God Tests Abraham

Genesis 22:1-18

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

A Preface for Today's Material

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This account may seem horrifying if one doesn't study it carefully. It's hard to understand how our good God could command a parent to sacrifice a child. But if we examine the text, we can take comfort in knowing that God never intended for Abraham to sacrifice Isaac. The whole event was designed to test Abraham; it was a chance for him to grow his faith and learn about God's faithfulness.

Abraham Obeys God's Command to Sacrifice His Son

Isaac was the embodiment of all of God's promises to Abraham. However, no matter how surprised or saddened he must have been, Abraham obeyed. The Bible says he set out the next day. When Abraham knew what God wanted him to do, he set out to do it.

Abraham's faith in God and his willingness to obey are truly amazing. Not only was he willing to sacrifice his son, but he maintained faith in God's promise about Isaac. He said to his servants, "We will come back to you" (Genesis 22:5). Somehow Abraham was confident that in spite of this recent command, God would preserve Isaac, through whom God had promised to make Abraham's descendants as numerous as the stars in the heavens!

Abraham and Isaac Journey to the Place of Sacrifice

It took Abraham and Isaac three days to travel about 50 miles over rough, mountainous terrain. During the trip, Abraham had time to think. Certainly questions flooded his mind: "What if God really does let Isaac die? What will I tell Sarah? Might this God I'm serving abandon me now after all these promises?" Abraham could easily have justified disobedience in this case after all, this was the child God had promised to him and Sarah; maybe the voice he had heard wasn't God's after all. But whatever thoughts went through his mind, Abraham never swerved from his steadfast obedience.

Isaac Also Obeyed God

The Bible tells us nothing of Isaac's thoughts or feelings during this trip. He must have noticed that his father was behaving strangely. But Isaac showed faith, too. He submitted to being placed on the altar in obedience to God's command.

The Jesus Connection

God loves us and he loved Abraham. God's test helped Abraham realize his own commitment to God, and the tests in our lives can help strengthen and deepen our faith, too.

How can you trust God in the middle of trials and difficulty? Invite God into your decisions and challenges and trust him to lead you no matter what the road ahead looks like. You can write your prayer below.

Obedience Objectives

What You'll Do

Welcome students to the group. Say: Today we're going to be talking about obedience, so let's start by seeing how well you obey my commands. For some of them, you may have to close your eyes.

Give the following commands, and allow time for students who are able to obey to do so. Many of these commands will be impossible for most students.

- If you're wearing red, close your eyes for this command: High five someone.
- Sit on the floor with your back against someone else's.
- If you're wearing something in your hair, close your eyes for this command: Stand up without letting your back separate from your partner's.
- High five everyone in this group within five seconds.
- Flip your eyelids inside out.
- Say the alphabet backward in under 20 seconds.
- Roll your tongue.
- Hum a middle C.
- If you're wearing socks, close your eyes for this command: Touch the ceiling.
- Wiggle your ears without touching them.
- If you have words on your clothes, close your eyes for this command: Lick your elbow.
- **Touch your thumb to the wrist of the same hand.**
- Touch your nose with your tongue.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion. Students can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- How much effort did you put into obeying every command? Were you successful? Explain.
- When in your life have you tried to complete something but were unable to?
- How was this activity like life?
- How was it like obeying God?

Say: Sometimes it seems like God asks us to do the impossible. But today we'll look at a man who obeyed God even though it seemed to have a cost that was impossible to pay. We're going to talk about what it looks like for us to ► OBEY GOD. God calls us to a radical obedience to him and his laws, an obedience that goes way beyond what the world can imagine.

What You'll Do

Instead of doing the "Obedience Objectives" activity, show students a clip from the movie *Big Fish* that helps them think about decisions and the risks and rewards of choosing to obey. Begin the clip at 00:27:38, when Ed's voice-over says, "There were two roads out of Ashton." In this clip, Ed decides to take a rarely used, scary path instead of taking the easy road. End the clip at 00:30:37, when Ed walks into a sunny neighborhood.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion. Students can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- How was Ed's choice like or unlike choosing the path of obedience?
- What risks are there to obeying?
- What are the rewards?

Say: Sometimes obeying God definitely looks like taking the hard road. But today we'll look at a man who obeyed God even though it seemed to have a cost that was impossible to pay—and he was rewarded for it. We're going to talk about what it looks like for us to \blacktriangleright OBEY GOD. God calls us to a radical obedience to him and his laws, an obedience that goes way beyond what the world can imagine.

2 BIBLE EXPLORATION

Awesome Obedience

What You'll Do

Have students form groups of four. Distribute Bibles as needed, and have everyone open to Genesis 22:1-18. Say: As we read today's passage, we're going to take turns sharing stories about our experiences with obedience. But since obedience is all about action, you won't just tell your story. Someone from your group will act out every verb you use as you tell about your experience.

