David Becomes King

2 Samuel 5:1-5; Psalm 37

One of the most exciting things about becoming a teenager is the increasing independence that comes with this age. Teenagers love to stretch their wings and fly! “I can do it myself! I have it all figured out!” they often think. In sharp contrast to all of this independence is the idea that human beings need to rely on God, not on themselves. It’s often difficult for teenagers to find the right balance between establishing their independence...and living in total dependence on God. Use this opportunity to help your teenagers understand that relying on God will help them to accomplish much greater and more amazing things than they could achieve by relying only on themselves.

David Becomes King

2 Samuel 5:1-5; Psalm 37

BIBLE BACKGROUND
FOR LEADERS

David Mourns King Saul

We begin this quarter of Old Testament studies with the anointing of David as king of Israel. Many years earlier, Israel's first king, Saul, had turned from the Lord, and God had selected David to succeed Saul. For years after that, Saul sought to have David killed. However, David had refused to act against Saul or to become king until he was certain of God's timing. He had lived a difficult life, almost as an outlaw. Now Saul was dead; after being wounded in battle, he had taken his own life. In fact, Saul and three of his sons, including David's friend Jonathan, had died in the same battle (1 Samuel 31:1-6). So the door was wide open for David to become king of Israel.

David didn't rejoice when he learned of the deaths. Instead he and all his men mourned and wept the entire day (2 Samuel 1:1-12). David even wrote a song in honor of Saul and Jonathan, which can be found in 2 Samuel 1:19-27. He was truly saddened that their lives had ended as they did.

Uniting the Kingdom

David was made king of Judah. Israel followed Abner, the commander of Saul's army, who made Ish-Bosheth, a son of Saul, king over Israel (2 Samuel 2:1-9). After years of much fighting, intrigue, and bloodshed, Ish-Bosheth was murdered, and the leaders of Israel came to David to make him king over them.

David Leads Israel

David was 37 when he became king over all Israel. He had first been anointed to succeed Saul many years earlier, while still in his teens. After his long, patient wait, David was able to lead Israel to great prosperity, fend off the Philistines, and expand the boundaries of Israel during his reign. David wasn't perfect, but as

he relied on God, God rewarded him and Israel with prosperity.

David wrote Psalm 37, which describes his trust in God even when he was surrounded by enemies. In this psalm, David says to “delight yourself in the Lord and he will give you the desires of your heart” (Psalm 37:4). This could have been the theme of David’s life.

The Jesus Connection

Through Jesus, God showed us how to take every step of life relying on him. Because of Jesus' courage, we can believe that trusting God will always be worth it!

What past experience has God used to teach you how to rely on him?

God has a wonderful way of not letting teachable moments in our lives go to waste. What is God using to teach you right now?

Ask God for wisdom to see and strength to move forward with faith, knowing that he'll always have everything you need. You can write your prayer here.

FAITH CONNECTION

The Ultimate Thumbless Challenge

What You'll Do ■■■■■■

Begin the study by asking your students how many of them are up for an ultimate challenge.

Say: **All you have to do to successfully meet this challenge is pick a penny up from off the ground, sign your name, shake hands with a friend, and untie and tie someone's shoelaces. Does anybody think this will be too tough?**

Here's the catch: You have to do all of these things without using your thumbs!

Distribute strips of masking tape, and encourage students to help one another tape their thumbs snugly against the sides of their hands so their thumbs aren't usable. This may take a while, but students will laugh as they experience the difficulty of even this simple task.

Once everyone is "thumbless," toss some pennies on the floor, and make paper and pens available as students attempt to master each task without the use of their thumbs. If some students aren't wearing shoes with laces, set out the ones you brought for them to untie and retie.

Talk With Students ■■■■■■

After students have had ample time to "try their hands" at each activity, gather everyone and discuss the following questions, which can be found in the Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- **What was the hardest thing to do without your thumbs? Why was it so hard?**
- **What are some other everyday tasks that would be difficult to accomplish without thumbs?**
- **What are some similarities between relying on our thumbs and relying on God in our everyday lives?**
- **What are some examples of everyday things that, without even realizing it, we rely on God to do?**

Say: **It's hard to believe how much we rely on our thumbs! Even though we use them hundreds of times every day, we rarely give a thought to how important they are to us. In the same way, we need God's help whether we realize it or not. Today we'll learn how ► WE CAN RELY ON GOD.**



Media Connection (Option)

What You'll Do ■■■■■■

Instead of the "Ultimate Thumbless Challenge" activity, play the song "40 Days" by Third Day. As students listen, encourage them to think about some of the toughest times they personally have gone through.

