And you want to share all of that with kids in your community!



Before True North



Pray for everyone who will attend True North.

Ask God to prepare your heart and the hearts of the youth and leaders who will be part of True North.



Choose a room for teenagers to meet in.

Ideally, your room should be large and off by itself a little. You'll need access to an outdoor area for games.



Recruit an assistant to help coordinate activities and transitions.

Having a teammate will make things go more smoothly for you!



Work with the VBS Director to collect necessary supplies.

Almost all the supplies are easy to find around the church, from church members, or from Group.



Create an exciting environment.

Keep decorations simple by taping the Bible Verse Posters to the wall. Or make your Summit area look like a beautiful snowy mountain landscape! Find fun decorating ideas on the Decorating Places: True North downloadable video, or brainstorm with other leaders on facebook.com/groupvbs and on Pinterest.



Read this manual ahead of time.

Check the supply lists and note what preparations are needed for each activity. The snacks are the same ones the elementary and preschool kids are enjoying.

During True North



Warmly welcome teenagers at Sing & Play Peak.

Teenagers participate in Sing & Play Peak each day, where all ages worship, sing awesome songs, and learn the day's Bible Point and Bible verse.



Use an attention-getting signal.

Attention-getting signals let teenagers know when it's time to stop what they're doing and look at you. Use the Wilderness Whistle (available from group.com or your Group VBS supplier) or another signal of your choice.



Wilderness Whistle



Repeat the daily Bible Point often.

Every activity focuses on one memorable Bible truth called the Bible Point. Repeating the Bible Point helps students remember it and apply it to their lives after True North.



Call on teens' Crew roles.

Teenagers choose one of six jobs for the week: Reader, Prayer Person, Guide, Coach, Materials Manager, or Tundra Treats Coordinator. Teens love when those jobs get called on!



Encourage teenagers to participate in God Sightings.

All participants share God Sightings everyday clues that God is present, passionate, and active in our world. (See page 6 for more information.)



Close each day at Compass Closing.

Join everyone for this fun and exciting closing each day.

God Sightings[®]

God hasn't retired, you know. He's as busy now as he's ever been. But until you see that with your own eyes, it's tough to have a vibrant faith. God can seem distant or impersonal. We have to make it a habit to keep an eye out for the daily overwhelming evidence that God is doing great things all around us.

At True North, everyone learns to look for God Sightings—everyday clues that God is present, passionate, and active in our world. A God Sighting is simply an acknowledgment that God has done something. It's giving God credit where credit is due. It's developing a God-focused view and a grateful heart. Younger children, teenagers, and adults will discover that they can see God's hand in things like Scripture, people, circumstances, and nature.

As teenagers make God Sightings part of everyday life, their faith will grow because they'll actually see God at work. Not because he's suddenly shown up, but because they finally have eyes to see...and at last, they're looking.

- Watch for God. Ask your True North Director to get a
 Watch for God Wristband for each teenager. These flexible
 wristbands remind participants to keep their eyes open for
 things God is doing around them.
- Share God Sightings. Everyone learns about God Sightings at Compass Closing on Day 1. Then beginning on Day 2 at Sing & Play Peak, Crews will share and document one way they have seen evidence of God.
- Celebrate God Sightings with the world! If you'd like, you can even encourage teenagers to share their God Sightings on social media with the hashtag #GodSighting. Let everyone hear the amazing things God is still doing in our world today!

Kids Helping Kids

You'll simply need to show teenagers where the donation station is located.

Planning for Operation Kid-to-Kid

Before True North

- **Think big!** Set a goal for how many kids you'd like your youth group to help.
- Create an interactive display. Your True North Director will set up the Operation Kid-to-Kid Poster Pack, which includes everything needed to create a large, eye-catching, engaging way to publicize this outreach opportunity and a spot to collect donations!



The kids on the posters help your teenagers connect a person to the project, discovering that their dollars impact real kids who are a lot like them. You may want to enhance your display by setting it on a table, surrounded by warm clothing, blankets, hats, and gloves.

During True North

- Encourage teenagers to pray for children and their families who will receive the new clothes. Your youth group can pray for the families who will soon receive the comforting warmth of new cold-weather clothing.
- Talk about Operation Kid-to-Kid every day. Every day except Day 1 has a service project that connects to Operation Kid-to-Kid. Don't skip this connection! Have your Sing & Play Peak Leader connect Operation Kid-to-Kid to God Sightings—how we can be evidence of God's love! Rather than making service an "add-on" component, look for ways to naturally weave it into your program.



