Jeremiah 33:14-16

Ome senior highers have few points of reference for keeping promises. They rely on their parents, teachers, and coaches to show them what it means to stick to a commitment. And while most "role models" do an excellent job of keeping their word, some make breaking promises a habit. Most senior highers long for a God who is faithful—a God who keeps promises. Use this study to teach them that their God is the God who loves them and is faithful.



Prophets Foretell Jesus' Coming

Jeremiah 33:14-16



Jeremiah Preaches Hope in Times of Trouble

This passage was written nearly 600 years before Jesus was born. The northern kingdom of Israel had fallen to the Assyrians, who had in turn fallen to the Babylonians. Jeremiah also saw the fall of the southern kingdom of Judah to the Babylonians, concluding with the destruction of Jerusalem in 587 B.C.

Despite all that was going on around him, Jeremiah's message in this passage is one of hope. Repeating nearly word for word the message he had given in Jeremiah 23:5-6, Jeremiah utters here his most important message about the coming Messiah. This King would be a descendant of David but would rule with more wisdom, justice, and righteousness than any other king had ever done. This coming Messiah would not only rescue his people from their oppressors but also reunite the kingdoms of Israel and Judah, which had been divided since the death of Solomon more than 300 years earlier.

Jesus Fulfills Prophecy, but Not as Expected

After reading this passage, it's easy to understand why people of Jesus' day expected a Messiah who would lead them in throwing off Roman rule and restoring the unified kingdom of Israel. From our standpoint in history, we know that Jesus came first as the suffering servant (see Isaiah 53), drawing people to himself through his perfect life and his message of repentance. One day, however, Jesus will return to complete his fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies and rule as king over all heaven and earth.

As we look forward to our celebration of Jesus' birth, we can also look forward to the day Jesus will return to take those who believe in him to live with him in heaven. That's God's message of hope for Christians in today's broken world!

Your relationship with Jesus is an amazing gift. And God planned long ago to give you that gift. Thank him for this life-giving blessing!

Long ago, God chose to prepare the hearts of his people with the news that a Savior would come. As you prepare for Christmas, take some time to allow God's message of hope and salvation to sink in for you. Choose to believe God's promises—and allow the wonder of Jesus' incarnation to overwhelm you. Pray about your heart's desire to live this Christmas season immersed in the meaning of God's promises. What You'll Do

Welcome students to the group. Have students form pairs with people they don't know very well and decide which partner will be "A" and which will be "B." Have all the A's sit on one side of the room, across the room from their partners. Give each person six pieces of paper and a pen.

Say: We're going to play a game to see how well you can guess your partner's answer. I'll ask some questions. You'll write down your own answer or try to guess your partner's, depending on the instructions. Write it big so we can see it. Then we'll see how the two compare.

Ask the following questions, stopping after each to have partners hold up their answers and see if they match.

- What is partner A's favorite kind of fruit?
- What did partner B eat for dinner last night?
- Who is partner A's favorite teacher?
- What color is the floor in partner B's bedroom?
- What is partner A going to do this afternoon?
- What career does partner B aspire to?

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion. They can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- What clues, if any, did you use to help guide your guesses about your partner? How useful were they?
- Why is or isn't it possible to guess the right answers about something without prior knowledge?
- Tell about a time you were able to correctly guess something that would happen.

Say: We couldn't even guess correctly about things that have already happened! But in the Bible, there were people called prophets who could correctly talk about things that wouldn't happen for a very long time. The prophets weren't just making guesses—they were acting as God's microphone, sharing promises directly from him. Today we'll explore one of those prophecies and see how ▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE.

What You'll Do

Instead of doing the "People Predictions" activity, show students a clip from the movie 2012 that helps them think about predictions and prophecies. Begin the clip at 00:30:27, when Jackson (John Cusack) enters a dimly lit room. In this clip, Jackson watches a video made by a man who believes that the Mayan calendar predicted the world would end in 2012. End the clip at 00:32:44, when the animated video ends.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion. They can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- What do you think about theories like this about the end of the world?
- How might you view this prophecy differently if 2012 wasn't already in the past?
- What would have to happen for you to believe a prophecy about the end of the world?

Say: Clearly, the world didn't end in 2012. It's easy to look back and see if a prophecy came true after the time has passed! In the Bible, there were people called prophets who *could* predict the future accurately. These prophets weren't just making guesses—they were acting as God's microphone, sharing promises directly from him. Today we'll explore one of those prophecies and see how JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE.

