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Jesus Teaches About Commitment Mark 8:31-38

S enior high students may be anxious to stray away from the closely knit social groups they grew up with and discover new ideas or concepts individually or with new peer groups. As you explore this study with your students, be sure to bring out the idea that Jesus is the perfect person to follow. Whether your students feel comfortable with their peer groups or desire to explore new life experiences with new friends, help them understand that following God first is the best way to live—and it's worth the cost.



Jesus Teaches About Commitment

Mark 8:31-38



Jesus Rebuked Peter

The disciples were likely counting on a great earthly kingdom in which Jesus would lead the Jews in overthrowing the Romans and would place his disciples in important positions. Jesus' statements didn't go along with those expectations! Peter wanted Jesus to change his mind and forget all this talk about dying.

Peter's thinking was based on wrong assumptions because he saw things from a purely human point of view. Here we see a clear statement about what it means to follow Jesus. Too often we think of God as a powerful being who can help us advance our own agendas. Instead, truly following Jesus means listening to what he says, discovering his will for our lives, and then obediently following, no matter how attractive or repulsive that may seem to us at the time.

Jesus Challenged the Crowd

A crowd had apparently gathered to hear Jesus, and he wanted to clarify his meaning. This is not a description of what some call "easy believism." Instead, Jesus points out how denying oneself means turning away from selfish, self-protective attitudes and seeking the true humility and faith God wants to see in us.

What does it mean to take up your cross? For Jesus' disciples to each take up his own cross didn't mean just to endure suffering. It meant to accept fully the suffering they would face because of their faith in Christ. Jesus wanted his disciples to know that their faith came with a cost.

Stand Firm in Faith

As he spoke of what it means to follow him, Jesus knew that many in the crowd around him wouldn't

be followers he would recognize as his own when he returns. Our generation is much like that of Jesus' day. People who claim to be religious—or even Christian—often shy away from bold witnessing for Jesus. It's easy to say you believe in God, but it's much more difficult to confess you're a Jesus-following Christian.

The Jesus Connection

Humans are willing to sacrifice a lot for the sake of those they love. Your relationship with Jesus will require sacrifice, risk, and loyal commitment—but it's all worth it!

How can you take up your cross? Try living out the "Joy" acronym: Pray about one specific way you'll put *Jesus* first (such as spending time with him first thing each day), put *others* second (such as washing a friend's car), and put *yourself* last (such as giving up time watching TV in order to help someone else). You can write your prayer here.

Would You Commit?

What You'll Do

Welcome students to the group. Say: We're going to begin today with a game of Would You Commit? I'm going to give you a series of options. If you'd be willing to make that commitment—even if it were real—you'll go to this side of the room. Point to one side of the room. If you don't think the rewards are worth it, you'll go to the other side of the room. Point. Ready?

Read aloud the following choices, allowing time after each one for students to choose sides and then for a few people from each side to explain their choice.

- If someone walked in right now and offered \$1 million cash to anyone who
 would commit to eating nothing but broccoli for the rest of their lives, would
 you commit to that?
- If you found out you could be a famous pop star, but the thing that would launch you to fame would be losing your legs, would you commit to that?
- If you found out you could live in a giant mansion with all the food and clothes you could ever want, but you'd have to go to school 10 hours a day every day until you're 40, would you commit to that?
- If you found out you could live a long, happy life, but you'd always be poor, would you commit to that?
- If you could eat your absolute favorite meal today, but you'd be sick for a week, would you commit to that?
- If you knew for a fact you could get your dream job when you're 30 but that it
 would require college, getting a masters, and getting a doctorate, would you
 commit to that?
- If you found out you could have everything you want in life, but you'll die at age 35, would you commit to that?
- If you knew you'd have to live completely selflessly, work really hard, suffer a lot, be made fun of, but it was all for a good purpose, would you commit to that?

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion. Students can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- How did you weigh the costs of your commitment versus what you would gain?
- Tell about a commitment you made. What helped you decide to make it?
- Tell about an opportunity you missed out on but now wish you'd taken.

Say: Life can be full of tough choices. One of those choices is following Jesus as a Christian. Some people think that following Jesus means you'll have a nice cushy life and always be happy. But that's not really how Jesus described it! Let's look at what it really takes to ▶ COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS, and let's honestly weigh the question—would we commit to that?



Media Connection (Option)

What You'll Do

Instead of doing the "Would You Commit?" activity, have students form as many groups as there are tablets and smartphones. Then have students use Photobooth or a similar app to take distorted, goofy photos of themselves. Allow several minutes for students to experiment and come up with their favorite shots to show off.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion. Students can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

■ How did you make sure to get the goofiest-looking picture?

- What are some things Christians do that might seem goofy to non-Christians?
- Why do you think those things are or aren't worthwhile?

Say: The way Jesus described following him might look pretty goofy to non-Christians. Following Jesus involves suffering and putting ourselves last. Let's look at what it really takes to ▶ COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS, and let's consider whether we're willing to take the risk of looking goofy to those around us.