Compassion...or Competition?

You may be used to holding contests to persuade teenagers to participate in mission projects. We encourage you to consider the message you send when you use these methods. Infusing competition into service projects is unnecessary and detracts from the heart of missions. Instead, help teenagers discover the joy that comes from sharing with others and develop hearts of compassion that will stick with teenagers long after VBS! Rewards like watching someone get a pie in the face don't have long-lasting impact. We've found that teenagers participate wholeheartedly without any extrinsic rewards.

When we wonder, we can trust Jesus.

Bible Verse: "Anyone who listens to my teaching and


follows it is wise." (Matthew 7:24)

Bible Story: John prepares the way and baptizes

Jesus. (Matthew 3: 11:1-6)

Jesus' cousin John came with unconventional clothes, a pauper's diet, and a bold message: "Repent, for the Kingdom of Heaven is near." Meaning? Jesus the Messiah and fulfillment of God's kingdom on earth—is here! John proclaimed Jesus' power and authority. He resisted the very idea of baptizing Jesus, the one who would baptize with fire and the Holy Spirit! While John adamantly proclaimed Christ, even he had questions about Jesus. From prison, John sent a message to Jesus, asking, "Are you the Messiah we've been expecting, or should we keep looking for someone else?" John's circumstances may have caused him to wonder if (and when) Jesus might take political action. Scholars ponder if John may have assumed the Messiah would be the one to rescue God's people from Roman rule—as many Jews of the time anticipated. However, Jesus had a greater mission than anyone could comprehend. He came to save the world from sin. Such love and compassion go beyond anything we can understand or imagine!

Kids' curiosity can be intimidating—and a bit wearying. They have so many questions, many of which we simply can't answer. And when it comes to questions about Jesus, God, or the Bible, adults can really feel overwhelmed and underprepared. But we don't have to have all the answers! Sometimes our wonderings can lead to true wonder, as we discover the mystery and marvel of God. Today, celebrate curiosity and questions. Point kids to Jesus, a trustworthy and true friend who will guide us as we seek to know and understand him better.



Pointing to Jesus

People (even John the Baptist) wondered about Jesus. This passage can encourage kids that it's okay to ask questions about Jesus—he will always help us find the truth.

Day 1: When We Wonder, We Can Trust Jesus



SING & PLAY PEAK (25 minutes)

Welcome your group at Sing & Play Peak. Everyone will enjoy singing the theme song and other upbeat music.

On the first day, when the elementary Crews start discussing Crew roles, take your group to the room you'll be meeting in for the week.

WELCOME AND FORMING CREWS (15 minutes)

Supplies:

- adhesive name tags (1 per person)
- markers or pens (1 per person)
- · copies of the "True North Expedition" handout on p. 23 (1 per person)
- · copies of the "Crew Roles" handout on p. 24 (1 for every 6 teens)

Hand out the name tags and markers.

Have everyone write his or her name on a tag and attach it near the collar of his or her shirt.

All week at True North, we're exploring God's Word to discover why we can trust Jesus.

COMPASS CLUE

When teenagers join elementary kids for Sing & Play Peak and Compass Closing, they'll learn a response and motion to do every time they hear the Point. While this is a great reinforcement tool for children, we've left out the response from the Summit Youth Leader Manual.



There's so much to explore in the vast state of Alaska. But it's a lot more fun to journey with a buddy! Here at True North, we're all in this together. We'll grow in friendship with each other, wonder together, and make discoveries about faith together.

> You probably have some big questions about faith! And when we wonder, we can trust Jesus!

Maybe you have questions about the people in our group. So to start our journey, let's spend time getting to know others right now!

Give each person a copy of the "True North Expedition" handout, and allow time for everyone to rate their top three picks of how they'd like to visit Alaska.

Have teens share their picks and form groups based on their top picks.

If groups of "top picks" are larger than six people, help those groups divide into equal groups. Some smaller groups may need to combine. You'll want each group to have around six members but no more than six.

After groups are set, teenagers can take turns introducing themselves and sharing the reason they chose their top pick from the handout.

There's so much to explore this week. And as we go on this journey, you'll hang out with this Crew of people. You'll stick together for small-group discussions, team up in games, and get to know each other over the week.