A Gift From God

What You'll Do

Distribute Bibles. Have students form two groups. Group 1 will look at the prophecies in today's passage, Jeremiah 33:14-16. Group 2 will look at some prophecy fulfillments in the New Testament, in Luke 1:55; Matthew 1:17; John 5:26-27, 30; Luke 2:11; John 12:12-13; and the Key Verse, Matthew 1:22-23.

Give each group several index cards, markers, wrapping paper, scissors, and tape. Say: People sometimes think about Jesus as a gift. As we gear up for Christmas, let's put on this mindset. As you read your verses, think about what kind of gift they offer. Write each gift on an index card, and wrap up each card to look like a present.

Tell Group 1 to try to come up with at least five gifts: one from verse 14 and two each from verses 15 and 16. Group 2 should try to come up with one gift per verse. Group members will need to discuss and agree what each gift is.

After about 10 minutes, have groups exchange their gifts. Have groups open the gifts one at a time and read them aloud for everyone.

Talk With Students

Have groups discuss these questions. They can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- How did the gifts from the prophecy group relate to the gifts from the fulfillment group? What difference did you notice?
- In what ways might Jesus have been like or unlike what people expected?
- Which set of gifts did you like better? Why?
- Looking at both sets of gifts, how can you see that Jesus fulfilled God's promise?

Say: Jeremiah made several promises about who Jesus would be. And throughout the Old Testament, there were many other prophecies about Jesus. ▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE in each of these prophecies, but not always in the way people expected. And Jesus is God's promise to us, too. Let's explore our Bible passage some more in light of what it means in our lives.





Promise Gallery

What You'll Do

Give each student two pieces of paper, and set out colored pencils to share. Say: **Read** back through our passage, Jeremiah 33:14-16. Choose a promise that is meaningful to you personally. Draw about that promise and what it means to you. Include your name on the picture. Allow about seven minutes.

Say: Now think about a response to that promise—a promise you want to make to God as a gift in return. Draw about your promise to God. Include your name on the picture. Allow about seven minutes. As students work, hang up their pictures from the first set. As they finish their second drawings, hang those up as well.

Allow about seven more minutes for students to move around the room observing other people's artwork and asking the artists questions if they want to better understand the drawings.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion. They can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- What promise stood out to you from our Bible passage? Why?
- What promise did you want to make back to God?
- How does that promise show appreciation for his promises to you?

Say: JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE from Jeremiah 33. But that doesn't mean it's over. The Bible is full of promises of how Jesus continues to work in our lives. Let's appreciate and recognize how Jesus continues to fulfill God's promises in our lives, and let's give back to him.

Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

Have students get out their handbooks, or distribute "Taking It Home" handouts to all students. Say: Today we've seen that ▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. Let's discuss how we'll appreciate the gift of Jesus this week.

Direct students to find this week's Daily Challenges in their Senior High Handbooks or on their "Taking It Home" handouts. They may choose one or more of these three options:

- Search online for a list of prophecies about Jesus. Consider how Jesus has already fulfilled those prophecies and what that tells you about God. Pray about the way those promises have impacted your life.
- Search online for a list of predictions people have made about when the world would end. Many of these predicted times have come and gone already. Go over the list with a friend, and talk about what it means to you that God's prophecies did happen.
- Take home your artwork about promises. Commit to following through on your response promise to God.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Include a time, a place, and other ideas.

Say: Jeremiah lived way before Jesus was born. The two never got to meet. But Jeremiah knew all about what God promised to do. And ▶ JESUS FULFILLED GOD'S PROMISE. Let's recognize Jesus' promise as we follow through with our Daily Challenges.

Weaving Faith at Home

Encourage students to talk with their parents about the Daily Challenges they chose and what they learned about the promise of Jesus. Students can also do the "Talk With Your Family" activity in their handbooks or on their "Taking It Home" pages with their families.

Close in prayer. Lead students in silently praying through the passage. Pray: God, you declared that you would fulfill your promises. Thank you for the promises you've made to us. Pause for students to pray silently. You promised to send a Savior from David's line, and you did. Pause for students to thank God for sending Jesus. You promised that you would save your people. Thank you for saving us. Pause for students to thank God for salvation. In Jesus' name, amen.

Talk With Your Family

Read Deuteronomy 31:6, and discuss the following questions with your family:

- What does this promise of God mean to you right now?
- When have you experienced this promise in action?
- When has it been hard for you to believe in God's promise?
- In what way did Jesus help make this promise possible for us?

Have family members stick a piece of tape on an article of clothing for the day. (It can be in a pocket or inside a pant leg if you want it to be hidden.) At the end of the day, reflect on how well the tape stayed with you and discuss how that is like or unlike God's promise of his presence in your life.