Talk With Students ■■■■

Lead students in this discussion. They can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- Explain whether you agree or disagree with the song.
- What's one of the hardest things you've had to go through?
- Tell about someone you most often relied on during that tough time.
- What do you think is the most important thing to do when going through tough times? Explain.

Say: **When we go through really tough stretches of life, we often lean on our friends and family to pull us through. Today we're going to be focusing on why God is the most important one to help us through all situations and that ► WE CAN RELY ON GOD.**

2 BIBLE EXPLORATION

Why 2 Rely

What You'll Do ■■■■■■

Say: **We're about to read about a really important event in David's life: his coronation as Israel's king. David had traveled a long and difficult road to reach this point. He'd been through some really trying times and difficult situations. Yet, through it all, David had relied on God.**

Ask students to look up 2 Samuel 5:1-5 in their Bibles, and ask a willing student to read the verses aloud.

Say: **God chose David to rule Israel because David had a heart for God; when times were tough, David turned to God for help. And the amazing thing is that even when times *weren't* tough, David still relied on God. God was a crucial part of David's everyday life. David's life can teach us two very important things: *how* to rely on God and *why* to rely on God. Let's take some time to learn, from David's own words, how and why he relied on God.**

Distribute pens and have students open to p. 14 of their handbooks, or distribute copies of the “Why 2 Rely” handout. Then invite half of the group to study Psalm 37 and discuss the “hows”—the many ways, according to the psalm, to rely on God. (Examples are “Trust in the Lord” and “Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for him.”)

Ask the other half of the group to dig into the “whys” in Psalm 37—the reasons, according to the psalm, to rely on God. (Examples are “He will make your righteousness shine” and “He will give you the desires of your heart.”) As the students dig in, have them take notes on their findings in their handbooks or on their “Why 2 Rely” handouts.

After about five minutes, have groups each identify their top five answers. Then call all the students together to share their top hows and whys with one another.

Talk With Students ■■■■

Lead students in this discussion. They can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- What did you learn from David’s reliance on God that applies to your own life?
- Explain which “how” and “why” would be your personal number one answer.
- What’s an area of your life where it’s hardest to rely on God?

Say: David’s life wasn’t free from trouble. He had his share of down times—when he was afraid for his life, when he felt really depressed, when people thought he was a nobody. In each of those times, he relied on God for protection, comfort, and worth. David knew how to rely on God, and he knew why: the only thing he could count on was God. Now, let’s consider how we can follow David’s example and how ► **WE CAN RELY ON GOD.**

3 WEAVING FAITH INTO LIFE

Can’t Live Without Him

What You’ll Do ■■■■

Ask students to share about adventurous things they’ve done, such as bungee jumping, hiking in a wilderness area, scuba diving, or other adventures. For each adventure, have students share what equipment they used and what the experience was like.

Say: **We rely on certain objects in extreme situations because our lives depend on them. For example, a bungee jumper *absolutely* relies on that bungee cord! A hiker in the wilderness *absolutely* relies on good shoes to keep from slipping off a cliff.**

Have students form teams of four to six, and give each team sticky notes and a pen or pencil. Ask teams to brainstorm a list of situations in which people absolutely rely on certain objects and then create a list of reasons for relying on those objects. Have students write each reason on a separate sticky note. Challenge students to think of as many situations and reasons as they can in three minutes. For example, students might say, “The compass leads them in the right direction” or “The parachute protects them from getting hurt.”

After three minutes, invite teams to share their ideas with the whole group. As each team shares, have its members attach their sticky notes to the wall. As students create the wall of sticky notes, pay attention to the words or phrases that could describe God’s characteristics—“leads in the right direction” or “protects,” for example.