You don't all have to be best friends now or even by the end of the week. But if you genuinely agree as a Crew to be a group of people who listen to each other, respect everyone's experiences and opinions—even if you can't relate or you disagree—and refuse to start or take part in making fun of each other, you'll be guaranteed to have an amazing adventure together.

Give a copy of the "Crew Roles" handout to each Crew, and have a willing person in each Crew read the handout aloud.

Crew members write the name of each person next to a role on the handout to remember who's doing what through the week.

Put the handouts somewhere Crews can find them, if needed, later in the week.

Let's start our adventure with a game that will help you explore things you've never seen!










Before You Hit the Trail

Use cones to mark the boundaries of your play area.





Demonstrate the sound of your Wilderness Whistle, and let Crews know you'll start and stop most games during the week with that sound, so they'll want to listen carefully for it.

Maybe you've played the game Marco Polo before. Marco Polo was a famous explorer who spent a lot of his time traveling in China. But we're not in China! We're in Alaska. So we'll play the same game using the name of a British explorer who scoped out Alaska in 1778. We'll play James Cook!

- 1. Choose one teenager to be the first Explorer.
- 2. The Explorer will close his or her eyes while everyone else spreads out around the playing area.
- 3. The Explorer will carry the bucket of sponge balls.
- 4. Whenever the Explorer says, "James," everyone else must say (not whisper), "Cook!"
- 5. Teens can take slow-motion side steps during the game but may not move other than that.
- 6. The Explorer will try to use his or her sense of hearing to find other teens. Then the Explorer will attempt to throw a sponge ball and hit other teens.
- 7. If someone gets hit, he or she is out.



- 8. When the bucket is empty, the round ends and you can refill it and choose a new Explorer.
- 9. Play the Sing & Play Peak Music quietly in the background while Crews play.
- 10. Turn off the music and sound your Wilderness Whistle when it's time to move on.

ASK In this game, how did you feel when you were the Explorer?

When have you felt [words teens shared] about something in your life? Share your own example before inviting Crews to share. This models vulnerability and also gives teenagers a chance to think about their own stories.

In our game, you could call out and listen when you weren't sure where people were. What can you do when you wonder about faith and life?

When you were the Explorer, there was a lot you didn't know. You wondered where people were and hoped you were hitting your target with the sponge ball! Life can be like that, too. Sometimes we just aren't sure what's going on! We might wonder if we have things right. It's a lot like James Cook exploring Alaska, not sure what he'd find. But when we wonder, we can trust Jesus! We can call out to him for help!

Have teens help you put all the balls back into the bucket.

Allow about five minutes for teens to take a break before gathering back together for the Bible Study.

BIBLE STUDY: I Wonder... (45 minutes)

- Bibles, bookmarked at Matthew 3 (1 per Crew)
- paper
- pencils
- timer
- volunteer who can do a brief visit, dressed strangely

Question Everything

SIV Since we're talking about wonder today, I wonder...what you wonder!

> Let's see who can come up with the most questions in one minute. They don't have to be questions about God—just anything you wonder about!

Have Materials Managers help you distribute paper and pencils. When you say "go," you'll start the timer and allow one minute for teens to write their questions individually.

After a minute, tell teens to put their pencils down and then compare questions with others in their Crew. Remind Guides to facilitate the discussion.



ASK What were some of the best questions you heard from your Crew members?



 \mathbf{M} We all have things we wonder about. They can be smaller wonderings like "I wonder what size sandal Jesus wore" or bigger wonderings like "I wonder why God allows so much evil to happen in our world." Today we'll discover that when we wonder, we can trust Jesus!





Here's a little bit of background for our Bible story. God had promised his people that he would send a Messiah—someone to save them. They thought the Messiah would save them from oppressive governments. Really, God promised the Messiah to save us from our sins. There are a lot of prophecies in the Old Testament that tell about that promise.

> Then God went silent. For about 400 years between the Old Testament and the New Testament sections in the Bible, there were no prophets. It seemed like no one heard from God.

> People were still waiting and waiting for the Messiah. But they had some questions!



Mhat questions would you want to ask God if you were alive during that time? Have teenagers brainstorm in their Crews, then ask Guides to share some of their questions with the group.



Say So you can understand that the people of that time were doing a lot of wondering! Where was the Messiah? Did God remember his promise? Had God abandoned them? When would the Messiah come? How would they recognize him? With all those wonderings...





At this point your volunteer should come in, dressed in odd clothes, with messy hair, and carrying a bowl of raisins. You'll act confused and surprised by this person intruding.