Have students form groups of four. Distribute Bibles as needed, and have everyone open to Mark 8:31-33. Say: **We're going to read a passage where Jesus seems to treat Peter pretty harshly. Let's read it and talk about why.** Invite someone to read aloud Mark 8:31-33.

Talk With Students

Have groups discuss these questions. Students can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- What's your reaction to Jesus' response to Peter? Too harsh, or deserved? Explain.
- What are some possible reasons Jesus might've responded so harshly?
- What does Jesus' reaction show about his commitment to die on the cross?
- What does it mean for you to have in mind the concerns of God?

Ask groups to share some highlights from their conversations.

Say: We can't be totally sure why Jesus called Peter "Satan" when Peter rebuked Jesus for saying he would die. Jesus may have been recognizing that Satan was using Peter to tempt him into not suffering on the cross or distract him from the mission. Whatever the case, it's pretty clear that Jesus was committed to suffering and dying for us. But do we have to do the same to ▶ COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS? Let's read on and consider how our commitment compares with Jesus'.

Counting the Costs

What You'll Do

Have groups split into pairs, and give each pair several index cards, pens, and two paper bags. Also set out string, scissors, and tape to share.

Say: In order to weigh the costs and rewards of following Jesus, we're going to need to make a scale. First, label one bag "Costs" and the other "Rewards." Then cut a long piece of string and tape one end to the inside of each bag. One partner in each pair will stand with his or her arm extended and have the string draped over the extended arm. You'll want the bags to hang evenly a couple of feet off the ground. Allow time for students to set up their scales.

Say: Whoever's not holding the scale will be the scribe. As a pair, you'll read Mark 8:34-38 and consider the costs and rewards of following Jesus. The scribe will record the pair's ideas on index cards. You can also add in your own thoughts that aren't listed in the passage. Put the costs in the Costs bag and the rewards in the Rewards bag, and see how that impacts your scale. Allow about 10 minutes.

Say: Some of your scales may make following Jesus seem like it might not be worth the cost. But there's one reward that outweighs all the costs—eternal life. Drop two pieces of candy in each pair's Rewards bag, and watch those bags drop to the floor. Then allow pairs to set their scales down and eat the candy.



Talk With Students

Lead everyone in this discussion. Students can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- What were some of the costs you listed? rewards?
- How did things seem to compare before I added the candy to your rewards bag?
- What does this passage tell you about what it's like to follow Jesus?
- Why do you or don't you believe that denying yourself and taking up a cross is worth it?

Say: Peter tried to make Jesus' mission much less than it was. He wanted Jesus to live a long and easy life. But that's not what following Jesus is about. Jesus made it pretty clear that following him will be hard. There will be suffering. We'll have to put God's desires before our own. But if we don't make that commitment, we forfeit our souls! The choice is clear:

COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS.



Take Up Your Cross

What You'll Do

Say: Taking up a cross might not sound so bad today. We're pretty used to seeing crosses as jewelry, on Bibles, or around churches. But when Jesus talked about taking up your cross, people knew crosses as only one thing: a torturous way for criminals to die. Why would Jesus want that for his people?

Taking up your cross means being willing to do anything—even really hard things—if that's what Jesus calls you to. It means giving up the lives we may want in favor of the lives God calls us to. So what does taking up your cross look like right now? Let's make crosses and then write some ideas on them.

Give each student two craft sticks and a pen. Have students each break one stick so it's about $^2/_3$ its original length and use scissors to trim the end to be smoother. Then have students make a cross shape with the two craft sticks and wrap yarn around the intersection several times to hold the cross in place. When they're done, have students tie a knot to hold the yarn in place.

Say: Now it's time to really think about what taking up your cross looks like. Try to come up with at least four ideas, and write each idea on one arm of the cross. If you think of more than four, write them on the back. Then take a few minutes to pray on your own that God will help you carry your cross this week in those ways. Allow time for writing and silent prayer.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion. Students can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- What are some things you wrote on your cross?
- What will you have to give up in order to follow through with those things?

Read aloud the Key Verse, Romans 1:16: "I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God for the salvation of everyone who believes: first for the Jew, then for the Gentile" (Romans 1:16).

Ask:

Do you feel at all ashamed to do any of the things you wrote on your cross? Explain.

Say: Jesus eventually did take up a real cross. He carried it up the hill, was nailed to it, and died for you. He suffered the ultimate punishment of a criminal even though he was perfect. He showed the utmost commitment to you. Carry your craft-stick cross in your pocket or purse this week, and consider how you can carry your cross and COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS.

What You'll Do

Have students get out their handbooks, or distribute "Taking It Home" handouts to all students. Say: Today we've seen what it takes to ▶ COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS. Are you willing to go all in? Let's commit to carrying our crosses this week.

Direct students to find this week's Daily Challenges section in their Senior High Handbooks or on their "Taking It Home" handouts and fill it in with one thing they wrote on their craft-stick crosses.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion.

Ask:

What's a practical way you're going to do your Daily Challenge? Include a time, a place, and other ideas.

Say: Jesus didn't make following him sound very easy! But when we ▶ COMMIT TO FOLLOW JESUS, we'll reap eternal benefits. Let's commit to Jesus as we follow through with our Daily Challenge.


