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
# INTRODUCTION

# What Kids Will Do

Kids see a sheet of paper become taller than them.

# Cut a Spiral

Hold up a sheet of paper for children to see.

## Ask:

• What things can you do with a sheet of paper?

Say: I'm going to do something really amazing—and kind of impossible. I'm going to make this sheet of paper taller than any of you.

## Ask:

## • Do you believe I can do that? Why?

Cut a spiral shape—in a single, continuous cut—from the outer edge of the paper to the center of the paper. Make the cut about one-half inch wide. (The narrower the cut, the longer the spiral will be.)

As you cut, say: God sent an angel to tell Mary and Joseph he'd send his Son,

### Jesus, as a baby. To Mary and Joseph, that seemed *impossible*. But <u>God does</u> <u>the impossible</u>!

Supplies
paper
scissors

When you've finished cutting, ask a child to hold one end of the spiral to the ground while you hold the other end as high as you can.

Have children take turns jumping to see if the paper is taller than they can jump.

## Talk About It

Ask:

- What did you think when you saw me do something impossible with this paper?
- Why do you think God does impossible things?

Say: I had a plan for this little sheet of paper. I wanted it to do something big and amazing! God has plans, too... and sometimes he has to do something impossible to make those plans happen. <u>God did something impossible</u> when he sent his Son, Jesus. <u>God does the</u> <u>impossible.</u>





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