Periodically the volunteer should snack on some raisins and say things like "Oh, these dung beetles are delicious! Would you like some?"

The volunteer will also make proclamations about you, including:

- · Look, there's [your name]!
- [Your name] is full of wisdom!
- [Your name] is a wonderful teacher!
- Everyone listen to [your name]!
- Prepare your hearts for the teachings of [your name]!

Then the volunteer will abruptly leave.

- Umm...so speaking of wondering...I have a lot that I wonder about the person who just came in here!
- ASK What would you like to ask that person?
- That person seemed kind of strange. [He/she] was dressed unusually and was eating beetles!

But [he/she] reminded me of someone in the Bible. Someone who came along when everyone was already wondering all those questions about the Messiah.

Explore John the Baptist

Distribute Bibles to each Crew, and have them turn to the marked page in Matthew 3. Have Readers read Matthew 3:1-6 to their Crews.

- ASK What similarities do you see between our visitor and John? What's different?
- SAY If someone walked around like our visitor today, dressed oddly and saying surprising things, they might not be very popular.

 John was unusual, but people came from all over to see and hear him. I wonder...
- ASK Why do you think that might be?
- The Bible tells us that some people wondered if John might be the Messiah they'd been waiting for! (John 1:19-23) But John said he wasn't the Messiah. He was, however, preparing the way for the Messiah. The Messiah was coming soon!

COMPASS CLUE

Here's a tip for helping teenagers stay focused as they explore Scripture. On a whiteboard or sheet of newsprint, write "Read the passage. What similarities do you see between our visitor and John? What's different?" You'll give teens a clear reminder of what they're to look for in the Bible passage.

You'll notice the Bible refers to John as John the Baptist and that he baptized people in the river. In those days, Jewish people would get baptized as a symbol of how God forgave them. There was nothing special or supernatural about the water, but being cleaned on the outside showed what God did in their hearts.

> So the Jews got ready for the Messiah by showing how God had forgiven them. But then something confusing happened.

Have Crews read Matthew 3:13-15.

John knew Jesus is the Messigh. And Jesus had never done anything wrong! So if baptism was to show forgiveness, John must have wondered why Jesus wanted to be baptized. But when we wonder, we can trust Jesus! Jesus simply told John it needed to happen. John trusted Jesus and baptized him.

After that, John got the answer to any doubts he might have had about who Jesus is.

Have Crews read Matthew 3:16-17.

John heard the truth straight from heaven: Jesus is God's Son! That's why we can trust him.

Have Guides lead Crews in discussing these questions:

ASK What difference does it make to know Jesus is God's Son?

Why do you think people might doubt that today?

If Jesus were just some random guy, we may or may not feel like we could trust him. But Jesus is God's Son! That means we can always trust him to keep his promises, to be with us, and to have all the power—because that's who God is! And because he's God's Son, Jesus knows the answers to our questions. When we wonder, we can trust Jesus!


Spin Around

Now maybe you have times in life when your trust in Jesus is really strong, but then things happen that make you start to wonder and doubt. John had that happen, too! Let's explore that idea a little more.

> I'm going to say things that might make you wonder and doubt Jesus. As I do, stand up and spin in circles.

Read these slowly so teenagers get nice and dizzy.

- Maybe you lost a loved one, and you wonder why Jesus didn't heal that person.
- Maybe you prayed and prayed about something, but it felt like Jesus didn't hear your prayers.





- Maybe your teachers taught you some things that made you wonder if God can really be real.
- Maybe your friends told you they think believing in Jesus is just a "crutch" to help you feel better.
- Maybe you got confused by something you read in the Bible.
- Maybe you have questions that the Bible just doesn't answer.
- Maybe a Christian you really looked up to turned away from Jesus.
- Maybe you were hurt by people at church.

You can stop spinning now, but stay standing and tell me how you feel. Invite responses from everyone.



Have a seat—maybe even lie down or lean against a wall and close your eyes.

You felt [words teens shared] because you were physically dizzy. But sometimes life can feel like that. We don't know which way is up! Keep resting while I read what happened to John.

Read Matthew 11:2-3.

John had been put in prison. Eventually, he would be beheaded in prison. And being in prison made him wonder again. Even though he'd heard God announce who Jesus was, it didn't seem like Jesus was helping him! So he asked, "Are you the Messiah or should we keep looking?"