Talk With Students ■■■■

Have students take a new look at what’s written on the wall of sticky notes. Then lead students in this discussion. They can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- Which words or phrases on our wall of stickies apply to how we rely on God?
- Tell about a time you relied on God and he responded in one of the ways listed on the wall.
- Based on what we’ve read and talked about today, what’s one way you need to rely on God more?

Say: **Unfortunately, sometimes these objects let people down. Compasses can get broken, parachutes can fail, and even bungee cords can snap. But God will never let us down. David knew that well, because in all his hard times, God always protected him. Because God will never let us down, ► WE CAN RELY ON GOD.**

Commitment Collage

What You’ll Do ■■■■

Have students form pairs and read Psalm 46:1 together: “God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble.”

Ask partners to share what the verse means to them in light of what they’ve discussed today. Then say: **We’ve talked about many reasons to rely on God. Take just a moment to ask yourself this question: “Why would it be good for me to rely on God, and what’s the best way I can actually rely on him in the next week?”**

When you’ve thought of a good answer, come look at our wall of sticky notes. Pick the one that’s closest to the way you thought of relying on God. Take that sticky note down, and write your commitment on the back of the sticky note. Then stick it back to the wall and pray silently by the wall, talking to God about your commitment.

Allow plenty of time for students to reflect, write on their sticky notes, and pray.

Talk With Students ■■■■

Lead students in this discussion. They can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- If you're willing to share, what did you write on your sticky note and talk to God about?
- How did this prayer activity change the way you view relying on God?
- How has God shown you he's worthy of your reliance?

Say: **God is more than worthy of our total dependence on him. When we rely on ourselves and our own abilities, we inevitably fail or get off track. David lived almost his entire life in true reliance on God, and that helped him succeed. This week, let's follow through on our commitments and remember that ► WE CAN RELY ON GOD.**

What You'll Do ■■■■

Have students get out their handbooks, or distribute "Taking It Home" handouts to all students. Say: **Let's think about how ► WE CAN RELY ON GOD more deeply every day!**

Direct students to find this week's Daily Challenges in their Senior High Handbooks or on their "Taking It Home" handouts and choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

- **Search for other verses in your Bible that remind you that God is always in control, and that we can always rely on him no matter what we're going through. Write those verses down and keep them where you can look at them as you need them.**
- **Where do you take God for granted right now? Invite him into those areas of your life. You could pray before every test, practice, or important event, asking for God's help and wisdom.**
- **Who do you know who really needs to rely on God right now? Share with him or her what God has done in your own life, and show God's faithfulness by being there for that person.**



Talk With Students

Ask:

- What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Share a time, a place, or other ideas.

Say: **God alone can provide the true success, worth, protection, and blessings we are looking for. As we grow closer to him and rely on him alone, he makes our lives something very special. Let's rely on him by following through with our Daily Challenges this week.**

Weaving Faith at Home

Encourage students to talk with their parents about the Daily Challenges they chose and what they learned about relying on God. Students can also do the "Talk With Your Families" activity in their handbooks or on their "Taking It Home" pages with their families.

Talk With Your Family

As a family, go online to find pictures or information about concentration camps during the Holocaust. Look through them together in order to get a good idea of Corrie ten Boom's living conditions as she wrote her letters. Then discuss these questions:

- What strikes you about Corrie's attitude? What is so amazing about it?
- How do you think Corrie found the strength to maintain that attitude?

Read Psalm 46:1-3, 10-11 with your family, and discuss these questions:

- When in your life have the mountains seemed to be falling and the oceans roaring?
- How do you usually respond to really difficult situations?
- Why do you or don't you believe that you can rely on God even in the most difficult moments of life?

Corrie's letters from prison and concentration camp are amazing testaments to her faith. As a family, write your own faith letters recounting difficult times in your lives and how God saw you through them. Seal the family's letters in an envelope, and keep them in a special place as a reminder that you can rely on God even in the most difficult times.

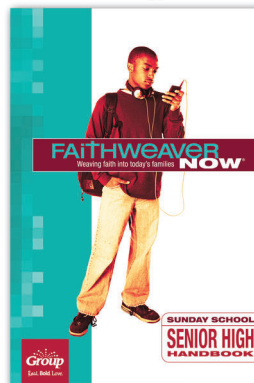