To begin, read Genesis 22:1-2 with your group. Allow time, and then say: One person in each group, share a story about a time you knew God wanted you to do something. Include how you responded to God's call. As you share, the person to your right will act out all your verbs. Allow time.

Have groups read Genesis 22:3-6. Say: Another person in each group, share about a time you sacrificed something in order to obey. As you share, the person to your right will act out all the verbs. Allow time.

Have groups read Genesis 22:7-14. Say: Another person in each group, share about a time you felt a lot of trust in God as you obeyed. As you share, the person to your right will act out all the verbs. Allow time.

Have groups read Genesis 22:15-18. Say: The last person in each group will now share about a time you obeyed and received a reward for it. As you share, the person to your right will act out all the verbs. Allow time.

Talk With Students

Have groups discuss these questions. Students can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- Why is it important to *do* the right thing—not just talk about it?
- What can you learn from Abraham about how to actively obey?
- In what ways does obedience require trust in God?

Say: Obedience usually involves risks and sacrifice. A lot of the time, obeying God costs us something that we want. For Abraham, it meant being willing to sacrifice the most precious thing in his life—his own son. But he was willing to ▶ OBEY GOD no matter what the cost. Let's see how we can have that commitment.

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Straight Path

What You'll Do

Have everyone open to the Key Verse, Deuteronomy 5:32-33. Say: **Today's Key Verse talks** about whom we are supposed to obey. Deuteronomy 5:32-33 says, "So be careful to do what the Lord your God has commanded you; do not turn aside to the right or to the left. Walk in all the way that the Lord your God has commanded you, so that you may live and prosper and prolong your days in the land that you will possess."

God expects us to do what he asks. It's easy to want to do only so much of what God commands and then quit. But that's not obedience. God wants us to completely follow him.

Have students form groups of three. Give each trio an index card and markers. Have groups brainstorm about the blessings that come from obeying God and write those ideas on their index cards. For example, students might write ideas such as "adventure," "deeper trust," or "a stronger walk with God." As students are brainstorming, stick a long strip of masking tape to the floor of the room.

When groups have finished, have them take turns reading their cards aloud and then place the cards faceup on the tape an equal distance from other cards. Give two or three students a large beach ball or a paper wad each, and have those students stand on either side of the line, about 3 feet from it. Have everyone else stand at one end of the line.

Say: Let's see how well you walk this line when distractions come your way.

Have students begin walking down the line. The students with the balls or paper wads will try to force the others to step off the line by throwing the beach balls at them. As students step off the line, have them go back to the beginning and try again. Congratulate students who are able to walk the entire distance without stepping off the line. Get into the game yourself and your students will find it especially entertaining—they'll probably get more into it themselves.

Allow time at the end for those who were throwing the balls to have a turn trying to walk the line while new students take the throwing role.

Talk With Students

Lead students in this discussion. Students can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- How is this activity like trying to obey God?
- What might the beach balls (or paper wads) represent? Be specific.
- What types of things tempt you to disobey God?
- What might you gain by "staying on the line"?

Say: Now let's try another approach.

Have students form groups of three and gather at one end of the tape. Signal the students with the beach balls to get ready. Instruct trios to walk down the line together, each student with his or her hands on the shoulders of the person in front. Give students the signal to begin. As groups begin to walk, signal the beach ball throwers to begin bombarding the trios. Let all trios walk the line; then discuss.

Ask:

- How was this experience different from the one before?
- What does this experience teach you about others' support?
- When have you needed a friend to help support your obedience?
- What types of people can you surround yourself with as you attempt to obey God?

Abraham did it without support from friends, but think how much easier it would've been if he'd had friends to encourage him. As we seek to ▶ OBEY GOD, we can help and encourage one another. Let's commit right now to how we'll ▶ OBEY GOD.

Making It Happen

What You'll Do

Give everyone a pen and a copy of the "I Will Obey" handout, or have students turn to page 14 in their handbooks. Say: **Previously in Genesis, God had made a covenant** with Abraham to give him a son. It was kind of like a modern-day contract. Now, God had fulfilled his contract but was asking Abraham to give his son back! Let's make contracts with God that we'll obey. Complete the sentence starters on your handout, and sign it as a commitment to follow God.

When teens have finished, have them form pairs and share the highlights of their contracts.

Talk With Students

Lead everyone in this discussion. Students can find these questions in their Senior High Handbooks.

Ask:

- What do you think will be the hardest part of keeping your contract?
- Why did you include the promises you did in your contract?

Say: Maybe Abraham had his covenant with God in mind as he hiked along with Isaac. Maybe he remembered that God had promised him many descendants—and since Isaac hadn't had grandkids for Abraham yet, God couldn't possibly take Isaac away. We know that God is faithful. The question is, are we faithful to ▶ OBEY GOD? Let's be faithful by following through on the promises we made in our contracts.

Encourage students to talk with their parents about the Daily Challenges they chose and what they learned about obedience. Students can also do the "Talk With Your Family" activity in their handbooks or on their "Taking It Home" pages with their families.