Jesus gave John's friends more truths to hold on to. He pointed to all the miracles he was doing: healing the blind, people who couldn't walk, and lepers. Bringing people back to life! Preaching good news to the poor. All these acts were signs that Jesus is who God said he was.

Let's think about how truths can help us when we feel mixed up.

Have teenagers stand back up and find a partner. Have partners find out who is older in their pair.

The older partners will spin while the younger partners remain still. As you spin, when you start to feel dizzy, catch your balance by holding on to your partner. Spin as I share these things.

- Because Jesus healed the sick, I can trust that he can heal my loved one in heaven.
- Because Jesus raised the dead, I can trust that he can give me eternal life.



DAY 1

- Because Jesus preached good news to the poor, I can trust that he is good.
- Because Jesus showed us who God is, I can turn to him for answers.
- Because Jesus is faithful, I can trust that he cares about those who left him.
- Because Jesus loves me, I can trust that he won't hurt me.

Let teens rest and get their balance, then switch partners and repeat the above. Then have teenagers sit with their Crews, and have Guides lead Crews in discussing these questions:

ASK Which truth was the most meaningful to you? Repeat the truths again if teens need to hear them again.

Jesus didn't promise that this life would be easy. In fact, he promised we'd face troubles! But he did promise he'd always be with us and that he's stronger than the world. When we wonder, we can trust Jesus! We might still get dizzied by life sometimes, but he's a strong foundation to hold on to.

Write on a Rock

We've explored several truths about Jesus that help us trust him. But I'd like you to think of just one of those that means the most to you. Just one that you want to hold on to when doubts and wonderings come along.

Distribute rocks and permanent markers.

Rocks are strong and sturdy. They don't rot away like wood. They don't die like humans and animals do. They can be a physical reminder of the solid truths about Jesus. Write your one truth on your rock. You'll take it home with you as a reminder that when we wonder, we can trust Jesus! You can use your rock to help you have rock-solid faith.

Invite the Prayer People to close the Bible study time with their Crews in prayer.

Allow a five-minute break, and then gather everyone together for a fun service project.



SERVICE PROJECT: Gospel Booklets (15 minutes)





Before You Hit the Trail

Decide who will receive your booklets. If your church has a prison ministry, that's a great outreach idea that will connect with John being in prison. But you could also give these booklets to anyone who needs encouragement, such as teachers and first responders. The booklets are geared toward adults, so keep that in mind as you select your recipients.

SAY

When we wonder, we can trust Jesus! When life gets hard, that can make us wonder a lot. We need encouragement! Let's make booklets full of truths people can hold on to when they wonder.

Tell teens about where your booklets will go.

Distribute scissors, markers, staplers, and the "Gospel Booklet" handouts. (You may want to explain that *gospel* means "good news" and that the booklets share the good news—and truth—about Jesus!)

Allow 15 minutes for teenagers to cut apart the booklet pages, add color, and staple the pages together to make a book.

Collect the books to give to your recipients.

When we wonder, we can trust Jesus! Let's pray for the people who receive these books to know and trust Jesus.

Lead teens in prayer, encouraging the Prayer People to pray within their Crews.

Now let's get a snack!

Head to the kitchen to collect the Tundra Treats.

DAY 1

TUNDRA TREATS (20 minutes)

Supplies:

- trays with snack from Tundra Treats Leader (1 per Crew)
- napkins (1 per person)
- cups of water (1 per person)

Ask the Tundra Treats kitchen staff to set out the snack ingredients designated for your group of teens.

If anyone in your group has food allergies, connect with the Tundra Treats Leader to see what snack alternative or variation he or she is providing and make sure the alternative goes to anyone who needs it.

Have the Tundra Treats Coordinator from each Crew take a tray for the Crew.

Then head back to your youth room and ask the Prayer Person from each Crew to pray.


When everyone is back in the youth room and Crews are gathered with their snack supplies, have them enjoy their snacks while chatting and getting to know each other. It's a relaxed befriending time that also allows everyone a break from all they've been processing throughout the day. If Crews need some conversation starters, offer simple get-to-know-you questions for Crews to answer, such as the following:

- What was the best part of your weekend, and why?
- What's something you're looking forward to this year?
- What do you like to do for fun?

When everyone's done eating, each Crew's Tundra Treats Coordinator can lead cleanup, throwing away any trash and quickly taking any leftover snacks back to the Tundra Treats kitchen staff. Once Crews have cleaned up from snack, gather them close for a quick discussion before Compass Closing.




You can trust that Jesus is God's Son.
