow his faith and learn about God's faithfulness.

Abraham Obeys God's Command to Sacrifice His Son

Isaac was the embodiment of all of God's promises to Abraham. However, no matter how surprised or saddened Abraham must have been, Abraham obeyed. The Bible says he set out the very next day. When Abraham knew what God wanted him to do, he set out to do it.

Abraham's faith in God and his willingness to obey are truly amazing. Not only was he willing to sacrifice his son, but he maintained faith in God's promise about Isaac. He said to his servants, "We will come back to you" (Genesis 22:5). Somehow Abraham was confident that in spite of this recent command, God would preserve Isaac, through whom God had promised to make Abraham's descendants as numerous as the stars in the heavens!

Abraham and Isaac Journey to the Place of Sacrifice

It took Abraham and Isaac three days to travel about 50 miles over rough, mountainous terrain. During the trip, Abraham had time to think. Certainly questions flooded his mind: "What if God really does let Isaac die? What will I tell Sarah? Might this God I'm serving abandon me now after all these promises?" Abraham could easily have justified disobedience in this case—

after all, this was the child God had promised to him and Sarah; maybe the voice he had heard wasn't God's after all. But whatever thoughts went through his mind, Abraham never swerved from his steadfast obedience.

Isaac Also Obeyed God

The Bible tells us nothing of Isaac's thoughts or feelings during this trip. He must have noticed that his father was behaving strangely. But Isaac showed faith, too. He submitted to being placed on the altar in obedience to God's command.

The Jesus Connection

God loves us and he loved Abraham. God's test helped Abraham realize his own commitment to God, and the tests in our lives can help strengthen and deepen our faith, too.

How can you trust God in the middle of trials and difficulty? Invite God into your decisions and challenges and trust him to lead you no matter what the road ahead looks like. You can write your prayer below.

Nostalgic Obedience

What You'll Do

Greet parents warmly as they gather.

Have parents form groups of three. In each trio, ask people to take turns telling examples from their childhood or youth. They can each tell one story about a time they obeyed even though they were tempted not to. And they can each tell one story about a time they disobeyed and suffered the consequences. Allow about eight minutes.

After eight minutes, gather everyone's attention. Ask a few people to share their stories of either obedience or disobedience. Then have trios answer Questions 1 through 3 in their FaithWeaver NOW Parent Handbooks.

QUESTION 1

What did your disobedient experiences in childhood or youth teach you about obedience?

QUESTION 2

In what ways has your idea of obedience changed since you were a child?

QUESTION 3

When you think of obeying God, what does that look like in your own life?

Allow about five minutes. Then ask a few parents to share some insights with the entire group.

Say: As we know from being children and from raising children, obedience isn't always easy. Neither is obedience to God. But our perfect God has a perfect plan for our lives. That's why we are to ▶ OBEY GOD.



Making a Sacrifice

What You'll Do

Have parents form three new groups. Assign one to represent Abraham, one to represent Isaac, and one to represent God. Provide a Bible to anyone who needs one. Say: Let's read an account about Abraham from the book of Genesis that may

seem shocking because of what God required for obedience. In your groups, take turns reading aloud Genesis 22:1-8. As you read these verses, especially consider the perspective of your group's assigned person—Abraham, Isaac, or God.

Allow a few minutes for groups to read.

Then say: Now, in your group, rewrite those passages in the handbook from the perspective of your assigned person. You can use either the Notes section or a blank page in the back. Write in the first person, considering what that person might have been thinking or feeling throughout this account.

Allow about five minutes for groups to write.

Say: Now please read verses 9-18 in your group. Then write those verses from the perspective of your assigned person, again in first person. You'll have about eight minutes.

QUESTION 4

What new insight did you gain from looking at this account from one person's perspective?

QUESTION 5

What surprises you the most about this Bible passage, and why?

QUESTION 6

What's significant about God asking Abraham to sacrifice his son, and not something else?

QUESTION 7

What lessons about obeying God can you take away from this passage? How can you relay those lessons to your kids?

After seven minutes, gather everyone's attention. Ask some people to share their answers with everyone.

Say: Amazingly, the Bible doesn't record Abraham's questioning of God. Abraham simply obeys God without wondering about or questioning God's request. He provides an example of how we are to ▶ OBEY GOD. Let's look at how we can apply the truth from the Bible to being obedient parents, and how that makes sense in light of today's Bible passage.





Real-Life Obedience

What You'll Do

Say: Abraham obeyed without questioning. That's something a lot of us aren't able to do.

Have parents form new groups of three and discuss Questions 8 through 10 in their handbooks. Allow about seven minutes for discussion.

QUESTION 8

Tell about a time you or your family obeyed God. What was that like, and what happened as a result?

QUESTION 9

When is it easiest for you and your family members to obey God? When is it most difficult?

QUESTION 10

As parents, how can we discern God's voice from other voices? How can we increase our desire and willingness to obey God?

After about seven minutes, regain everyone's attention. Have a few parents share their answers with the whole group.

Read the Key Verse, Deuteronomy 5:32-33, aloud: "So be careful to do what the Lord your God has commanded you; do not turn aside to the right or to the left. Walk in all the way that the Lord your God has commanded you, so that you may live and prosper and prolong your days in the land that you will possess" (Deuteronomy 5:32-33).

Say: Here's a situation I'd like you to discuss in your trios: Your friend says he heard God tell him to feed his children only locusts and honey. He's convinced that if this diet was good enough for John the Baptist, it's good enough for his children. How would you advise your friend?

After a few minutes, gather everyone's attention. Ask trios to share with everyone what advice they'd give to the friend wanting to feed his children locusts and honey. Thank everyone for their participation.

Hand out paper and pens or pencils. Say: To close, let's each write a letter to God about obedience. For example, you might write about an area where you need help obeying God. Conclude the letter with a one-sentence commitment using the theme of our Key Verse. For example, someone might write, "I commit to obey God

and walk in God's ways regardless of how crazy it might look to others."

Allow about six minutes for parents to write their letters.

Say: Although obeying God was difficult for Abraham, he didn't waver. God had a plan for Abraham, and he has a plan for each of us—and obedience is part of that plan. No matter what God asks you and your family members to do, remember that it's important to **DEEY GOD**.



Daily Challenge

What You'll Do

Say: Today we learned why we are to OBEY GOD. Your Daily Challenge this week is to write down one way each day how your family obeys God. Take a few minutes to talk to a partner about what this challenge might look like in daily life. Be as specific as you can about how you'll explore as a family how you obey God. Allow time.

Say: Please join me in a closing prayer. After each sentence I say, please respond as a group, "Help us, God."

Pray: Dear God, we know that obeying you is part of your plan for our lives, but it's often difficult. Pause. Strengthen us and our family members each day to obey you more. Pause. Show us how to follow your commands in all circumstances. Pause. In Jesus' name, amen.


