GENESIS

GOD MADE THE WORLD

Genesis 1:1–31

What Kids Will Do: Create three-dimensional panoramic scenes of the creation of day and night, land and water.

What Kids Will Need: white poster board, colored construction paper, glue, crayons or markers, scissors (You may want to provide star stickers also.)

Preparation Place: Cut poster board into two 8x10-inch pieces. Make slits in the center of the *bottom* of one and the center of the *top* of the other. Hold the pages perpendicular to each other, and connect the two pieces by sliding the slits into each other.

EASY Steps

CREATION CRAFTS

1. Give each child a poster board "book" that you made before class. Show children how to lay the book flat so two pages are facing them. Write, "God made daytime" across the two pages. Then instruct children to create a picture of daytime across the two pages by tearing construction paper into shapes such as sun, clouds, and blue sky. Let children glue the shapes to the pages.
2. Children may flip to another opening, where you'll write, "God made nighttime." Have children glue torn pieces of black construction paper to represent night. You may want to provide star stickers to add to the picture of night.
3. Let children open to two more pages. Write, "God made the land and plants." Children may tear construction paper to make trees, flowers, plants, and land. Help children glue the shapes to the poster board.
4. Let children open to the last two pages. Write, "God made the ocean." Have children tear blue construction paper to make the ocean and then tear paper to represent creatures that live in the sea. Children may glue these into the last blank pages.



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PRESCHOOL CONNECTION

When children have finished, collect craft supplies. Read Genesis 1:1-23 aloud from the Bible so children know the passage is in God's Word. Then ask:

- **What is your favorite thing that God made?**
- **How can you thank God for making that?**

Say: **God has made so many wonderful things. You can use your panoramas to thank God for everything he made. Let's pray and thank God for such a wonderful world.**

As children pray, let them point to things they've added to their crafts and thank God for making those things.

GOD MADE THE WORLD

Genesis 1:1-31

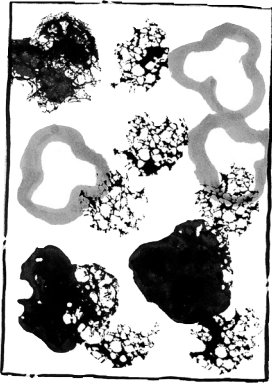
What Kids Will Do: Use vegetables to make picture reminders of the vegetation God made.

What Kids Will Need: construction paper; paper towels; washable paint; shallow paper plates; forks; knife; vegetables and fruits such as broccoli, potatoes, green peppers, apples, oranges, and kiwi fruit

Preparation Place: Place a few folded paper towels on a paper plate. Pour a few tablespoons of paint onto the folded paper towels, and spread it around to saturate the "pad." Cut each fruit or vegetable so that a creative pattern is revealed. Stick a fork into the uncut side of the fruit or vegetable to create a handle for children to use.

EASY Steps

PLANT PRINTS



1. Show children the fruits and vegetables you've cut. Point out the interesting shapes and the seeds that are exposed in some of the fruit.
2. Encourage the children to press the cut side of the fruits and vegetables into the paint and then press them on their papers to make prints.
3. As children work, remind them that God made everything—even the plants that grow these fruits and vegetables!

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PRESCHOOL CONNECTION

When children have finished their projects, collect craft supplies, and set the pictures aside to dry. Open your Bible to Genesis 1:11-13, and show children the words. Explain the story in your own preschool-friendly words. Ask:

- Why do you think God made plants like the ones we used in our craft?
- How are these plants the same? How are they different?
- What is a favorite fruit or vegetable you like to eat?

Say: I'm so glad God made yummy fruits and vegetables! They taste good and help keep our bodies strong and healthy. When you look at your Plant Print, you might get hungry. Then you can eat some tasty fruits or vegetables and thank God for his wonderful creation!

Bring in fruits and vegetables that you've washed and cut into bite-size pieces. Let children taste some of the fruit and vegetable pieces and thank God for this good food.
