

### **Prophets Foretell Jesus' Coming**

Jeremiah 33:14-16



BIBLE BACKGROUND

#### Jeremiah Preaches Hope in Times of Trouble

This passage was written nearly 600 years before Jesus was born. The northern kingdom of Israel had fallen to the Assyrians, who had in turn fallen to the Babylonians. Jeremiah also saw the fall of the southern kingdom of Judah to the Babylonians, concluding with the destruction of Jerusalem in 587 B.C.

Despite all that was going on around him, Jeremiah's message in this passage is one of hope. Repeating nearly word for word the message he had given in Jeremiah 23:5-6, Jeremiah utters here his most important message about the coming Messiah. This King would be a descendant of David but would rule with more wisdom, justice, and righteousness than any other king had ever done. This coming Messiah would not only rescue his people from their oppressors but also reunite the kingdoms of Israel and Judah, which had been divided since the death of Solomon more than 300 years earlier.

## Jesus Fulfills Prophecy, but Not as Expected

After reading this passage, it's easy to understand why people of Jesus' day expected a Messiah who would lead them in throwing off Roman rule and restoring the unified kingdom of Israel. From our standpoint in history, we know that Jesus came first as the suffering servant (see Isaiah 53), drawing people to himself through his perfect life and his message of repentance. One day, however, Jesus will return to complete his fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies and rule as king over all heaven and earth.

As we look forward to our celebration of Jesus' birth, we can also look forward to the day Jesus will return to take those who believe in him to live with him in heaven. That's God's message of hope for Christians in today's broken world!

#### **The Jesus Connection**

Your relationship with Jesus is an amazing gift. And God planned long ago to give you that gift. Thank him for this life-giving blessing!

Long ago, God chose to prepare the hearts of his people with the news that a Savior would come. As you prepare for Christmas, take some time to allow God's message of hope and salvation to sink in for you. Choose to believe God's promises—and allow the wonder of Jesus' incarnation to overwhelm you. Pray about your heart's desire to live this Christmas season immersed in the meaning of God's promises. #### **Broken Promises**

#### What You'll Do

Greet parents warmly as they gather. Make crayons centrally available for parents to use.

Say: Please open your FaithWeaver NOW Parent Handbooks to the "Notes" area in Lesson 1. Draw a picture to represent a time in your childhood when someone broke a promise made to you. Be expressive—show how the experience made you feel. If you can't think of an experience of your own, you can draw a scene from your child's life. You'll have about five minutes to think of something and create before you'll share with a partner.

After about five minutes, ask parents to partner up with someone who has a child about the same age as their own. Allow several minutes for partners to share. Then ask if a few people are willing to summarize their experience for the entire group.

Say: As a pair, join now with another pair to form a group of four. Then discuss Questions 1 through 3 in your handbooks. You'll have about seven minutes to chat.

#### QUESTION 1

Share a time you didn't quite live up to a promise you made to your child. Why are promises often difficult for parents to keep?

#### QUESTION 2

How do your kids typically respond when they experience broken promises?

#### QUESTION 3

How are promises we make within our families like or unlike promises from God?

After about seven minutes, regain everyone's attention. Ask a few people to share what they talked about.

Say: A broken promise can feel disastrous, causing our trust in someone else to suffer. But promises that are kept can add fullness to life. Today we'll see that 

JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE, and we'll find out what that means for each of our families.

#### **Promise Fulfilled**

#### What You'll Do

Make sure everyone has a Bible.

Say: Let's look at one of the many prophesies recorded in the Old Testament that Jesus fulfilled. With your group, read Jeremiah 33:14-16.

Allow time for groups to read.

Say: Now in your group, read today's Key Verse, Matthew 1:22-23. Compare it to the verses in Jeremiah, and then ponder this question: What did God promise, and how did he fulfill his promise? Come up with an explanation you can share with your kids. After about five minutes, you'll share with the whole group.

When time's up, invite someone from each group to share what they came up with.

Say: In your groups, discuss Questions 4 through 6 in your handbooks. You'll have about seven minutes.

#### QUESTION 4

In what ways is this fulfilled promise good news?

#### QUESTION 5

If God had broken his promise, how would your life and your family members' lives be different?

#### QUESTION 6

As a parent, when is it easy or difficult for you to trust God to keep his promises? Explain.

After seven minutes, regain everyone's attention. Ask a few parents to share their insights with everyone.

Say: Unlike sinful humans, God keeps every promise he makes. Throughout the Old Testament, God promised to send his Son to be our Savior, and in the New Testament, ► JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. Let's take a deeper look at the impact that good news has on each of our lives.





#### God With Us

#### What You'll Do

Give each group an index card and a pen.

Say: A key point in Jesus' prophecy-fulfilling work was simply to come into our world as Immanuel, which means "God with us." On the index card, write an ordinary parenting scenario in which people could choose to trust that Jesus is with them or not. You'll have two minutes to write your scenario before you switch cards with another group. Then you'll discuss what it would look like to trust Jesus or rely on yourself in that situation.

After two minutes, have each group pass its card to another group. Give groups about seven minutes to brainstorm two different results to the new scenario: one in which they trust Jesus and another in which they rely on themselves. If the group members prefer, they can choose to act out their scenes.

After seven minutes, regain everyone's attention and have groups share their results.

Say: In your groups, discuss Questions 7 through 9 in your handbooks. You'll have about six minutes.

#### QUESTION 7

How might we live differently knowing that Jesus is the fulfillment of God's promise?

#### QUESTION 8

What helps you recognize—and be grateful for—Jesus' presence with you throughout the week?

#### QUESTION 9

Based on today's discussion, how can you help your kids trust God more? Give specific examples.

After about six minutes, ask a few parents to share key insights from their discussion.

Say: Trust is an essential element of any relationship. We all know from personal experience that it's hard to trust someone who's broken a promise. God made more than 300 promises to his people, recorded in the Old Testament, that he'd send a Messiah to liberate the people. And ▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. Because Jesus is God's presence with us, we can trust him fully.

#### **Daily Challenge**

#### What You'll Do

Say: Today we learned that ▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. Your Daily Challenge this week is to discuss with your kids some of the promises that God has fulfilled—both in Bible times and today. Take a few minutes to talk to a partner about what this challenge might look like in daily life. Be as specific as you can about how you'll emphasize that God keeps his promises. Allow time.

Say: Let's close in a "popcorn prayer." When I pause, take turns saying words that express your gratitude to God for fulfilling his promises.

Pray: Dear God, we've learned how important it is to keep promises—and how you fulfilled yours in a special way. Thank you for the gift of your Son, Jesus. Pause.

After parents have shared their words of gratitude, pray: Please guide us each day in our parenting, and help our children grow in their faith and trust in your promises. In Jesus' name, amen.

Say: Your kids should have a take-home page from this week's lesson to show you. It has their Daily Challenges for this week and ideas for weaving faith at home as a family. Please help your kids follow through with their Daily Challenges. 
